It all started on a street corner, in Warren, 50 years ago. Eva Mae Minnich and Mary **Brandon** were discussing world events and the subject of Warren's younger generation surfaced for discussion. They talked about many of Warren's youth moving away and how nice it would be to have a weekend so they could come back to visit each other. Plans progressed and in May 1967 a committee was organized to plan for a summer festival. Dr. Donald Ping was elected chairman with George Huffman serving as vice chairman. Mrs. Raymond Shultz was secretary.

Thinking back through the many festivals, most of my memories are of the parades, since I was parade chairman for many years. The biggest highlight of my festival years was in 1971, the year I




