### YOU DO DESERVE THE SUCCESS YOU'VE EARNED

from the American Counseling Association  
 It's a feeling that affects both men and women. You've achieved success at work, with a community organization, or just within your family, and yet you don't feel you've really earned that achievement.

You may think that your accomplishments come from luck or good timing rather than any real talent and hard work on your part. You may feel like a fraud, not really capable of the tasks facing you.

Having these thoughts is fairly common. They're manifestations of self-doubt and a lack of self-confidence, and there's even a psychological term to describe them -- "imposter syndrome."

It's not a psychological disorder but rather a descriptive name developed in the late 1970s. Researchers and clinicians found that they were seeing people who had strong accomplishments yet were often convinced they didn't deserve the success they had won.

It happens to many of us. We may have trouble believing we are as intelligent and talented as we really are. The result can be our crediting outside reasons or forces as to why a good thing is occurring, rather than accepting that we actually made it happen ourselves.

Such feelings can become a problem when feeling like an impostor gets in the way of our daily lives. We might be afraid or even frozen when facing a work presentation or speech at a big meeting. We may question or avoid the decisions we need to make regarding our children and family.

Professional counselors report that they have seen this self-questioning and lack of confidence in everyone from managers of large businesses to stay-at-home moms.

However, there are ways to overcome impostor syndrome. A starting point is to step back and look objectively at your accomplishments. Make a list of positive things, big and small, you've accomplished in the past year. Then own those accomplishments. Give yourself credit for the work and talent that achieved those successes.

Research has shown that simply talking to yourself can change how you see yourself. Tell yourself that you are worthy in all aspects of your life. Tell yourself that you are

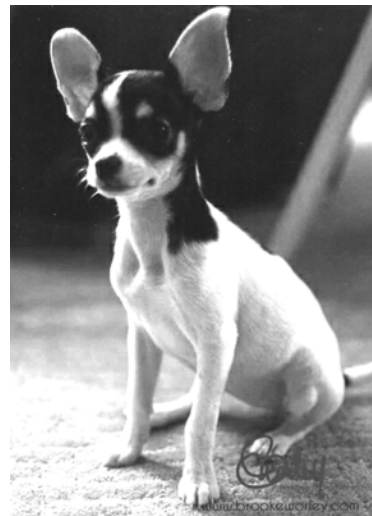

In an effort to update and improve our cable TV system, Citizens Telephone/Warren Cable will be moving all channels to a digital format. Currently all channels are in analog format and several are rebroadcast in a clear digital format. What this means to you is that you must have a "digital ready" TV, not an older analog style. If you have a newer TV all you need to do is rescan your channels after we have made the switch.

Steps to determine if your TV is "digital" or "analog":

1. Consider the age of your television. If your TV was made after March 1, 2007, it must include a digital tuner to be in compliance with a FCC rule prohibiting the manufacture of any device containing an analog tuner unless it also contained a digital tuner. If your TV was purchased any earlier than 2007, it more than likely is an analog TV.
2. Look for an HDTV logo on the front of your TV. A digital TV will most always have something that will identify it as digital. The label could also have a marker containing the words "Integrated Digital Tuner", "Digital Tuner Built-in", "Digital Receiver", "DTV" or "NTSC". Our cable system is "NTSC". If you cannot find any one of these logos, it is more than likely an analog TV.
3. Digital TV's are also lighter in weight and most have a flat screen. The analog TV's are much heavier and larger in size because of the CRT (Cathode Ray Tube).

After determining what style of TV you have, there are a couple of things you must do after we make the switch to all digital. If you already have a digital TV it will be necessary for you to run your channel scan option found in the menu or setup option in your TV. This will automatically find all the digital channels and save them for you. If you go shopping for a new TV, make sure it has a coaxial input. If it does not, you are only purchasing a monitor. It cannot be called a TV unless it has a tuner built in. **If you determine that you are still watching on an analog TV, please call our office prior to the switch date for options available to you.**

Please note that after scanning, some of the channels may move to different locations in the lineup. We will have new Channel Lineups available once we have made the switch. In some instances, we will not know ahead of schedule where the receiver will "tune-in" to the digital location. Please be aware that during this upgrade, several of the channels will be unavailable throughout the process.

**We will be making this switch on Monday July 29<sup>th</sup>. Please plan ahead and be prepared.** We will continue to post updates on our Facebook page, Channel 8 and the Warren Weekly. As always, Citizens Telephone & Warren Cable are here to assist you in any way that we can.

New Zealand. This area is best known for the production of kiwi fruit.

The entrance to the bay is identified by a solitary hill named, Mount Maunganui. A truly healthy person can hoof around it in 1.5 hours. If only I did not have this lingering "cold." The area also has geothermal pools at "Hell's Gate Thermal Reserve." This feature might have helped cure my medical condition. I lost out!

