GOVERNOR SAYS STAY Номе

Governor Eric J. Holcomb delivered statewide a address today to order that Hoosiers remain in their homes except when they are at work or for permitted activities, such as taking care others, obtaining necessary supplies, and for health and safety. The order is in effect from March 25 to April 7.

"The next two weeks are critical if we are to slow the spread of COVID-19, and we must slow the spread. You must be part of the solution, not the problem," said Gov. Holcomb.

The first positive case of COVID-19 in Indiana was reported on March 6. Since then the number of positive cases has increased on a near daily basis, escalating as the capacity to test has grown. As of this morning, the number of tests completed in Indiana is 1,960, the number of positive cases is 259 and 7 deaths have been reported.

"I'm setting the example by sending state government personnel home to work to the maximum extent possible and closing our facilities to public interaction beginning Tuesday, for at least the next two weeks, said Gov. Holcomb.

I'm sure a few of us are facing that problem right now with all the hoarding going on but when i take each bite of my chowder I think what if it didn't have any sausage in it, or corn, or onions, or potatoes. What if it was just thickened hot water with some seasonings and maybe a potato or two to feed the whole family. My Aunt Norine has told me some of the recipes that Grandma Herring would make. Yep, we are very spoiled in our day and age and I must say I'm kinda grateful too. Those recipes were very slim on any type of ingredients and how they survived, I'll never know. But they knew how to conserve and make what they had last for as long as possible. I would hate to see how much people waste today. With the coronavirus and all the hoarding I hope people are getting all the perishables used up before they go bad and hope they are not throwing a bunch of it away because they can't get it used up before it expires.

Now that I set here with a full belly because I just topped my supper off with a piece of sugar cream pie, I think about the fact of how many children went to bed hungry in the great depression. I'm sure more than we would like to know. My Aunt never said to much about whether they did or not but with some of the recipes she told me about, I'm sure they did on occasion. All she would say was that they survived. Being the cook that I am and even when we were first married and didn't have a lot of money, it didn't even compare to what they went through during that time.

You know with everything that is going on I am afraid that Chapel Services9:00 a.m. we might just repeat history, in which I truly hope not but what if ...

I'm going to leave you with a recipe which might just come in handy if you can't get any bread in the grocery store. They are my biscuits that my mother and grandmother had probably made a few times. I'm sure they rolled theirs out and cut with a biscuit cutter, but I shortcut mine and scoop mine out and make drop biscuits. Enjoy and pray for our

On March 19, 2020, Governor Holcomb issued Executive Order 20-05 which in part waived Administrative Penalty Fees (late fees). Today, he further ordered an automatic extension of all state-issued licenses and stated he will advise law enforcement to refrain from issuing citations for a driver's license or registration that expires during emergency. Effectively, this extends expiration dates of driver's registrations, licenses, and identification cards without changing the expiration date printed on documents in an individual's possession and waives late fees during a future renewal.

In a continuing effort to slow the spread of novel coronavirus (COVID-19), Governor Eric J. Holcomb has announced additional efforts.

The governor and other state officials will conduct a COVID-19 briefing today at 2:30 p.m. in the south atrium of the Indiana Statehouse with the latest updates on testing and cases.

Here are additional directives from Governor Holcomb.

Indiana will adhere to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention for large events and mass gatherings. The guidance recommends no in-person events of more than 50 people. Under the current guidance for schools, 273 public school districts are closed, using elearning days, or on spring break and have announced a future closure. The Department of Education is working with the remaining 16 school

> Bars, nightclubs and close to in-person patrons and may provide take-out and delivery services through the end of March

The state's Emergency Operations Center has been raised to a Level 1 status and will work in conjunction with the incident command center at the Indiana State Department of Health for planning, coordination, predictive analysis and other functions

State employees will maximize the use of remote work and whenever meet virtually maintaining while possible operations. Non-essential inperson meetings will be limited to 10 persons or less and should meet virtually whenever possible. High-risk individuals should not attend meetings in

State employees over the age of 60 with underlying health conditions are advised to work from home, and agencies should identify work that can be accomplished remotely those individuals

The Indiana State Museum and Historic Sites, which are closed on Mondays, will close to the public beginning Tuesday

The visitors center at White River State Park will close

Indiana state parks and recreation centers, including state park inns, remain open. Restaurants will convert operations to take-out and delivery

State agencies already are developing remote work plans for employees and will continue to implement them while maintaining necessary state services. Employees who work outdoors are encouraged to practice social distancing

The Department of Workforce (DWD) Development has suspended rules requiring certain unemployment insurance claimants to physically appear at a Work One location to engage in reemployment services for the next four weeks. This will ensure that individuals who may be symptomatic do not have to physically appear to continue their unemployment insurance eligibility

The DWD will also request flexibility under federal and state law to expand eligibility for claimants and ease burdens on employers.

The Indiana Economic Development Corporation will postpone the inaugural Indiana Global Economic Summit, scheduled for April 26-28
