Candy Corn Popcorn

about 16 cups popcorn. 1/2 cup butter divided, 6 tablesppoon butter divided , 6 tablespoon corn syrup, divided, 1 cup sugar, 1 (3oz package yellow jello), 1 (3 oz orange jello)

Preheat oven to 300 degrees, line 2 baking sheets with foil, Divide popcorn into 3 bowls. In sauce pan over medium heat add 1/2butter and corn syrup when butter is melted add 1/2 cup sugar and one box jello bring to boil and simmer 5 minutes. Pour Layer mixture over one bowl and repeat for the second bowl. When the 2 bowls are evenly coated spread out on the bake sheets and bake for 10 minutes . Layer the popcorn mixes in bags with the plain popcorn . Happy fall!

levels may be linked to an increase in seasonal colds and flu. We get Vitamin. D from Sunshine and very few foods, so supplements may be needed to help boost your Vitamin D.

Reduce your stress levels- (yeah right) Do yoga, play with your dog, listen to music, find ways to chill out because research shows stress halters how well your immune system works.

Cook with Canola and olive oils-These contain healthy fats which act as a lubricant for cells. This lubricant improves flexibility and communication between cells, which promotes immune function.

Limit your alcoholic drinks- one is okay but drinking any more could suppress the immune system.

Now going back to exercise and not feeling well. Knowing when you should continue and when you should not is important for your immune system and it all depends on what ails you. If it's just a cold it may be okay

depending on how you are feeling, but if you are running a fever hitting the gym is a definite no no according to WebMD. Fever is the limiting factor. The danger is exercising and raising your body temperature internally if you already have a fever because it can make you even sicker. Another factor is if you feel any bronchial tightness working out is not advisable. Some people feel even worse if they don't exercise because their body is used to it, so it is also alright to tone it back. Instead of that run, go for a walk. instead of a high impact cardio, do some yoga or Pilates or a lighter intensity program so you are still moving.

Basic rule of thumb according to WebMD says do a neck check to determine what is the best option for you: if your symptoms are above the neck including a sore throat, nasal congestion, sneezing and tearing eyes, then it's okay to exercise. If your symptoms are below the neck such as coughing, body aches, fever, and fatigue then it's time to hang up the running shoes until these symptoms

WEED **C**ONTROL

Farmers may still have time to control weeds to improve forage quality and quantity in their fields.

Fall can be a good time to eliminate hard-to-control weeds. This is because many of the plants are feeding their root systems, which allows applied herbicide to reach the root system to potentially kill the weeds.

Mark Loux, Ohio State University Extension Weed Specialist, has discussed that the optimum timing of spraying weeds can vary based on the plant life cycle. He describes various weed life cycles into one of two categories (http://muskingum.osu.edu/topics/agriculture-and-natural-resources/news/timing-fall-herbicide-treatments-based-on-weed-life-cycle):

1) Must be treated before frost,

which pertains to all warm-season perennials, including johnsongrass, pokeweed, milkweeds and hemp dogbane, and horsenettle. The first frost will cause these weeds to shut down, if they have not already matured and senesced. Herbicides are no longer effective after this occurs.

2) Can be treated after frost and in some cases even after a hard freeze. Winter annuals, biennials, and cool-season perennials fit into this category, and they are often most effectively controlled when herbicides are applied between mid-October and mid-November.

Mark Landefeld, an OSU Extension educator in Monroe County added the following in a recent on-line article:

"Farmers should monitor their fields regularly to identify weeds and deal with them in a timely manner," he said. "Not only can weeds decrease forage quality, but some can be invasive and reduce the tonnage of the forage that you are trying to harvest.

Some of the weeds to control

now include chickweed, henbit, purple deadnettle, and Canada thistle.

The drought conditions this year also have resulted in more weeds in some cases.

While herbicides often can be used to combat hay field and pasture weeds, farmers should make sure to evaluate the existing stand in case reseeding is a better option, Landefeld said.

The other key to effective control is to make sure the weeds have recovered fully from harvest, late summer mowing or earlier droughty conditions, and are fairly sizable. Canada thistle should be 8 to 12 inches tall for best results for a herbicide application.

Loux also mentioned that biennials, such as poison hemlock and wild carrot, are often effectively controlled in the fall at the end of their first year of growth, when they exist as a low-growing rosette.

It should also be noted that herbicides often become ineffective in treating weeds when
