### DID YOU FEEL IT?

Earthquake felt in Indiana The U.S. Geological Survey reports that a 5.2 magnitude earthquake occurred at 4:36 a.m. early on Friday morning in southern Illinois on the Wabash Valley Seismic Zone, which is near the New Madrid Seismic Zone that includes Indiana.

After shocks occured throughout the morning, originating in Illinois, but being experienced in Indiana. After shocks, their times and magnitudes as of 1 p.m. were: 6:03 a.m. EDT 3 miles NW of Mount Carmel, IL 2.5 tremor located 6.2 mile depth; 6:15 a.m. EDT 4 miles S of Noble, IL 2.5 tremor located 6.2 mile depth; 6:36 a.m. EDT 6 miles NNE of Bellmont, IL 2.4 tremor located 11.1 mile depth; 6:46 a.m. EDT 7 miles NNE Bellmont, IL 2.2 tremor located 11.1 mile depth; 7:55 a.m. EDT 6 miles NW of Mount Carmel, IL 2.6 tremor located 6.2 mile depth; 11:14 a.m. EDT, 8 miles E from West Salem, IL. 4.5 tremor located 6.2 miles deep.

While the earthquake was felt in Indiana, the Indiana Department of Homeland Security's **Emergency Operations Center** has only received reports of very minor damage as of 1 p.m.

The Warren Town Council met on Monday evening, April 14, in Assembly Hall. President Bill Cartwright called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. and all in attendance repeated the Pledge to the American Flag.

The Downtown Project is expected to start sometime after April 21.

Council agreed to give \$2,250 to the Sportsman Club to purchase shingles for a new roof for the club building.

The Second Street water main project is scheduled to be completed by the week of April

The financial consultant forwater and wastewater presented his financial review. A water rate increase was recommended, but no increase in sewage.

Council agreed to pay the annual Keystone maintenance fee of \$2,800.

The budget for 2008 has been approved by the state.

Curtis Day reported they have put new drainage under the ball diamonds at Tower Park.

The Fire Department had submitted an application for a grant to purchase an air compressor for the department.

The April 28 Council meeting was rescheduled for 4 p.m. At 6 p.m. they will meet with the Chamber of Commerce Economic Committee. This meeting is open to the public.

Spring Town Clean-up has been set for May 5 to 10.



But she never stopped composing hymns, sometimes 36 a week.

The total number, until Fannie died at age 95, was 8000. She has been called "America's Hymn Queen"! Bayview members responded to Martha's presentation my remembering many familiar hymns written by Fannie Crosby.

Marian Dawson had a book entitled "Moments Grandparents" (suitable for us all), concerning a certain possibility for our lives of paying attention to "God nudges." The book continued to tell the story of a 4th century monk, Telemachus, who strongly felt he'd gotten a message from God to go to Rome. There he observed the gladiatorial contests in the Coliseum and was so moved that he confronted the warriors by shouting "STOP — in the name of Christ!" The crowd dispersed, left the Coliseum, and that was the last contest fought to the death of one of the gladiators, after a history of many years, since 391 B.C. The lesson here is that one voice, although it may be unknown, can matter. In that early century's society's thinking about the so-called sport of



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

gladiators' killing, began to change. A quote from this description of someone responding to "God's nudge" was: "Courage is fear that has said its prayers." We thought of the courage and prayers of our soldiers in the Middle East.

Lilly Nutter was impressed by a March 24 Time magazine article about the use of plastic water bottles, which discussed both the impact on the environment and on our health. Should we reuse water bottles? What about plastic baby bottles? As heat intensifies the chemical dangers in plastic bottles, the latter is of even more concern than our reuse, which will present bacterial problems. Lilly noted from the article that a HIDPE container (high-density polyethylene) is safe (but heavier and clumsier) and stainless steel (inside and out) is O.K. unless frozen. Perhaps the best idea is "drinking our water from a tap, in a glass!"

