The May 1 billing for Warren will reflect two utility rate changes. The Water Utility rate will show an increase and the Electric Utility will see a decrease. As water usage is on a tiered system of charges and is based on the size of the meter, the percentage increase will not be the same for every user.

People dealing with lingering symptoms of COVID-19 may be eligible for referral to a new clinic created to help restore patients to their pre-COVID function.

The new Parkview Post-COVID Clinic, led by the Parkview Physicians Group (PPG) - Neurology team, will
