HELPING A CHILD HANDLE DISAPPOINTMENT

from the American Counseling Association

Disappointment comes to everyone. As adults we, hopefully, have learned that when people or activities may sometimes let us down, we can keep such things in perspective and find ways to overcome our dashed hopes.

But for children, disappointment can come in numerous forms. Even a seemingly minor hurt can often seem like such a complete disaster that the child truly has a difficult time accepting and dealing with it. And, in many cases, such as when a beloved pet dies or a close friend moves away, the hurt can be very real and deep and won't disappear easily.

While responding to childhood disappointments can seem difficult, there are solid reasons to do it in a good way. We can make our child feel less sad, avoid more serious emotional issues, and, when we respond well, we help open communication that can strengthen the child - parent relationship.

How do you begin to respond to a child's disappointment? Listening is step one. Don't minimize or discount the story your child has to tell, even if it seems trivial to you. It's very real to your child, and a response such as, "That's no big deal," or, "You'll forget about it by tomorrow," only serves to convince your child that you don't really understand or even care.

You also don't want to hurry in with a pleasant experience or reward to make the hurt go away. This can establish flawed patterns that carry over into adulthood and can present very real future problems.

Instead, talk "with" your child, rather than "to" him or her. Don't begin an interrogation when something seems wrong but instead tell him or her in a gentle way that you've noticed they're unhappy and encourage them to tell you what has happened.

Don't be judgmental about what is being reported but instead offer sympathy and understanding. Let your child know you empathize because you've suffered your own disappointments. Don't try to top your child's story, but instead listen and sympathize. Just being able to share can do much to minimize the hurt.

In some cases, being a good listener may not be enough. If you notice a persistent change in behavior over time, and if your child is refusing to talk about what's wrong, it may be appropriate to seek help from a trained professional counselor. Your child's school counselor is always a good place to start.

YQCA WORKSHOP

One of the new Indiana 4-H livestock requirements is that youth must become YQCA certified (Youth for the Quality Care of Animals) in order to exhibit at any county fair and the Indiana State Fair. The requirement is for members exhibiting beef cattle, dairy cattle, dairy beef, dairy feeder calf, goat, poultry, rabbit, sheep and swine. 4-H members exhibiting horse & pony, llama, alpaca, dog and cat do not need to be certified.

Much like Pork Quality Assurance Plus (PQA+) did for swine exhibitors, this educational experience will ensure 4-H members learn about quality assurance and best management practices with their animals.

Goals of the program include:

- Youth will be more prepared to be ambassadors for animal agriculture in their role as youth livestock exhibitors.

- Animals from youth livestock programs are treated with utmost care.

- 4-H members are contributing to a safe, wholesome food supply.

Youth who are PQA (Pork Quality Assurance) certified should check their certification expiration dates. The date will be honored within the YQCA system as long as the certification has not expired as of the date of the livestock show.

4-H families should go to the yqca.org web page and log in with their 4-H Online System password. Select a date and location to register. Members can also choose to do the certification online. Cost of the in person workshops are \$3 per person

and the online version is \$12. Fees for the program were established by the company who has developed the workshop and online materials.

If you are unable to take the training in Wells County and do not wish to take the training online, you may register and attend a workshop at any of the locations listed in the YQCA web page.

Most counties have received some FREE coupon codes for the YQCA trainings. These are the \$3 coupons for the in person training for any location/date. These coupons are provided by funds from the Indiana State Department of Agriculture and the Indiana 4-H Program. Stop by or call the Extension Office for a coupon. You will need the coupon prior to registration (which must be done online).

Following review of a contract from the State of Indiana for sweeping of SR 5 and SR 218 within the corporation limits of the Town for \$540 for each of two years, Glessner moved, seconded by Buzzard, to sign the contract. The motion was approved unanimously.

Brown moved, seconded Buzzard, to re-appoint Stivers to the 3-A Board of Directors. The motion was approved unanimously.

Utility Manager Poulson reviewed that status of continuing education hours for three employees holding water and/or sewer licensing through the State noting that all were on pace to meet the timelines. Poulson holds two water licenses and a sewer license, Fortney holds a water and a sewer license, and Surfus holds a water license.

The Salamonie Summer Festival Parade will be June 29th with the annual Fireworks on July 3rd at

Tower Park. Many other activities being planned.

Morrison reviewed the financial status of the Electric Utility Fund.

Marshal Spitler submitted the Monthly Activity Report. Glessner requested that Council consider appointment of Deputy Caley to Assistant Town Marshal. No action taken pending submission of additional information.

Poulson, as Fire Chief, submitted the department's Monthly Activity Report and reported that Jackson Township of Wells County had donated \$10,000 toward the purchase of the tanker in addition to the annual contract fee of \$5500. The local department provides contractual fire service to the Township. It is expected that the Tanker will be delivered in April.

Poulson, as Utility Manager, reviewed the proposed replacement of highway street lights on each side Town. Further information from INDOT would be necessary to determine whether fiberglass or aluminum poles could be used and then quotes will be collected. The problem status of the RAZ pumps at the Wastewater Plan is worsening and parts are not

available due to the age of the pumps. Poulson is to solicit bids for replacement. Expected cost of \$80,000.

With the purchase of a new Electric Utility Service Truck, Poulson submitted that the older truck be kept for use such as leaf vacuuming and other uses as it is a 4X4. The box of the truck would have to be replaced at an estimated cost of \$8,000.

The other option is to sell the truck as is. No decision was made by Council.

Poulson is representing the Town at the Flood Mitigation Meetings being held by Huntington County Emergency Management. The plan is being formulated