Margaret Bell had read in the Journal-Gazette of February 27, about the new "Doomsday" vault in the Arctic, in Longyearabyen, Norway. It has been called a "frozen Garden of Eden .: Just 620 miles from the North Pole, it is designed to hold 4.5 million crop seeds from all over the world, and is built to withstand global warming, earthquakes, and even nuclear strikes. The article said seed banks established earlier in both Iraq and Afghanistan have been wiped out, and one in the Philippines was flooded in the typhoon of 2006.

Crop diversity will always be an essential factor in maintaining our productive world, and the new bank joins 1400 other banks around the world.

Having had our minds renewed, challenged and refreshed from some of our Bayview members' readings, the meeting was adjourned for a time of reflection and sharing.



### EGYPTIAN TOUR (PART III)

We sailed north to Qena to see the Dendera Temple built by the Romans and Greeks and dedicated



to Hothor-goddess of maternal and family love. By now the temples were beginning to run together. Each one is famous, huge, old, and fabulous in its own regard. Each is dedicated to some god, built by a famous pharaoh on the backs of many workers, and an architectural phenomenon. The footprint of a temple is primarily the same. Some statue or obelisk outside the first gate called a pylon. Beyond the gate is a court yard followed by a covered array of huge columns, and then the entry to the most holy place near the back of the complex. Even though the layout is similar, each temple is uniquely decorated and some cover acres. (My apologies to you history buffs for this general explanation.)

We boarded the boat and sailed south on our way to Aswan. Along the Nile, the longest river in the world, there were hundreds of donkeys being used as beasts of burden, women doing their laundry, kids swimming, animals drinking and in general people living like they have since 5000 B.C. Papyrus reeds grow along the bank and were made into sheets similar to paper used to record the earliest form of written communication. We stopped along the way to see more famous temples: The Temples of Karnak, Edfu, Esna, Kom Ombo, and Philae each awesome and unique. We also visited an alabaster shop and a papyrus studio.

Upon arrival at Aswan, famous for its two dams, we visited a Nubian spice market before embarking on our visit to the two dams and to Lake Nasser. You may remember that the High Dam was built to control flooding on the Nile River. The Soviets and Egyptians worked together on this project completed in 1972. Some years before, the Low Dam was built by the British but was no longer effective.

Next we flew down to Abu Simbel. You've seen it in the movies. The massive facade of the main temple is dominated by the four seated colossal 66 foot statues of Ramses and sculpted directly from the rock face. When Jim was in Roll Elementary he read a story in his Weekly Reader newspaper about the moving of Abu Simbel up the mountain to keep it from being flooded by the new Lake Nasser. It was deemed a World NESCO site and other countries helped with the logistics. One of the major obstacles was to figure out how those early mathematicians positioned the temple so that the sun would shine through to the back sanctuary twice during the year. One day was the vernal equinox and the other was the autumnal equinox. Those early scientists were extremely intelligent.

We couldn't finish our trip without taking a sail on a felucca. These are those beautiful, traditional sailboats seen in various Egyptian pictures. As we were sailing around we were serenaded by small boys in homemade wooden boats using ping-pong-like paddles. They were singing traditional Arabic songs with an occasional "Row, Row, Row, Your Boat," sung in English. I'm sure this was thrown in for good measure and hopefully a good tip.

Egyptians in general are very well educated. Most go on to college and most speak English, Arabic, and a patois. In fact, there seemed to be more education than there were jobs available for them. You might find a 4-year college graduate working in a used car shop. None the less, even young children usually understood English. Folks there were thought to be uneducated if they could not speak another language besides Arabic.

It was enlightening to understand how the Egyptians view themselves. Even though Egypt is in Africa, they see themselves first as Egyptians and secondly as Africans. Politically and religiously they consider themselves Islamic Arabs. They closely identify with other Arab nations and, we were told, that Arab nations banded more

closely together after 911. They were extremely offended that the United States lumped them all together as radicals.

The trip was interesting and educational, and gave us the opportunity to better understand one of the oldest countries in the world. Each time we travel out of the United States we are always reminded of how fortunate we are to live in America. It was apparent that we Americans had better be ensuring the education of our youth.
