Who Goes Hungry?

Food insecurity refers to the USDA's measurement of a lack of access to enough food for an active, healthy life for all members of a given household.

Together, federal nutrition programs and the charitable food system weave a comprehensive nutrition safety net reaching food individuals insecure different income levels and in different settings

Hunger and health are quickly approaching and it is 1103 N Huntington Ave, deeply connected. People who are food insecure are disproportionately affected by diet-sensitive chronic diseases such as diabetes and high blood pressure. According to research, food insecurity is also linked to many adverse effects to overall health.

> Hunger can affect people from all walks of life. Many

Americans are one job loss or medical crisis away from food insecurity - but some people, including children and seniors, may be at greater risk of hunger than others.

Nationally the food insecurity rate is 13.8%, which means that 1 in 8 Americans face hunger. In Huntington County, the food insecurity rate is 12.8%. This means that 4,730 of our neighbors face hunger. To close that meal gap at the cost of \$2.39 a meal, would require additional an \$1,995,000.

How can you help to combat hunger in our community?

There are several opportunities to help by sharing your time, talents and resources.

 Hoosiers Feeding the Hungry pays the processing fees to process large game and livestock at participating processors. On average, a donated pig can provide 400 meals and the average cow can provide 2,000 meals. We have processors in our area that are registered with Hoosiers Feeding the Hungry. They are Vining Slaughter Haus, WW Locker and Lengerich Meats. 


