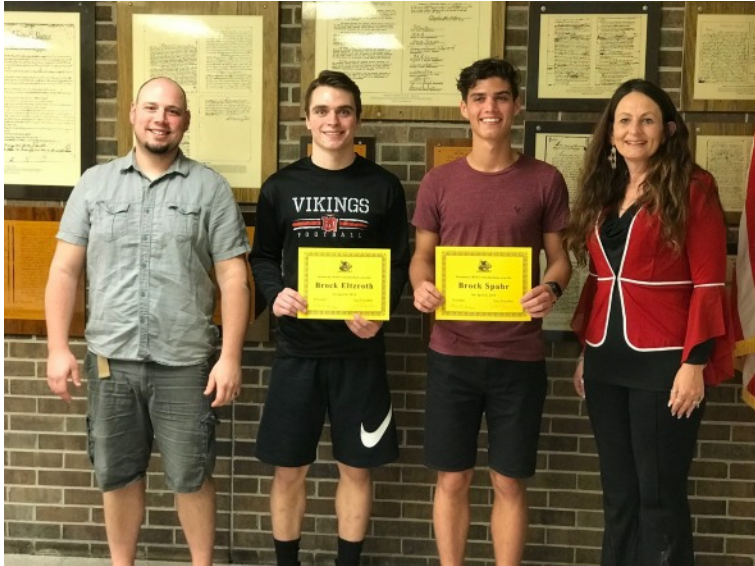

WORKING TOGETHER FOR A HEALTHY WEIGHT FOR YOUR CHILD

Childhood obesity is a major problem. While the increase in obesity rates has recently begun to slow, this means little if your own child is overweight. There are no easy cures, but there are ways you can address and help overcome the challenges he or she is facing.

A starting point is to avoid actions and behaviors that might make the problem worse. An overweight child often has low self-esteem, may face teasing and bullying at school, and often is at increased risk for a variety of health problems.

Overweight children are well aware of their weight issues and they don't need reminders from Mom and Dad of the problem. Such parental attention can leave the child feeling ugly, hopeless and unloved. And these negative emotions often lead to emotional eating as a way to minimize the negative feelings.

Even well-intentioned actions like reminding your child to eat healthier can feel like nagging. When a parent pushes a child to be more active in sports, or plays food police by controlling or restricting what can or can't be eaten, the result is often an opposite reaction, such as sneaking unhealthy snacks, skipping practices or simply rebelling.

A good starting point for a parent who really wants to help is a frank, non-judgmental talk with the child about his or her feelings. Ask the child to identify negative messages that you've been sending, probably unintentionally. Try to respond to the child's negative feelings with positive, sincere messages.

An important part of helping is to set a positive example. When you're eating healthier, it's easier for the child to do the same. That also applies to exercise. Set an example and find ways to encourage your child to be more active together with you. It can be anything from after dinner walks to playing catch or kicking a soccer ball in the back yard.

Of vital importance is to provide your child with healthy food choices. Kids often have different eating patterns than their parents. Plan healthy meals for the whole family and have a bowl of fruit for that after school snack rather than a plate of cookies or bag of chips.

Weight loss is never easy and can be especially hard for a self-conscious, overweight child. When the child makes even small moves in the right direction, be complimentary and be sure to offer love and support, not criticism.

"I was honored to be asked to serve," she said. "The healthcare field involves commitment, time, skills and abilities, not to mention great financial obligations for schooling. Being part of the process that helps someone financially achieve their career goals is a great feeling. To me, 'spirit of service' is an attitude of the heart, an attitude that I am honored to work with in various organizations in our community."

Two \$1,500 scholarships are available annually to applicants who meet criteria established by the Scholarship Selection Committee. To qualify, applicants must be enrolled, or plan to enroll, in an accredited post-secondary educational institution and pursue a healthcare-related major or course of study. All information provided on applications will be confidential and used only by committee members for the purposes of review and selection of scholarship recipients.

Deadline for applications to be received is April 24, 2019.

Applications are available at the Huntington North High School (HNHS) Guidance Office, from the Parkview Huntington Foundation office at Parkview Huntington Hospital, or online at www.parkview.com/SpiritScholarship. Names of the selected recipients will be announced in May.

Funds for the scholarship come from proceeds of the operation of the gift shop at the hospital.

HEALTH FAIR

This spring, Parkview Huntington Hospital's health and wellness fair, Healthy Steps, will be held later than usual, in mid-May instead of April.

The change in date, hospital leaders say, is to allow for the completion of the

hospital expansion project, anticipated to be finished at the very end of April.

"We wanted to be able to allow Healthy Steps guests the option of seeing some of the new spaces," said Angie Hormann, manager of the hospital's Rehab and Wellness Center. "We think community members will be as delighted as we are with the new facility, so a number of services will be located throughout the Rehab and Wellness Center."

