

The 2021 Indiana state park passes, lake permits, offroad cycling permits, and horse tags are now available at property offices and front gates. and online ShopINstateparks.com.

A resident annual entrance pass costs \$50. A nonresident annual entrance pass for visitors who live outside the state costs \$70. Annual entrance passes are not valid for entrance to the Indiana State Museum, State Historic Sites, or Falls of the Ohio Interpretive Center.


