NIGHT SHIFT NURSES

HONORED

University celebrates healthcare workers, draws awareness of night shift work when Daylight Savings Time adds extra hour to an already grueling shift on Nov. 1

Because of the pandemic, our state's night shift workers have been on the

frontlines of some of the most stressful cases in our lifetime, yet they continue to serve as our healthcare heroes day in and day out. In response, WGU Indiana staff and leaders are launching their eighth consecutive Night Shift Nurses Week campaign, which aligns with the return to Standard Time when night shift workers add an extra hour to their normal schedule on Nov. 1.

The university will deliver carefully curated appreciation kits to nearly 1,900 shift workers at hospitals throughout the state leading up to and on the ending of Daylight Savings Time. In addition, WGU Indiana will award its annual Night Shift Nurse scholarship to students in healthcare professions. The campaign has been a mainstay in WGU Indiana's efforts to support healthcare workers since 2013.

"This year especially, this campaign means a lot to WGU Indiana as it acknowledges the dedication and drive of Indiana's night shift nurses," said WGU Indiana Chancellor Alison Bell. "With a large number of our nursing students being night shift nurses, we hope the appreciation kits provide them with a reminder of how much they matter and that they're supported."

More than 10 WGU Indiana employees volunteered to

put together kits and assist in the delivery of the appreciation kits, which will reach night shift nurses at 180 hospitals and health care units across Indiana. Each kit contains a collection of pick-me-ups like snacks, novelty gifts like sleep masks, pen lights for those long nights, and more.

"Healthcare workers cannot properly care for patients if their own needs aren't taken care of first," said WGU Indiana State Director of Nursing, Mary Lawson Carney, DNP, RN-BC, CCRN, CNE. "I'm fortunate to work for an organization that recognizes the importance of self-care and who are willing to place an emphasis on workforce management, development and increased recognition of our state's night shift workers."

To encourage night shift nurses to pursue their dreams of going back to school, WGU Indiana is offering the WGU Night Shift Nurses Scholarship, worth \$3,000, to night shift nurses returning to school in their College of Health Professions. Applications are due Dec. 31, 2020. For more information and to apply, visit here.

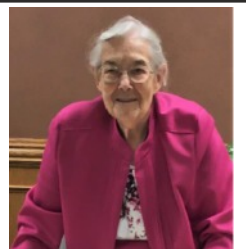

promotion, Miller served as the FFA assistant director for approximately three years. Indiana FFA is a dynamic youth organization that provides students opportunities for leadership development, personal growth, and career success.

The responsibilities that come with Miller's new title include overseeing operations for the 214 chapters and over 12,500 members in Indiana. Miller will also supervise the Indiana FFA Pavilion at the Indiana State Fair, coordinate strategic plan initiatives, and lead the FFA Association Board of Trustees

While attending Huntington North High School, Miller was highly active in FFA and 4-H all throughout her high school years. During her Junior year, she was selected to represent the State of Indiana at the American Legion Auxiliary Girls Nation, a week of "mock" Senate sessions held in Washington D.C. once a year. PASSES & PERMITS

AVAILABLE

The 2021 Indiana state park passes, lake permits, off-road cycling permits, and horse tags are now available at property offices and front gates, and online at ShopINstateparks.com.

A resident annual entrance pass costs \$50. A non-resident annual entrance pass for visitors who live outside the state costs \$70. Annual entrance passes are not valid for entrance to the Indiana State Museum, State Historic Sites, or Falls of the Ohio Interpretive Center.

Golden Hoosier Passports cost \$25 and are available to all Hoosier residents 65 and older. There's also a Golden Hoosier Passport for disabled Hoosier veterans (DHV) who qualify to purchase a DHV license plate. To qualify, the veteran must be 50% service-connected disabled as determined by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs. Anyone who has been issued a Prisoner of War license plate may receive a passport for

free. SSDI Golden Hoosier Passports may be used by an Indiana resident receiving or eligible to receive Social Security Disability Income under 42 U.S. code 423 as described by the Social Security Administration.

Lake permits are available for motorized watercraft for \$25 and non-motorized watercraft for \$5. These permits are required for all private watercraft using state park, reservoir, and state forest lakes, and all watercraft moored at marinas, private docks, or bank ties on those lakes. The 2020 lake permits also remain available for the rest of this year.

Off-road cycling permits are available for \$20 and are required for each bicycle user for off-road bicycle access and use of DNR properties where off-road cycling is allowed. These permits are not an entrance permit and do not cover special user charges for services and facilities within

was especially important to Darryl.

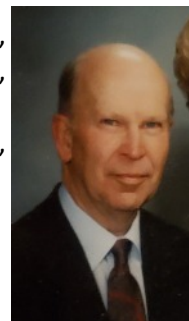

the property. These permits are required only for trails identified as Intermediate, Advanced, and Expert. They are not required for trails identified as Beginner.

Horse tags cost \$20 and are required for each horse brought to designated DNR properties where horse use is allowed. A horse tag is not an entrance permit and does not cover special user charges for services and facilities within the property. This year's 2020 horse tags and lake permits remain available to purchase for use for the rest of 2020.

None of the 2021 permits will be valid until Jan. 1, 2021.

