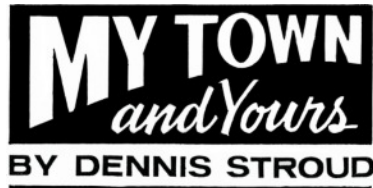

insider's view on the Texan way of life with "Amen Amigo" and delivers life lessons courtesy of an old vaquero with the title track. On the poignant "Diamonds & Daughters," he opens up his heart for his little girl. Listeners have come to know Watson's pragmatic style and authenticity as an artist over the years. With Vaquero, he keeps his Texas flare and honest songwriting at the forefront.

Watson built a career one fan at a time, night after night and album by album. Now, after 18 years, 2,500 shows-and-counting, and 11 full-length studio albums later, people are just now catching up to the nationally recognized artist who is a force to contend with. Watson continues to dominate as a true independent in the country music scene, and he shared his inspiring journey with fans via a video that has since racked up over 6.7 million views.

Vaquero was co-produced by Watson and Marshall Altman. All 16 songs were written or co-written by Watson and collaborators including Mac McAnally, Leslie Satcher, Kendell

FESTIVAL MEMORIES

It all started on a street corner, in Warren, 50 years ago. Eva Mae Minnich and Mary Brandon were discussing world events and the subject of Warren's younger generation surfaced for discussion. They talked about many of Warren's youth moving away and how nice it would be to have a weekend so they could come back to visit each other. Plans progressed and in May 1967 a committee was organized to plan for a summer festival. Dr. Donald Ping was elected chairman with George Huffman serving as vice chairman. Mrs. Raymond Shultz was secretary.

Thinking back through the many festivals, most of my memories are of the parades, since I was parade chairman for many years. The biggest highlight of my festival years was in 1971, the year I

returned from Viet Nam. Four Viet Nam veterans decided to form a color guard for the legion and march in the parade. Roger Heaton, Dee Baker, Lewis Morrison and myself practiced and practiced before parade time. With all the pros and cons of the Viet Nam war and the way people felt about it, one did not like to mention he was a Viet Nam vet. But that one moment back in 1971, with some of the crowd standing and cheering, I was proud to be able to serve my country.

How many remember the year it rained all four days of the festival? I sure do, I was festival chairman that year. Not having the Civic Center back then, scheduling rain outs were tough. Jack Underwood (from WOWO radio) and I became good friends after many years, he emceed dancing in the street at our festivals. Every few hours Jack would call my house to get updates and tell the changes over the radio. One time, I told him the Firemen's Water Ball Fight had to be cancelled due to the rain. He thought it was funny and joked about it on the radio, telling the people that the firemen were afraid to get wet. I think about half of the events were cancelled or moved that year.

Some celebrities that I can remember in past festivals were Dick Stoner the Back in the early festivals

Elizabeth Nulf of WPTA TV, Bodie the world's famous janitor from WOWO radio and one cannot forget Elvis the impersonator. Bodie "the worlds famous janitor" was parade marshall one year. He was a real nut and fun to be around.

Some of the shows and events I remember watching and helping with were the go-kart street races, pet dressing contest, the "Wrong Show", championship wrestling and that hilarious kitchen band by the mothers of WWII. The Gingham Gals variety show had a lot of good local talent and great acts. Who can forget TONS OF FUN, that was a real "heavy" act.

One long running event was the Mystic Theatre with Buena Laymon, Bruce Smelser and Ernie Wesco playing piano. All the Pink Slipper shows were great and I miss having them during the festivals. Warren had and still has a tremendous amount of talent. In the early 70's some of the acts in the pink slipper show were Salamonie Ernie, the Roaring Twenties Chorus Line and the Gold Dust Twins. Also, there was the Stripper, Sweet Sue, Saucy Sharon, Little Edith Ann and the Bobbsey Twins. See if you can think back and remember the actor or actress who played these characters.

