OFFERING AG EDUCATION

program for the Haupert Institute for Agricultural Studies. Huntington University is one of only two higher education institutions in Indiana that offer fouryear degrees in agriculture.

"We are very pleased that agricultural new education program has been approved by the Indiana Department of Education. This new major will allow us to expand our support for the agricultural sector in Indiana. There is currently a shortage

of agriculture teachers in Indiana high schools and this program joins our already strong offerings in education and agribusiness," stated Dr. Michael Wanous, president for academic affairs and dean of the faculty.




