### MAJOR CHANGES

The Warren Baseball & Softball league would like to take this opportunity to announce some major changes that will be taking place with the league for this 2012 season.

The League was informed this past week by the KBC Board that the Civic Center will be taking the T-Ball and Coaches Pitch leagues over this year.

Because these were our fundraising leagues, we have had to come up with a plan that should keep most of the sponsors who still wish to sponsor in the Warren Baseball League and we will not have to raise entry fees for the parents.

The leagues are being revamped, based on current #'s in each of the age groups. There will now be an American League for boys aged 8-10, a National League for boys aged 11-13, Pony League for boys aged 14-17. # KNIGHT-BERGMAN CENTER BASEBALL


(T-Ball & Coaches Pitch)

### **L**EARN THE **B**ASICS

The 4-H Electric Project in Indiana is a project that teaches the basics of electricity with some practical hands-on activities and projects. In the first year of the project, youth learn to make a simple circuit board and then conduct a Hazard Hunt to look at electric hazards.

The second year of the Electric Project has members making a magnetic powered flashlight or they may do a poster on one of the topics in the manual such as magnets, transformers, and direction of electric flow. Third year Electric Project members learn to check the circuits in their home, repair an extension cord or light plug and then exhibit a trouble light or extension cord at the 4-H Fair.

In the fourth year of the Electric Project, members learn about light, direct and reflected glare, shadows and how they affect our ability to see and types of lights for different tasks. Youth can rebuild or build a lamp for exhibition at the 4-H Fair. In year five and above, youth may select a variety of topics to learn about. Some of these include: Heating and cooling,

lighting, electronics, consumer buyer, power generation and careers. 4-H members may exhibit a written report, poster, chart, notebook, display or some type of electronic unit or equipment.

Supplies for the electric project are available at the Extension Office for years 1 to 4. Youth may become 4-H members when they enter third grade and may continue their membership through the completion of grade 12. Each individual may continue membership for a maximum of ten (10) consecutive years.

4-H enrollment forms are available on the internet at www.extension.purdue.edu/wells or at the Wells County Extension Office at 260-824-6412. 4-H enrollments forms are due April 1, 2012.

### MINI 4-H TIME

Youth in first and second grades are invited to join in the fun of Mini 4-H and exhibit a project at the Wells County 4-H Fair, July 14-19. Mini 4-H members are encouraged to enroll in one of the various projects of their choice. The projects include: Collections, Crafts, Dinosaurs, Farm Animals, Foods, Horse & Pony, Models, My Pet and Me, Plants and Flowers, Sewing, Whales & Dolphins, and Rabbit.

Participants complete the project during the summer and bring it to the Wells County 4-H Fair, July 14-19. Mini 4-H members are also invited to



the annual Mini 4-H Round Up which will be held in June at the 4-H Park in Bluffton. Information about Mini 4-H has been distributed to all Wells County first and second grade students in the public schools. Parents with children interested in Mini 4-H should have their child return the official Mini 4-H card to their school teacher. 4-H officials will then collect the enrollment cards at the schools.

Parents of home schooled youth or children who missed getting a form at school may contact the Wells County Office of the Purdue Cooperative Extension Service, 260-824-6412. The office is located in the Wells County 4-H Park in Bluffton. Office hours are 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM, Monday through Friday. Final sign up for Mini 4-H is May 1st.

# COVER CROPS GROWER UPDATE

The Blackford County Extension Service is hosting a Cover Crops Grower Update on March 12 at the Blackford County Fairgrounds, 310 E Park Avenue, Hartford City at 6:30 p.m. This program will feature experts discussing the basics of cover crops, options, the importance of soil health, and much more. A complete program agenda can be found

www.extension.purdue.edu/blackford or by contacting the Purdue Extension Office at 765-348-3213. This program will count for PARP for those producers seeking private pesticide applicator credits.

### PROPOSED CHANGES

Last fall the U.S. Department of Labor proposed regulation changes that would have a

major effect on youth employed in agriculture. The proposed changes were intended to protect children from dangerous situations.

Some of the work mentioned in the proposed changes involved powered equipment and animal husbandry. Youth in rural communities have traditionally worked on their parents' farm or on neighboring farms performing many different tasks. Individuals and aggroups were very concerned after reading the proposed changes that farmers would no longer be able to hire young men and women to help out with some tasks such as hay baling.

On Feb. 1 the U.S. Department of Labor temporarily shelved the proposed changes after hearing many concerns.

Bill Field, a Purdue farmsafety specialist, said "Because the proposed rule changes are 51 pages long, I don't know that many people understand exactly what's being presented. The changes not only hold the potential for positive but also significant negative effects to youth less than 16 years old who seek employment or are currently employed in agriculture."

Educational programs such 4-H and the FFA's Supervised Agricultural Experience program, in which some students work on a farm or in some other agricultural business, also could be affected by the proposed changes, Field said.

While Field doesn't believe the rules are ready to be passed in their current form, he said it's time to update farm youth labor legislation. Current rules have not been updated since the 1960s.

"Even though there are significant concerns with many of the proposed rule changes,

there is a need to review and revise the current rules to reflect changes in agricultural production practices and technology since the original rules were adopted more than 45 years ago," Field said.

The public comment period has passed, but those in favor of and opposed to the new legislation still have time to make their voices heard. Field encouraged those in agriculture to read about what's being proposed and contact legislators with their thoughts.



Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis are chronic digestive disorders of the intestines. These illnesses are collectively known as inflammatory bowel diseases, or IBD, because many of their symptoms and complications are similar. It is estimated that some 1.4 million Americans suffer from IBD, with approximately 30,000 new cases diagnosed each year.

- Risk and benefits of medication, surgery, and integrative treatments in IBD
- Impact of treatment adherence on disease management and quality of life
- Talking with your health care team about your treatment plan