Back in the early festivals Warren enjoyed the talents

of Jim and Sue Morrison. They wrote and directed such plays as "The Butternut Tree" and "The Winds of Hope". These plays were performed by local talent at the scout cabin grounds. 1982 was my last year for being parade chairman (because my family said it would be). Being my last parade I wanted to get as many entries as I could. We printed entry forms in the fall of 1981 and went to as many festivals and parades as we could passing out parade forms. Parade time came near and we received calls as far away as Kokomo. Parade day came and we ended up with over 160 entries. With that many entries, it became difficult finding enough room to line everybody up. Right before parade time it sprinkled but the rain held off and turned out to be a nice night for a parade.

Some festivals have been better than others (my opinion) but there has always been some event or program each year that you hear people talk about after the festival is over. The good thing about having festivals is getting to see people that have moved away who come back here at festival time. I wish we can get back to the free festivals using local talent and creating our own shows and programs like it used to be.

TOWN MINUTES

The Town Council of the Town of Warren met Monday, June 12, 2017 at Assembly Hall, Council Meeting Room, 131 N. Wayne Street, in accordance with rules of Council and applicable law.

Those present were: Town Council, Ethan Stivers, Julia Glessner(Absent), Steve Buzzard; Tracey Brown); Clerk-Treasurer Marilyn Morrison; Employees, Lee Poulson, and others.

Vice President Stivers called the meeting to order at 4:00 pm.

Greg Guerrettaz, Financial Solutions Group, and the Town's financial advisor opened discussion on options related to the proposed Eleventh Street Reconstruction/Drainage Project. The project is estimated at \$886,900 with engineering of \$88,690. The project would cover the reconstruction of Eleventh Street and installation of a storm water drainage system in the same area. A grant is being sought through the Indiana Department of Transportation Community

Crossings Program which would provide seventy five percent of the cost. Construction, if the grant is awarded, would be scheduled in 2018 and funds on hand would be used to cover the matching twenty five percent of the costs. Buzzard moved, seconded by Brown, to proceed with the grant application. The motion was approved unanimously. As an addendum, the engineers will be asked to estimate the cost of sidewalks along the street and possibly bid as an alternate portion of project.

Guerrettaz updated progress of negotiations with AEP as the Town, within the Indiana and Michigan Distributors Association (IMMDA), has filed notice of intent to use a five year exit ramp in the current I&M Contract to drop purchase of power due to AEP's high energy costs. IMMDA members represent ten to fifteen percent of AEP's total load with Warren being the smallest member. Options to purchase power from other sources are being explored.

Continued discussion was held regarding the implementation of a Stormwater Utility as authorized under state statute. Recommended was a \$5 per household fee with increments based on square footage of impervious

surface - foot print of building plus paved- and a cap placed on the total amount which would be charged. No decision made on the cap but an ordinance will be drafted for further discussion.

Guerrettaz recommended that payment from CEDIT of the Electric Tracker Factor portion of the Sewer Plant billing be dropped as installation of a new blower system has reduced the monthly billing to a level which can be covered within the Sewer Fund. Brown moved, seconded by Buzzard, to approve the recommendation. The motion was approved unanimously.

Adjacent property owners have requested the house at the corner of Wayne and Fourth Street be inspected by the Department of Community Development for possible condemnation due to odor and continued deterioration. Council concurred and DCD will be contacted.

Council requested the REO Fire Engine be prepared for the Salamonie Summer Festival Parade.

Morrison, noting preparation of the 2018 Municipal Budget is underway, requested Council consider basing that budget on the numbers in the 2017 budget making adjustment, if the grant is awarded, for the INDOT project. Council concurred.

Submitted to Council were financial reports for projects. The river project to remove the log jam and repair the river bank and stormwater drains cost approximately \$16,443.85. The Second Street Electric project which covered installation of light

poles, electric pedestals, and sidewalks stands at \$60,326.22 with only the landscaping remaining to be done.

