VIETNAM MEMORIAL WEBSITE

It's been 28 years since the official end of the Vietnam War, 42 years since it's official beginning for the United States. In the course of the 14 years of the war Indiana lost 1,531 young men and women, 16 of them from Huntington County.

Now the Huntington County Veterans' Service Office announces a new addition to their website which honors the Hoosier servicemen and women lost during the war in Vietnam. It also is meant to stand as a tribute and thanks to those who came home alive to their families

Out of Indiana's 92 counties, 88 of them lost men and women during the war. As of the date of this release 17 counties, including Huntington County, have been completed on the website. The public is invited to check back periodically to the site while it is under construction to see which counties have been added.

Each entry on the website lists the service member's name,

branch of service, rank, date of birth, hometown, date of death, place of death and whether the death was hostile (in action against the enemy) or non-hostile.



KUDOS, KICKS & KARATS

Do the soldiers wear backward flags?

With troops getting a lot of air time during the past weeks, many keeneyed observers have noticed something strange about the patches on their uniforms.

The flag patches seem to be backward.

To be more specific, the flag patches on each soldier's right shoulder do not follow the convention for displaying Old Glory. The American flag flies so that the blue field, or standard, is at the top, closest to the pole. If carried into battle, as was the practice in ancient times, the flag bearer leads with the stars.

However, if the flag is not affixed to a pole, the standard should be on the top left. Sharp-eyed readers will notice the problem.

If the flag patch on the soldier's right arm were fastened according to convention, the soldier would be rushing into battle with the stripes facing forward. This would never do.

The military thus makes an exception for the display of the flag on the right shoulders of soldiers.

DIABETES AND GUM DISEASE

Should diabetics have any special dental concerns? Yes. Men and women with diabetes are more likely to

develop periodontal, or gum disease and to get it more severely.

Periodontal disease is the leading cause of tooth loss in adults. An estimated eighty-five percent of the population has the disease to some degree. Diabetics accumulate more plaque, possibly because they produce less saliva that washes plaque away. Diabetics by definition have higher sugar levels in their oral fluids, which affect the composition of plaque and other microorganisms. Diabetics have less collagen, which is a protein that supports the gums, skins, tendon cartilage and bone. Diabetics tend to lose collagen in the gum tissue, aiding the progress of periodontal disease. Decreased circulation in tiny blood vessels in the gums interferes with nutrition and the healing process in the gum tissue. The good news is that the gums of a person who is in control of his or her diabetes usually react in a fairly normal manner. Regular dental visits will help prevent the start of periodontal disease.





SHEEP ID DAY