Free health screenings and lower-cost lab tests

The health fair will take place on Saturday, May 18, from 7 to 11 a.m. Healthy Steps veterans will find all of the popular offerings for which the health fair has gained a solid reputation.

Free screenings will be available for vision, hearing, dental health, balance, bone density, skin cancer and foot health. Reduced-cost lab tests are available in bundled packages or as single tests. A 10-hour fast is recommended for anyone who might choose one of the bundled test packages, which run \$30 - \$95, depending on the tests

included. Single tests include hemogram, TSH (thyroid), hemoglobin A1C, PSA (prostate), ultrasensitive CRP, vitamin D 25 hydroxy and iron. Single tests range from \$10 to \$25, except for the vitamin D test, which is \$40. In keeping with Medicare compliance rules, PHH must charge a lab draw fee of \$5 per person at this event; this fee applies whether a person orders one or multiple tests.

Digital mammograms and \$50 HeartSmart CT Scans will be available by prior appointment. (Call 260-355-3400 to schedule only during Healthy Steps.) HeartSmart CT is appropriate for adults age 45 and older who have risk factors for heart disease.

Additionally, booths and stations will offer information on various hospital services, the Medication Assistance Program, Parkview MyChart, Parkview OnDemand (virtual visits with a healthcare provider for non-emergency health needs), the LifeBridge Senior Program, Parkview Seniors Club and other programs. "Ask the Pharmacist" returns so guests are welcome to bring medications and questions for the pharmacist. They can also learn about the new Parkview Huntington Center for Wound Healing, which opened in December to care for patients with chronic, difficult-to-heal wounds.

Members of the Rehab and Wellness team will provide some screening services as well as demonstrations, plus information on the Senior Exercise Class, nutritional

counseling, physical and occupational therapy, the new Adult Fitness Center and more.

While you're there Breakfast will be available in the HOSPITALity Café, which now offers Starbucks® coffee and one of only a handful of Pepsi Spire® machines – letting you create a custom drink with Pepsi favorites and fruit flavors – in northeast Indiana.

Changes in the hospital gift shop are worth a look, too. New merchandise throughout includes on-trend jewelry and home décor, irresistible baby gifts, and seasonal and unique gifts not found in other local shops. Regular hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays, but the shop will be open especially for Healthy Steps.

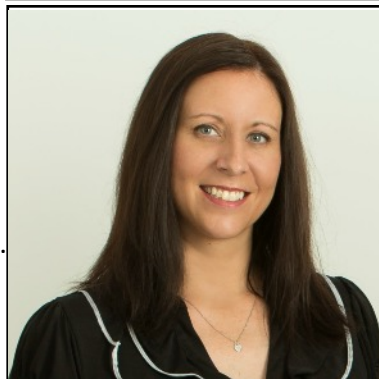

BREAST CANCER SCREENING: NEW DOCTOR RECOMMENDATIONS TO KNOW ABOUT

(StatePoint) Breast cancer is the most common cancer in women and the fourth leading cause of cancer death in the U.S. Annual mammograms have been widely promoted for women by many health advocates; however, experts say that for

women with an average risk for breast cancer who don't have symptoms, diagnostic exams should be administered strategically, as screening too frequently can do more harm than good.

In a recent evidence-based guidance statement published in "Annals of Internal Medicine," the American College of Physicians (ACP) — an organization representing internal medicine physicians — says that average-risk women with no symptoms and who are between the ages of 50 and 74 should undergo breast cancer screening with mammography every other year.

ACP found that annual mammography results in more harm than mammography every other year. Harms of breast cancer screening include over-diagnosis, over-treatment, false positive results, radiation exposure, and radiation associated breast cancers and breast cancer deaths, as well as worry and distress from tests and procedures like breast biopsies.

ACP says that beginning at age 40, average-risk women without symptoms should discuss with their physician the benefits, harms, and their personal preferences of breast cancer screening with mammography before the age of 50.

"The evidence shows that the best balance of benefits and harms for the great majority of these women is to begin breast cancer screening with mammography at age 50 and continue every other year

through age 74," says Dr. Ana María López, a medical oncologist and president of ACP, who points out that this guidance does not apply to patients with prior abnormal screening results or to higher risk populations, such as women with a personal history of breast cancer or a genetic mutation known to increase risk.

About 20 percent of women diagnosed with breast cancer over a 10-year period will be overdiagnosed and likely overtreated. Overdiagnosis means a woman is diagnosed with a breast cancer that would not have made her sick or led to her death if not diagnosed or treated (overtreatment). Therefore, finding this cancer is not of clinical benefit to the woman. Screening guidelines such as the age to start and discontinue mammography, intervals between mammograms, and the role of alternative screening methods, have varied among organizations, complicating decisions about care for both patients and doctors. However, this new evidence-based guidance statement from ACP, which represents convergence across these differing recommendations, hopes to provide clarity and simplicity.