Marshal Spitler, absent, had submitted the written monthly activity report.

Poulson, as Fire Chief, submitted the written monthly activity report. Citing that two new radios and two refurbished radios had been ordered by the Department, Poulson said that the Firemen's Association would pay the cost. By consensus, Council directed that if the Township approved to pay half of the cost, the Town would do also.

Poulson, as Utility Manager. Submitted project updates citing, as previously detailed, that the Phase II, Second Street Project was completed except for landscaping which is to be done prior to the Festival. Peerless Midwest has estimated that it will be approximately two months until installation of the new well is completed and the previous unusable Well #2 is capped.

Poulson also requested that trade in of the smaller park mower be considered and a 72' mower be purchased, total cost after municipal discount and trade in of approximately \$9,000.

Buzzard moved, seconded by Brown, to proceed with the purchase/trade in at the end of the year. Poulson reported that Tucker Tree Service had completed inspection of trees/branches impacting the Electric Distribution System as of this date and has given a preliminary estimated cost of \$23,750. No action taken as no information, other than projected cost, was available for review.

CHAUTAUQUA

Denny Stroud of the Salamonie Museum presented a very interesting, historical, and insightful study of Warren in the late 1800's-early 1900's. One day during the War of 1812 a Cavalry Unit camped on the banks of the Salamonie River on their way to Fort Wayne.

One of the troopers who thought this was the most beautiful places he had ever seen was Sam Jones, and he vowed to return later. The land was not opened for Homesteading yet by the government, but 20 years later it was open, and Ohioan Sam Jones made his plans. In 1833 he arrived to establish his Homestead along the Salamonie River. His first cabin was located on the SW corner of Wayne and 1st. Later, he built his home on the low lot by the river.

In the coming years, there were four important circumstances that allowed

Warren to escape becoming a Ghost Town as so many small communities did. # 1) the Railroad #2) Gas and Oil, #3) the Fairgrounds, #4) the Community People.

The railroad was established in 1878, and this allowed Warren to become one of the best trade centers around. Just when the railroad was about to be foreclosed on in 1886, Sam Good became the leader of those buying bonds to keep the railroad. Miraculously, at this very time, gas was discovered in the area and the railroad was needed for the gas distribution to other points. In 1890 a problem occurred in the Monroe area when, as they were drilling for gas, they kept getting OIL, and the oil boom began.

During this time, the population grew from 450 ---- 2000, and in 25 years 105,000 barrels of oil were distributed. Beginning in 1886 a Capitalist company, the Warren National Gas Company, began installing gas lights for some of the families at 10 cents a month for some of their programs.

Warren was Lit Up!

James Christman started the Warren Tri County Fair in 1883 when he offered a prize for the best pig in the area that was entered for \$1.00 entry fee. 20 hogs were entered, and the winner won the pot! Later, at an Old Settlers meeting, it was decided that acreage could be used for a Fairgrounds at the north end of Nancy St. and 8th St., and

on May 29, 1884, 22 acres were bought for a race track at the Fair. Fair Week was looked forward to by many that numbered in the 1000's. The last Fair was held in 1932, although some wintered their horses in the stables at the track.

In Feb. 1901 a Water District was built. In August 1901 lights became electric, and there was running water a few hours a day. The plant later blew up, and was replaced.

None of the accomplishments to establish a viable community and town would have happened without the people stepping up when finances were necessary and personal effort and commitment to make their town as perfect a place to be, as possible. Their foresight and initiative were awesome.

The Salamonie Festival during the recent years is a testament to the effort and commitment of the town and community yet today. Visit the Salamonie Museum in the Knight Center during the Festival, and you will find so much history of the Warren area there. Denny Stroud is so knowledgeable and will be there to guide you.

President Peggy Schweikhardt welcomed new members Betsy Finley and Mary Sell into the club, and then thanked the members for her successful tenure. A short business meeting was held.
