DONATE DEER

Indiana hunters can donate deer meat to those in need or to members of their communities through two DNR programs.

The Sportsmen's Benevolence Fund and GiveIN Game program allow hunters to share their bounty with those who would like local, low-fat and high-protein meat.

The Sportsmen's Benevolence Fund benefits Indiana's food pantries. The fund was created in 2008 to help offset deer processing costs. Harvested deer are dropped off at deer processors throughout the state. Last year, more than 70,000 pounds of ground deer meat went to food pantries. Hunters can find a processor in their area by searching at dnr.IN.gov/lawenfor/3987.htm.

The GiveIN Game Program was created in 2010 to help connect hunters to community members who want deer meat. This program works like an online telephone directory that allows hunters and community members to contact each other directly to donate or request deer meat. Last year, more

than 715 people participated, with the need for deer meat outweighing the offers.

All of us have experienced it for one reason or the other: death, terrible sickness in our own bodies or the bodies of those we love, divorce, the loss of a career. It comes in different guises, but in some form it always comes to everyone. It always does.

How best then can we deal with this emotional winter storm? This ripping and tearing at our stability. Some weep until there are no more tears left to cry with. Some try to drown their sorrow in a bottle or the impact of a pill. Some try to repress their heartache and, like a kettle with no escape valve, eventually explode.

Would you ease your own grieving time? Then go out, and though still hurting or remembering how badly once you hurt, use your personal knowledge of pain to help others.

THIS IS THE DAY - NOVEMBER 20, 2015

Few sensations in life can equal the rescuing relief one experiences following a gut-wrenching period of imminent danger. On November 20, 1962, the population of the entire globe joined in a gigantic chorus of, "Whew! That was close."

For weeks the world teetered on the cusp of World War III as two of the most powerful world leaders, President John Kennedy of the United States and Premier Nikita Khrushchev of the Soviet Union, engaged in a global one-upmanship of threats, bluffs and pitiable diplomacy. At question were the nuclear armed missiles in Cuba. The Soviets were adamant that they had as much right to place such in Cuba as the Americans did to have the same in Turkey.

For years the Cuban dictator Fidel Castro had been a thorn in Kennedy's side whose successful presidential election was significantly due to his promise to be tough on the autocrat. The poorly planned, disastrous Bay of Pigs Invasion had left him appearing as an insipid leader of the most powerful nation on earth. Khrushchev was having similar problems of his own in Russia where, contrasted to his predecessor Stalin, he appeared weak and indecisive.

Both men's ardent concerns to mend their respective public images were stampeding the world headlong off what appeared to be a nuclear cliff. The Soviets sent nuclear missiles toward Cuba, and the Americans imposed a blockade to prevent their arrival. Further alternatives were under consideration, options that would have ended in universal destruction.

Hawks in the US were urging Kennedy to immediately invade Cuba, assuming a presence of a mere 4–8 thousand Russian troops stationed there when in reality there were sixty thousand. For the communists' equally absurd consideration, Castro was imploring Khrushchev to allow him to use twelve nuclear missiles unknown to the Americans.

DEER REDUCTIONS

Select Indiana state parks will close temporarily to allow for controlled deer reductions in the coming weeks.

The dates for the temporary closings are Nov. 16 and 17, and Nov. 30 and Dec. 1. The state parks affected are Clifty Falls, Fort Harrison, Harmonie, Lincoln, McCormick's Creek, Ouabache, Pokagon, Potato Creek, Prophetstown, Shades,

Shakamak, Tippecanoe, Turkey Run and Versailles.

These state parks will close to the general public the evening before each of the two efforts and reopen the morning after each two-day reduction.

Only individual hunters drawn last September and those hunters they listed on their applications may participate in the hunts. There will be no standby drawings this year.

DNR biologists evaluate which parks require a reduction each year based on habitat recovery and previous harvest rates at each park. The state parks are home to more than 32 state-endangered plants and numerous significant natural communities.

The reductions help control browsing by deer to a level that helps maintain habitat throughout the state parks for all plants and animals.

Information on 2016 state park deer reductions, including online applications, will be available next summer at dnr.IN.gov/fishwild. The application deadline is usually the end of August.

How to donate blood

Simply download the American Red Cross Blood Donor App, visit redcrossblood.org or call 1-800-REDCROSS (1-800-7332767) to make an appointment or for more information. All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at checkin. Individuals who are 17 years of age (16 with parental consent in some states), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood donors can now save time at their next donation by using RapidPass to complete their predonation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, prior to arriving at the blood drive. To get started, visit redcrossblood.org/RapidPass and follow the instructions on the site.

The consequences of either action would have altered world history and maybe even the human race.

To their credit both Kennedy and Khrushchev saw the need for a more tactful and diplomatic approach to the impasse. A series exchanged letters began; Kennedy agreed to render the missiles in Turkey harmless (Obsolescent, they were to be dismantled within the year anyway.), and Khrushchev ordered his missile delivering ships back home.

Later important progressive developments resulted directly from this crisis. On June 20, 1963 a Hot Line was established between Moscow and DC that exists to this day (Today there are 11 such hot lines between differing nations.), and almost a year later the two nations that had been on the brink of a nuclear holocaust signed the Partial Test Ban Treaty.

Jeremiah recognized the importance of people like Kennedy and Khrushchev to set aside their own egos and redirect their energies toward the good of humankind when he quoted God's thoughts: "Let not the wise man glory in his wisdom; let not the mighty man glory in his might; let not the rich man glory in his riches; but let him who glories glory in this, that he understands and knows me, that I am the Lord who practices steadfast love, justice and righteousness, for in these things I delight."