State park annual permits are also available as part of Holiday Gift Packs. Gift packs also include a one-year subscription to Outdoor Indiana and a gift card for state park inns or campgrounds. Holiday gift packs are available for \$100, or \$150 for a higher gift card amount, at shopINstateparks.com.

HOURS CHANGE

After Oct. 31, patients and visitors at Parkview Huntington Hospital (PHH) will notice that the hours have changed for access at the main entrance.

PHH leaders announced today that, for operational reasons, the main entrance will be open

6:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. During all other times, patients and visitors should use the Emergency Department entrance, which will remain open 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

PROTECT YOUR FAMILY FROM LONG-TERM CARE COSTS

Like everyone, you want to remain physically and financially independent throughout your life. But if you lose some of this freedom, the last thing you'd want is to become a burden on your family. How can you keep this from happening?

First of all, you need to be aware of the risk. Someone turning 65 today has almost a 70 percent chance of eventually needing some type of long-term care, according to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Of course, this doesn't necessarily mean that you face that 70 percent likelihood. In reality, you have either a zero percent chance of requiring long-term care (you'll never need it) or a 100 percent chance (you'll definitely need it).

Nonetheless, if you think you've got that zero percent chance, you're taking a gamble – and it could be a big one, because long-term care is expensive. The median annual cost for a private room in a nursing home is over \$102,000, according to Genworth, an insurance company. Other long-term

care services, such as those provided by a home health care aide, also don't come cheaply.

Furthermore, you can't count on Medicare paying all these costs – in fact, it would probably only cover a small portion of a nursing home stay and provide limited assistance for home health care. So, if you were financially unprepared for the expense of long-term care, the burden might fall on your loved ones. This could be a big financial challenge, in two ways.

First, if a family member had to become your caregiver, this individual might have to abandon a career, or at least substantially reduce their working hours. Not only would this result in a loss of income, but it could also lower the amounts that could be contributed to a 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored retirement plan.

Second, if your family members couldn't leave their jobs or cut back on their hours, or they were simply unable to provide the type of long-term care you need, they might be forced to pay for a nursing home stay or home health care worker out of pocket.

To avoid these outcomes, you have a couple of options: Self-insure – You could conceivably "self-insure" against the costs of long-term care by devoting a portion of your investment portfolio specifically to this purpose. However, if at some point you require admission to a nursing home, it may require a significant commitment of your resources.

Purchase protection – Over the past decade or so, there's been an increase in the types of long-term care protection vehicles available. These instruments vary widely in cost and in what they cover, but by choosing a protection option, you may greatly lower the financial risk you might face. By consulting with a financial professional, you should be able to find an arrangement that's appropriate for your situation.

Preserving your financial independence and helping protect that of your family should be a key financial goal. And you can make progress toward accomplishing this by recognizing the potential cost of long-term care and taking steps to deal with it.

5 CAR SEAT TIPS TO KEEP

YOUR KIDS SAFE

(BPT) - From the moment your child is born, you do everything in your power to keep them safe. Most parents and caregivers know the importance of car seats for protecting children, but it's also important to make sure you are choosing and using them correctly. Free online resources can help.

Now is the perfect time to brush up on these tips to help your family travel safely.

1. Always buckle up

According to the latest 2018 crash data from The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), nearly 1 in 3 children under 12 killed in car crashes were not using a car seat, booster seat or seat belt at all. For kids between the ages

of 8 and 14, nearly half of those killed (45%) weren't wearing their seat belts. Always remember to check that your kids are buckled up before you start the car, especially as they get older and more independent.

2. Brush up on your car seat skills

Even if you've been buckling your child into a car seat for years, it's a good idea to periodically review the basics, making sure you aren't skipping any important safety steps. Don't rush things. Take some time to practice how to properly buckle your child, using the car seat manual as a guide.

3. Consider a virtual car seat check

Certified technicians are available across the country to help you install and use your

child's car seat correctly - often at no cost to you. Many also offer virtual seat checks, allowing you to speak with an expert from your own home. Look up car seat inspection options in your community at [NHTSA.gov/TheRightSeat](https://www.nhtsa.gov/TheRightSeat).

4. Find the right seat for your child

In addition to installing the car seat correctly, it's also important to make sure your child is in the right seat for their age and size. Check the limits on your child's car seat or booster seat to know when it's time to change the seat they are using. For maximum protection in a crash, kids should not move to the next car seat type until they exceed the height or weight limits of their current seat.

5. Get to know your vehicle

Every vehicle is different. Whether you drive a pickup truck, minivan, sedan or SUV can make a difference in how your child's car seat should be installed. Check your vehicle's manual for step-by-step guidance.

1 tbsp. baking powder	1/2c. oil
¼ tsp. salt	2 egg whites
2 egg yolks	

Combine all dry ingredients in a bowl, add beaten egg yolks. stir in the milk and oil. Stir until just combined but still lumpy.

In a small mixing bowl, beat the egg whites till stiff peaks form. Gently fold in the whites to the other batter, leaving a few fluffs of egg whites.

Pour an amount of batter, that your iron will take, on to lightly greased waffle irons, close lid and bake according to the manufactures directions, when done lift off the grids with a fork.

Makes 3 to 4 waffles. Serve warm with butter and syrup or get creative and top with fresh fruit and whipped topping.
