THE UPTOWN **G**ARDENER

Each day we try to get a few more things done to winterize. This week it has been a bit difficult as both of us has been under the weather with sinus or some crudy

thing.

Still have some apples to get done up and will be done for this season. The jars are all filled, not nearly as many as what my mom always had, but we will enjoy many meals with what I have done. The new grass we had put down is coming up nice except for a few spots that the strong wind got.

Flower beds are about done for the year except for the mums. What I tried transplanting, I hope will make it, the ground is just to

I have brought in some coleus, begonias and impatients slips for rooting and are doing well. Hopefully I won't need to be buying as many new plants.

The one thing I plan to do with the apples is to make up fried apples similar to Cracker Barrels. I have made these for several years and they sure come in handy.

This is how I make them.

I like to use an apple similar to golden delicious or any good cooking apple that stays firm after being cooked. For our use I peel and slice 3 or 4 apples, dip them in vinegar and salt water to keep their good color. Mix together 1/4 cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon and 1 tablespoon cornstarch. mix it well and add to the apples that have been drained, coat the apples well and put in a freezer pouch such as you would use for a seal a meal. Freeze and when ready to use place frozen bags in microwave to cook. Takes about 3 to 5 minutes. I use this as a basic guide, you may need to add more sugar depending upon the variety of apples used. I do several bags at a time.

PIZZA & THE PULSE

Pizza Hut Fundraiser for the Pulse Opera House

Calling all Pulse supporters! If you eat dinner at the Huntington Pizza Hut on Monday, October 18 between 5:00 and 8:00 p.m., part of the proceeds will go to the Pulse. Even better, Pulse Players will be serving your pizza! The purpose of the fundraiser is to help the Pulse Opera House offset the offset expenses of the postponed production of "Fiddler on the Roof" and the loss of the anticipated ticket income. The rights to the show were pulled three days before opening because a National Touring Company of "Fiddler" was scheduled to come to the area; thus, preventing all amateur groups within a 100 mile radius from doing the show.

The Pulse Opera House is a non-profit 501(c)3 community theatre serving the Huntington County area and beyond for 24 years. The theatre supports the work of talented local performing and visual artists. In addition to the productions, the theatre works with area schools providing productions such as "Diary of Anne Frank," "The Boxcar Children," and "Midsummer Night's Dream" for field trips. They have done reading programs with the library, provided food for the food pantry and developed new scripts through the Playwright's Project. In 2000 and 2004, the Pulse Opera House was selected to represent the United States International Theatre Festivals in Germany.

SHOT CLINIC

The Huntington County Health Department will have a Flu Shot Clinic at the Warren Pharmacy

Medicare patients may pay for the vaccination and send their into Medicare for reimbursement. The Health Department will issue a receipt of payment. Cash or Local Checks are accepted.

Residents of neighboring counties are welcome! You do not need to be a Huntington County resident. If you have questions about vaccinations you may call the Health Department at 260-358-4831. This service is provided by the Huntington County Health Department. The Warren Pharmacy is simply providing a location for this excellent service.

GOAT & SHEEP

Area goat and sheep producers can learn more about good production practices by attending a series of webinar sessions. These programs will be carried by several Extension Offices throughout Indiana. Anyone with an interest in goat and sheep production can attend these sessions. The **Huntington County Extension** Office conference room will be a host site for this program.

Purdue University Extension Service, Kentucky State University, and the University of Kentucky are sponsoring the webinar series, which will be held on three consecutive Tuesday nights starting on October 26 from 7-9 P.M. EST. The focus of the programs is nutrition and health issues in raising goats and sheep. Classes will be taught by Purdue Extension Specialists, Educators, and Kentucky livestock specialists.

Goat production numbers are rising in Indiana and Kentucky. According to the Department of Agriculture (U.S.D.A.) 45,000 goats are raised in Indiana and 87,000 in Kentucky. Sheep and lamb numbers in Indiana have been fairly consistent over the past several years. The most recent U.S.D.A. report as of January 1, 2010 listed sheep and lamb numbers at 52,000 in Indiana. The topics for each webinar session are as follows:

· Session 1 on October 26, concerns Parasite Control in Small Ruminants and will feature discussion about Internal Parasite Control by Dr. Kenneth Andries, Kentucky State University; Coccidiosis in Goats and Sheep and External Parasites in Goats by Dr. Mike Neary, Purdue University.

· Session 2 on November 2, features teaching about Forages and Grazing Systems for Goats led by David Trotter, Purdue Extension Educator; Alternative Forages for Goats by Dr. Kenneth Andries, Kentucky University; State Supplementation and Feeding the Gestating Doe by Terry

Hutchens, University Kentucky.

· Session 3 on November 9, will have information about Vaccination Programs, Common Diseases Medication Availability for Goats and Sheep by Dr. Michelle Bilderback, DVM, University of Kentucky; Urinary Calculi Problems in Small Ruminants by Terry Hutchens, University of Kentucky; and Foot Rot Control in Goats and Sheep by Dr. Mike Neary, Purdue University.






