This years property taxes are getting a late start. March 31st was the deadline set by State Legislatures for Mobile Home owners to file for deductions that are to appear on this years tax bill. Taxes have been calculated and are being printed. If you do not receive your bill by May 1st, call the County Treasurer's office to in-

True Tax Value is now being used in the formula instead of Assessed Value. True Tax is three times the assessed value that had been used in the past. Exemptions have also been tripled. Exemptions decrease the amount of taxes paid. You will notice the tax rate has also decreased. Last year's Warren Corp rate was 9.5193%. This year's rate is 3.2448%. All the changes are in place to shift to a new taxing system due to a court order.

The tax deadline is still May 10th. The Indiana Code will not approve the extension of the deadline unless tax bills cannot be mailed out by April 25th. Payments can be made at the Treasurer's Office, Monday - Friday - 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. (except Election Day - Courthouse closed for voting), Saturlocal banks, by credit card - call 1800-272-9829 be sure to follow instructions and enter Jurisdiction code printed on your tax bill, or payments can be mailed to the County Treasurer's Office at 201 N Jefferson St, Room 104, Huntington, IN 46750. All mail accepted on time must be postmarked by May 10th. If a receipt is needed, please be sure to include a self-addressed stamped envelope.

The County Treasurer's Office will be closed for approximately two weeks to the public after the deadline in order to process the mail and balance the books.

No E-MAIL SURCHARGE

If you hear a rumor that the Postal Service is trying to put a 5-cent surcharge on e-mail it is not true. The rumor has been circulating for nearly two years despite all our efforts to dispel it.

The rumor, which is being circulated via the Internet is completely false. As a matter of fact, the Postal Service has learned that a similar hoax occurred recently in Canada concerning Canada Post.

The e-mail message claims that day, May 4th 8 a.m. to noon, all a "Congressman Schnell" has introduced "Bill 602P" to allow the

federal government to impose a 5-cent surcharge on each email message delivered over the Internet. The money would be collected by Internet Service Providers and then turned over to the Postal Service.

No such proposed legislation ex-

In fact, no "Congressman Schnell" exists, and the supposed bill number is not in the format congress uses, anyway.

The U.S. Postal Service has no authority to surcharge e-mail messages sent over the Internet, nor would it support such legislation. It is a hoax. It is an urban legend. It is simply not true. So the next time you hear about this urban legend, or the next time one of your e-mail buddies sends you a message about this hoax, just delete it or respond: "Schnell No!"

Wells County 4-H members in many of the animal projects will need to complete a Livestock Enrollment Form. The form includes animal identification, birthdate, and other information.

All of the Livestock forms are due May 15th at the County Extension Office.

This would include youth enrolled in Swine, Sheep, Poultry, Rabbit, Goat, Dairy, Dairy Feeder Steer Calf, Beef (late fall heifers), and Horse & Pony projects.

4-H members are to have their animals in possession by May 1st. Exceptions to this would be rabbit meat pens and some poultry exhibits which are not yet born or hatched

Members purchasing rabbits should make sure that the rabbits have pedigree papers proving they are of a specific breed according to the American Rabbit Breeders Association.

Members exhibiting meat goats will need to arrange with the 4-H Goat Committee to have their animal nose printed and ear tagged if they plan to exhibit at the Indiana State Fair. (This is a new rule for 2002.)

Most 4-H members should have their enrollment forms for Dairy, Swine, Poultry, Rabbit, and Goat. Sheep members will complete their form at the Sheep ID Day, Saturday, May 11,8AM-10:30 AM at the 4-H Park.

Horse & Pony members will complete their form at their Measurement Day, Sunday, April 14th, Noon - 5 PM at the 4-H Park.

Beef heifers (late fall) are also due May 15th. Extra forms are available from the Wells County Extension Office located at the 4-H Park or from local 4-H Leaders.

This year's Wells County 4-H Fair will be Saturday, July 13 through Thursday, July 18.

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

If you are in a car or mobile home, get out immediately and head for safety.

· Prepare for High Winds: Make trees more wind resistant by removing diseased and damaged limbs, then strategically removing branches so that wind can blow through. Install permanent shutters on your windows and add protection to the outside areas of sliding glass doors. Strengthen garage doors and unreinforced masonry. Move or secure lawn furniture, outdoor decorations or ornaments, trash cans, hanging plants and anything else that can be picked up by wind and become

a projectile.


