WASTEWATER EXAMS

The Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM) is excited to announce that it is partnering with Ivy Tech Community College to administer Indiana's wastewater operator certification exams.

Traditionally given twice a year

via paper and pencil in Indianapolis, Ivy Tech has computerized the exams and is making them available to qualified candidates on-demand. The qualification process begins with an application to IDEM. Upon receipt of an approval letter, the applicant can immediately schedule a computer-based test at any of Ivy Tech's 26 Certification and Workforce Assessment testing centers across the state. Individuals can also obtain unofficial

test results onsite and receive official notification and credentials from IDEM shortly thereafter.

Assistant commissioner of IDEM's Office of Water Quality, Bruno Pigott, says the new exam will streamline the certification process.

"The wastewater treatment field is in need of more qualified operators," Pigott said, "and this

DIARY OF ANNE FRANK

Opens at the Pulse February 27

During the Nazi occupation of the Netherlands, Anne Frank and her family were hidden in the back part of her father's factory. For two years, the Franks along with other families survived through the kindness and bravery of individuals who risked their lives to care for them. During work hours, they couldn't move, run water or even cough for risk of being heard. Thirteen year old Anne Frank kept a diary which has become one of the most read books ever. It is worth remembering.

The role of Anne Frank will be played by Erica Ashley who is a 7th grader at Riverview Middle School. Pulse audiences will recognize her from many shows beginning when she was five years old. Her most recent performance was as Imogene Herdman in Best Christmas Pageant Ever last December.

As part of the Pulse School Outreach program, the show will be presented on March 19 and 20 to area schools including Lutheran South Unity School, Riverview Middle School, Roanoke Elementary School, Salamonie Elementary School and Southern Wells.

Beginning with The Diary of Anne Frank the Pulse is discontinuing Thursday performances and replacing them with Sunday performances. The Sunday shows will begin at 4:00 pm.

Have gotten several new seed catalogs to keep me entertained and the last time I was out did purchase some flower seeds which I will be starting soon. Also got out some geraniums that I put in paper bag and they are showing some new growth so I will soon be doing some indoor gardening. last fall I took some cuttings from the coleus and have rooted very nice and need to be in soil. My wish is this will make me think spring can't be too far away.

It was always this time of year my dad and I would sit at the kitchen table and ponder over the one and only seed catalog we got now you get dozen or more and many duplicate stuffed into mail boxes.) He always bought the same seeds every year contrary to what mom thought we should have. If I was helpful and agreed on what he chose I usually got to choose a package of flower seeds. Mom always had us save zinnia seed from the plants and also marigold seed. They were planted in the garden also. It was always pretty seeing a long row of flowers blooming I with the vegetables. We also would drop a few seed in the bean rows to help ward off the bean beetles and also mad the rows pretty.

To help Indiana schools celebrate Earth Day 2015, the Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM) will be offering free classroom presentations in April. The Indiana Youth Institute (IYI) is bringing five experts to Fort Wayne for a series of training sessions designed for youth workers, teachers, youth ministers, family service providers and others who work directly with children.

The statewide tour will be in Fort Wayne on March 5 at the Indiana Tech Seitz Conference Center at 1600 E. Washington Blvd, Fort Wayne, IN 46803.

The two morning sessions run from 9 a.m. to noon EST and include the following choices:

"Flipping the Resilience Switch." Christian Moore, the founder of WhyTry, will explain how to get young people to rely on their natural resilience by tapping into

the four sources of resilience - street, relational, resource and rock bottom. Christian grew up with severe learning disabilities, sometimes alone on the streets near Washington DC. He uses those experiences to help explain why some people thrive under any circumstances while others crumble under small challenges.

"Keeping Kids SAFE: Screening Mentor Applicants to Ensure Child Safety." This workshop focuses on characteristics of child predators, the grooming process and the red flags workers need to know to keep children safe. Jen Lindwall is an independent consultant and former director of training and quality assurance at the Mentoring Partnership of Minnesota. She will discuss how the "Screening Applicants for Effectiveness" (SAFE) system helps youth-based groups keep children safe by exploring the latest in child molestation research, wisdom from screening volunteers and recommendations from leading experts on child exploitation

The two afternoon sessions will begin at 2 p.m. and end at 5 p.m. EST. Those options include:

BAD CHOLESTEROL, GOOD CHOLESTEROL

Don't take their word for it; ask your doctor first, warns the Association of Mature American Citizens after a new report from the U.S. Dietary Guidelines Advisory Committee says cholesterol is no longer "a nutrient of concern."

Cholesterol has been a hot topic in recent years among medical experts, many of whom argued that it has little to do with the risk of heart disease. Dr. Dariush Mozaffarian, dean of the School of Nutrition Science and Policy at Tufts University, says "There have been multiple analyses and meta-analyses now looking at intake of dietary cholesterol and the risk of heart disease. In the general population, there's really not any strong evidence for a link."

But, unless Dr. Mozaffarian is your primary care physician, it would be wise to consult your own doctor to see what he or she has to say.

Meanwhile, the medical community waits to see if the USDA and the Department of Health and Human Services includes the Advisory Committee's controversial recommendation in its new nutritional guidelines, which will be issued soon.

SOCIAL SECURITY 1099s IN AN INSTANT

Getting ready to prepare your income tax returns can be a hassle, especially for those of us who haven't been diligent in holding on to our records. Seniors who misplace their SSA 1099 forms have the extra aggravation of having to call and/or visit their local Social Security office to get replacements, according to the Association of Mature American Citizens.

But, now all you have to do is use the Internet to open a free mySocialSecurity account and access your 1099s electronically. You can view and print them in an instant.

Carolyn W. Colvin, Acting Commissioner of Social Security, says: "beginning this tax season, any mySocialSecurity account holder who misplaces their original SSA-1099 will be able to request an instant replacement from our menu of online services. Setting up a mySocialSecurity account is quick, easy, and secure; plus it's a great way to do business with Social Security."

The course instructs the student in industrial safety, terminology, tools and machine tools, measurement and layout. Students become familiar with the setup and operation of power saws, drill presses, lathes, milling machines, grinders, and an introduction to CNC (computer controlled) machines.

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to incorporate dough well, pat onto an oiled bake sheet in round form and about 1/2 inch thick and gently cut through making 8 portions. Bake at 375 degrees for 15-20 minutes.
