Egg Roll Apple Rolls

3 cups of finely diced apples, 1 teaspoon lemon juice, 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon, 4 teaspoon flour, 4 tablespoons sugar, 12 egg roll wrappers, oil for frying. Mix the apples, lemon juice, cinnamon, flour and sugar together well, place 2 heaping tablespoon apples in center of each wrap, fold in from the sides and roll tightly, use a bit of water to moisten the edge of wrapper to seal. Fry in 350 heat 4-5 minutes remove and sprinkle with a cinnamon and sugar mix. I did these and baked them in the oven and turned out good.
