Teams may begin grilling anytime after 4:00 pm on contest day. Teams must present their entries to the judges at 6:00 pm.

POULTRY TESTING

Wells County Members are reminded of the health requirements for poultry which includes proof (certificate) that the bird originated from a National Poultry Improvement Program (NPIP) approved flock or a negative blood test for pullorum-typhoid within 90 days of the fair. Members should plan to bring their birds to the blood testing, Saturday, July 11th, 9:30-12:30 pm at the 4-H Park Cookhouse Patio. To arrange a special time, contact Jeff Hook, 334-5586.

Only birds not from a NPIP flock need to be tested. Waterfowl, turkeys and quail do not need to be tested.

Local veterinarians can also do the blood testing.

Salmonella pullorum and gallinarum (pullorum and typhoid) are bacterial diseases that can produce heavy losses in chickens, turkeys and sometimes other poultry. Losses are greatest in very young birds, but can be seen at almost any age.

Survivors of these infections remain carriers for life and can become sources of infections for other birds. As a result, chicks are hatched with the infection and frequently die.

These diseases can be prevented by purchasing stock from hatcheries and breeder sources listed as participants of the National Poultry Improvement Program (NPIP).



don't have the proper permit. With more and more suburban areas being built close to natural areas, young animals are increasingly born near humans and discovered without an adult animal nearby, so a few reminders are especially pertinent.

"The apparent lack of an adult does not mean a young animal is alone," said Linnea Petercheff, operations staff specialist for the DNR Division of Fish and Wildlife. "Adults often leave their young alone while they forage for food, but rarely do they abandon their young."

The best way to make sure a fawn is truly orphaned is to wait and check it periodically.

Before taking any action, remember the following:

~ If the fawn is not injured, the mother is likely nearby.

~ Leave the fawn alone and its mother will probably come and get it. Deer can take better care of their young than a human can.

~ Human scent on the fawn will not prevent the mother from taking care of it.

~ If you do not see any deer nearby, have someone keep a lookout nearby that can watch the fawn without being seen by the mother. In most cases, the mother will come back and get the fawn after you leave the area.

Remember that wild animals

are just that — wild animals — and should be left in the wild. White-tailed deer are protected by law and cannot be kept as a pet. Wild animal rehabilitation permits are issued to qualified individuals who take in sick, injured, or orphaned wild animals with the intent of releasing them back into the wild.

If you encounter an injured or truly abandoned deer, do one of the following:

~ Call the DNR/USDA Wildlife Information Hotline, 1-800-893-4116, during business hours.

~ Check the DNR/USDA-Wildlife Services Web site, wildlifehotline.info.

~ Call the DNR Division of Fish and Wildlife in Indianapolis, (317) 232-4080.

~ Call your DNR law enforcement district headquarters or regional headquarters; contact information is at: IN.gov/dnr/lawenfor/2755.htm

~ Call a licensed veterinarian for immediate assistance with a sick or severely injured wild animal.
