THE FOREIGNER

Opens at the Pulse

Charlie needs a vacation. The pathologically shy Englishman arrives at a fishing lodge in rural Georgia hoping for some quiet time but finds that it is anything but peaceful. His eccentric old army buddy "Froggy" convinces everyone that Charlie is from an exotic foreign country and speaks no English. The locals find Charlie exciting and exotic. Some, however, say the most extraordinary things in front of him. Some even share some secrets. After all, he doesn't speak English!

The Foreigner by Larry Shue was written in 1984 and won two Obie Awards and two Outer Critics Circle Awards, including Best New American Play and Best Off-Broadway Production. The Roundabout Theatre Company in New York staged a 2004 revival starring Matthew Broderick.

This is the second time the Pulse has produced this play.

The 2005 production included current cast members Matt Stephenson and Julie Turney.

Originally Matt played the Rev. David Marshall Lee, but this time he is taking on the role of Charlie. Julie Turney is recreating her role as Betty Meeks. Most recently Matt and Julie appeared on the Pulse as Otto and Edith Frank in The Diary of Anne Frank.

Performances are scheduled for Sept. 18, 19, 20, 25, 26, 27 and Oct. 2, 3, 4. Tickets are \$15 for general admission and \$5 for children 12 and under.

Friday and Saturday shows are at 8:00 p.m. Sunday shows are at 4:00 p.m. The theatre is located at 127 1/2 Wayne Street

The Van Buren Town Council met on Wednesday evening, September 2 in the Council Room at Town Hall. President Marvin Surber opened the meeting at 7 p.m.

Matthew Patterson was given the oath of office as a new reserve deputy for the Van Buren Police Department.

Officer Pat Collins reported the town had given notification for an ordinance violation to be taken to court. Collins is expected to send out more notices.

Council voted to hire a second part time Deputy Brant Beebe.

Donnie Plummer gave the Utility report. He said crews had inspected and cleaned the detention take at the water plant.

There are two wells at the plant and a quote for the project was \$5,000. By local employees doing the job the cost was \$3,800.

Citizens in attendance at the meeting asked if local attorneys are still working on the nuisance violations. They were assured work is continuing on the matter.

It was reported that ADA compliance curbs are expected to be installed in March.

The grant for the new fire station is expected to be received at a later date.

The next Council meeting is set for September 16.

PREVENTING SUICIDE

September 7th-13th is National Suicide Prevention Week.

On average, one American completes suicide every 12.8 minutes. In Indiana, more people die by suicide than homicide. The Indiana Youth Institute recently released alarming statistics about teen suicide in Indiana: 19% of Indiana teens reported they had considered suicide in the past year, with 11% reporting a suicide attempt. According to Dr. Melissa Butler, psychologist at the IU School of Medicine, "Teen suicide is the second leading cause of death and remains a serious health concern. Yet, suicidal teens often are not getting the specialized mental health services they need."

In addition to teens, other groups at higher risk for suicide are the elderly, young adults, veterans, and those struggling with mental illness or substance abuse. Dr. Yelena Chernyak, a psychologist at the IU School of Medicine notes that, "Individuals who are most vulnerable to suicide may experience mental, physical, or substance use disorders. Effective prevention efforts to decrease suicide risk include providing effective clinical care for their medical conditions as well as family and community support."

Most suicidal individuals do not want to die; they just want to end the pain. Suicidal crises tend to be brief, so early detection of suicidal behaviors can save lives. The following are warning signs of a possible suicide:

Suicidal ideation or plan. This includes threatening to hurt or kill oneself, talking or writing about it, or looking for ways (e.g. seeking firearms).

Hopelessness. Feelings of hopelessness about the future are more predictive of suicide than feelings of sadness or depression.

Recklessness. Engaging in risky activities, seemingly without thinking.

Withdrawal. Withdrawing from family, friends, and society.

Increased alcohol or drug use. Individuals who abuse alcohol or drugs are at a much higher risk for suicide.

Changes in sleep pattern. Being unable to sleep or sleeping all the time.

Access to guns. Those with access to guns are more likely to complete suicide.

If you suspect someone you know may be at risk for suicide:

- Do not be afraid to ask. Talking about suicide does not increase the risk of suicide.

- Offer your support and guidance. Listen but don't judge.

- Offer hope that alternatives are available and provide resources. For example, go with the individual to a physician or mental health professional, or provide them with a crisis line phone number.
- Take action! Get help from an individual or agency who specializes in crisis intervention and suicide prevention.

Individuals who have attempted suicide in the past are statistically more likely to make another attempt. Indiana psychologist Dr. Carrie Cadwell notes the following: "According to the Center for Disease Control, for every 1 completed suicide there are 25 attempts. So in the United States, in Indiana, there are many more individuals with the lived experience of surviving suicide."

We must ensure that the mental health workforce is sufficiently trained to treat suicidality and support those who have attempted in their recovery journey. Many local agencies have joined the Zero Suicide Initiative as a way to begin to work towards meeting those goals."

HOW TO BE THERE WHEN A FRIEND NEEDS HELP

from the American Counseling Association
Relatives are important to most of us, despite the fact that they're people we're sort of stuck with as a side-effect of being born into a particular family. But friendships can be just as important, or even more important, because our friends are people we've chosen to have a relationship with.

Friends are people we value, care about and with whom we want to feel close. All of that is why it can be very upsetting when we discover or observe something troubling about a friend. It can be a struggle trying to decide whether to confront our friend directly or to avoid the issue in case we're wrong and might damage the friendship.

But the bottom line is you do want to help if this is someone you truly care about. It's therefore important to find ways to discuss the potential problem while minimizing the chances of ruining the friendship.

A starting point to make this happen is to meet privately and make clear this is a conversation just between the two of you.

Begin by describing objectively the behavior that concerns you. Don't be judgmental or try to interpret what you've seen.

Stick to facts and observations, rather than your personal opinions. Say "You seem easily upset recently," rather than a judgmental statement such as, "It bugs me how crabby you've been lately!"

Keep your description positive, rather than negative and accusatory. Objectively state the facts in a manner that other friends would agree to if asked their opinions.

The next part is to give your friend a chance to agree with or explain what you've observed. Make it an opportunity to discuss the issue.

Saying "You seem unhappy recently. Is anything wrong?" opens the door for discussion without positioning you as an authority who will make everything right. You may find that what you've reported is something your friend is unaware of, or that he or she has an explanation that eliminates your concerns.

If this "one-two" approach does have your friend verifying your concerns, you may find that simply talking things out may help fix the issue. Or there may be a bigger problem that requires professional help.

The key, however, is not to be confrontational. Give your friend encouragement and support, and be ready to assist in finding the needed help. With a positive approach you'll help your friend and continue a strong friendship.
