boomers, generally defined as those born between 1946 and 1964, make up a significant portion of Red Cross blood donors. However, as this population gets older they may be less able to give blood on a regular basis. "We will be depending on a new generation of blood donors to take their place," Whitman added.

The Red Cross offers opportunities to engage youth. Programs like Pint Size Heroes help build awareness and provide blood donor recruitment opportunitiesamongelementary and middle school-age children. In addition, high school and college-age students have the opportunity to sponsor blood drives at their schools, form and join Red Cross clubs and to donate blood if they are eligible.

"America needs our younger population to step forward and commit to building and maintaining our nation's blood supply." said Whitman. "Engaging them early is a great way to build awareness and get them involved in the act of giving. It's all about passing the baton to the next generation."

CHAUTAUQUA

On February 8, 2013, President Karen Hunnicutt welcomed everyone to the Chautauqua Literary and Scientific Circle meeting in the Calico Room at Heritage Pointe. The members "Dressed to the 9's" with their hats, gloves, dresses, jewelry, etc. to honor the traditions of the past members.

The Collect was repeated, Secretary and Treasure reports were given and approved. Karen suggested a voluntary contribution by any member to be given to the school's Bible Trailer organization at a future meeting. Roll call response was "My 1st date", bringing back many memorable occasions, and also telling about the hats with much humor.

Kitty Throop also brought back memories of the Chautauqua Circle by looking into the past-the history of Chautaugua—and into the present and the future.

Lewis Miller and John Vincent saw the need for a program of training for Sunday School teachers, and in 1874 initiated the program in Mayville, N.Y., near Jamestown, N.Y. They first located on 50+ acres, but as news spread of the Chautaugua Institute as a school for the masses, it had, by 1875, grown to 740 acres. It offered a 4 year

course of study after which you would be tested, and receive your diploma in New York. Women who were seeking knowledge and inspiration all over the country met and studied together, then traveled to N.Y., mainly by train, for their diplomas after taking the tests. The collective inspirations flowing through these organized channels have produced wonderful results both in selfculture and in the notions of community service.

Chautaugua became the 1st organized Reading Circle in the country, and in 1884 became the first organized club in Huntington County. Programs to study, and traveling programs, were dispersed throughout the country by the Chautaugua Institute beginning with study of the Bible, Shakespeare. Great books and Masterpieces. There were also some permanent Chautauquas built throughout the country with hotels, tabernacles, cottages, homes, all dedicated to study art, music, personal growth. Fountain Park outside of Remington, In, is one such permanent structure in our

Kitty and her husband had the privilege of spending time at Chautaugua Lake in N.Y. in the 90's, and she gave a marvelous description of "A Day in the Life" during a one week study group stay there. The studies, commaradarie, stillness, beauty, and inspiration were enthralling. A Sacred Song Service was held every Sunday evening, and it always closed with singing "Day is Dying in the West" tune. SOUTHERN WELLS FFA TEAM WINS NATIONAL WESTERN

The Southern Wells FFA Livestock Judging Team won first place at the National Western Round-up Livestock Judging contest in Denver, Colorado on January 12, 2013. Bringing back the first place hardware were team members Jayde Sills, Jackson Johnson, Justin Penrod, and Jordyn Sills. They won the contest by scoring an outstanding 2260 points setting a National Western record for largest margin of victory, 85 points ahead of the second place Kansas team.

Collectively the team won the cattle, swine, sheep, and reasons divisions and placed second in goats. The team had three members in the top six overall individually. Jordyn placed first individually overall by winning the sheep, swine, and reasons divisions. Jayde tied for second overall winning the cattle and goat divisions. Jackson was sixth overall placing ninth in cattle, ninth in swine, and fifth in reasons. Justin placed eighteenth overall and ranked seventh in cattle, ninth in swine, and fourteenth in reasons.

The team spent several days in preparation for the contest in Denver. They traveled to Casper, Wyoming for sheep and cattle practice at the Burch Ranch and Casper College. The team evaluated cattle and toured Magnum Feed Yards. Participation in the Colorado State University judging workshop was the final preparation for the contest.

Southern Wells represented Indiana at this national contest by winning the state event last May. This is actually the second win in Denver. Southern Wells FFA sponsored the 4-H team that won in 2008. Jayde was a member of that team. Randy Mounsey, livestock judging coach, and the team members are extremely grateful for the encouragement and financial support from local businesses as well as members of the community.

FFA and 4-H members learn leadership and career skills by participating in judging CDE (Career Development Events). They study specific technical information, make decisions based on the information and verbally justify their decisions. FFA membership is open to all students of agriculture education.

stroke. The most common heart ailment is coronary artery disease (CAD) which leads to heart attack. CAD is a narrowing of the small blood vessels that supply blood and oxygen to the heart. CAD can most easily be prevented with lifestyle changes, like consuming less salt, and staying away from secondhand smoke.

Heart disease is also the number one killer of women. The National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute's (NHLBI) The Heart Truth campaign focuses on women's heart disease prevention and hopes to give women a wake up call about their risk of heart disease. Heart disease can build gradually, so even young women must know the signs and prevention tips so they can stop the process before it is too late.

Symptoms of heart disease include chest pain or discomfort, which can make your heart feel heavy, or as if someone is squeezingit. Shortness of breath, fatigue and general weakness are also signs. While many people do feel these symptoms, some people with heart disease won't experience any of them. Doctors can also run certain tests before making a diagnosis.

Overspending/

The January poll hosted on the National Foundation for Credit Counseling (NFCC) website asked consumers if they had a spending problem, savings problem, neither or both. The overwhelming majority, 62%, identified themselves as having problems related to both spending and saving.

"The good news is that having a problem with both spending and savings is actually just one problem: spending," said Gail Cunningham, spokesperson for the NFCC. "The bad news is that overspending is often tied to deep-rooted behavior, making it very difficult to change."

Consumers are showing signs of a willing ness to begin spendingagain, as according to Gallup, monthly spending hit a four-year high this past December. As further proof of an increased comfort level with spending, the National Retail Federation projected that Super Bowl spending would likely reach \$12.3 billion this year, or close to \$70 per consumer related to this one event. The spending wasn't confined to chips, dips and wings, but extended to big ticket items with 7.5 million households expected to buy a new TV for the big game, compared to 5.1 million last

The NFCC cautions consumers that they may have jumped back into spending at the wrong time. Since paychecks are now smaller due to the increase in the Social Security payroll tax, increased spending coupled with less money available is an obvious recipe for financial disaster. The foundation of financial stability is to spend smartly and save

regularly. When spending becomes an impediment to saving, it needs to be recognized and dealt with.

To help identify the danger signals associated with overspending, the NFCC encourages consumers to consider the following 10 warning signs to determine if spending is under control or out of control. People identifying with these actions are advised to seek help immediately, as the problem will not resolve itself.

- Purchases hidden from others.Bills paid late or ignored.
- · Checking accounts routinely overdrawn.
- · Credit essential to maintain current lifestyle level.
- ·Unwillingtoreviewhow money is spent.
- · Unaware of how much is owed. · Items routinely purchased, and then returned.
- · Shopping used as a salve for emotional stress.
- Unwilling to set financial goals.
 Afraid to check credit report and score.

"Spending and saving should be able to peacefully coexist in a budget," added Cunningham. "Success lies in balancing these two seemingly competing forces."