This area is also the gateway to the village of Rotorua which is the center for the Maori culture. In earlier years, wars between Maori tribes were a common event.

The intent was to secure a better food source for their tribal members. This reminds me of birds that tussle for position on our local bird feeder.

We elected to avoid an onshore excursion in favor of resting and soaking up some more of the southern hemisphere sunshine. An isolated deck on level #12 was discovered for our visit with the sun rays. With a temperature finally above the 60s, 73 degrees with very little wind was a treat.

We were instructed to have our suitcases outside the stateroom door by 11:15pm. in the evening to expedite tomorrow's disembarkation.

So done and they disappeared. Hope to find them tomorrow!

Learn how to prevent damage and protect your family's safety from these common hazards.

#### Landscaping

Lush, well-developed trees provide valuable curb appeal, but they can also be dangerous in storm conditions. Although it's virtually impossible to fully prevent damage from falling branches or even entire trees, you can minimize the risk. Prune trees regularly to maintain a safe distance from the house and power lines, and eliminate dead trees or damaged branches that are more susceptible to high winds. Take a similar approach with any large shrubs, bushes or other vegetation that could cause damage to your home or vehicles.

#### Decorative Features

The strong winds that accompany many storms can turn everyday items in your yard into airborne hazards. If items like decorations and patio furniture aren't secured, bring them in or safely secure them before the storm hits. Also check for decorative features like shutters, which can shake loose in a strong wind and cause significant damage to your home's exterior.

#### Propane Tanks

Numerous variations of severe weather, including floods and strong winds, can cause falling tree limbs or other debris to impair or

even destroy a propane tank. More important than the property damage are the potential safety risks, such as gas leaks. In addition to trimming back landscaping that could fall onto a tank, also have a service technician survey your tank for possible risk factors, such as rust, loose fittings or faulty valves.

#### Doors and Windows

Poorly fitted or sealed doors and windows are especially vulnerable in a storm. They can invite leaks or, even worse, blow in completely when weakened by blustery force. It's a good idea to give all openings to your home a careful review at least a couple of times a year and again after any major weather event.

For additional information on preparing for severe weather conditions, visit Propane.com/Safety.

#### 10 Storm Safety Tips

If your home uses propane, consider these tips from the Propane Education & Research Council to help keep your family safe.

1. Create an emergency contact list with information for your propane supplier and emergency services, along with instructions for turning off propane, electricity and water. If you do need to turn off your propane, contact a service technician to inspect your propane system prior to turning it back on.

2. Consider installing UL-listed propane gas detectors and carbon monoxide detectors, which provide you with an additional measure of security. Be sure to follow the manufacturer's instructions regarding installation, location and maintenance.

3. If you can hear thunder, you are close enough to the storm to be struck by lightning. Metal objects such as propane tanks and equipment, tractors and telephone lines can conduct electricity. Do not go near them. If you are caught outside and cannot get to a safe dwelling, find a low-lying, open place away from trees, poles or metal objects. Make sure the place you choose is not subject to flooding.

4. In the event of a flood, shut off the gas. Turn off the main gas supply valve on your propane tank if it is safe to do so. To close the valve, turn it to the right (clockwise). Also, it's typically a good idea to turn off the gas supply valves located near individual indoor appliances. Before you attempt to use any of your propane appliances again, have a propane retailer or qualified service technician check the entire system to ensure it is leak-free.

5. If a tornado is approaching, immediately take action. If you are inside your home or a building, go to the lowest level possible such as a basement or a storm cellar. If there is no basement, go to the center of an interior room on the lowest level. If you are in a mobile home, trailer or vehicle, get out immediately and seek shelter in a sturdy building or storm shelter.

6. After the storm passes and it is safe to do so, check the entire area for damaged gas lines or damage to your propane tank. High winds and hail can move, shift or damage gas lines and tanks. If it is dark, use flashlights, not candles. Immediately call your local utility company or propane retailer if any of these hazards exist. Do not attempt repairs yourself.

7. Never use outdoor propane appliances like portable heaters, barbecue grills or generators indoors or in enclosed areas, particularly during a power outage. This can result in carbon monoxide poisoning or potentially death. Never store, place or use a propane cylinder indoors or in enclosed areas such as a basement, garage, shed or tent.

8. Inspect propane appliances for water or other damage, if it is safe to do so. If the appliances have electric components and have been exposed to water, they can create a fire hazard. Do not turn on a light switch, use any power source or inspect your household appliances while standing in water. This can result in electrocution.

9. Schedule a time for a qualified service technician to perform a complete inspection of your propane system if you suspect any of your propane appliances, equipment or vehicles have been underwater or damaged, or you have turned off your gas supply. Never use or operate appliances, equipment or vehicles, or turn on the gas supply, until your system has been inspected by a qualified service technician.
