# Pulse - 25 Years!

Blow the trumpets! Drop the balloons! The 2011 season at the Pulse Opera House marks the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the restoration of the historic theatre. The season is filled with the things that makes the Pulse special – amazing local talent, family entertainment, new and unique shows, history, music and lots of heart!

The season opens with a Valentine Talent Show. Featuring singers, dancers and musicians from the area, the Talent Show will showcase the best of our hometown talent. This show is a fundraiser to help raise funds for the rest of the season. The Valentine Talent Show will be performed on February 11 & 12.

The all-youth magical production of *Disney's Cinderella Kids* is based on the classic movie and features a beloved Disney princess. The musical has favorite songs such as "A Dream is a Wish Your Heart Makes" and "Bibbidi-Bobbidi-Boo." Poor Cinderella is mistreated by her Step-mother and Step-sisters, but with the help of a Fairy Godmother and some faithful

mice, finds that dreams really do come true. Disney's Cinderella Kids runs March 11-26 with special daytime school shows on March 17 & 18.

Duck Hunter Shoots Angel is a quirky show about two bumbling Alabama brothers who think they shot an angel. They refuse to leave the swamp but are chased by a tabloid journalist and his reluctant photographer. Written by Mitch Albom, author of Tuesdays With Morrie, and The Five People You Meet in Heaven, Duck Hunter Shoots Angel has been hailed by audiences as a rare comedy with a surprisingly heartfelt lesson. Duck Hunter Shoots Angel runs May 6-21.

As a salute to the history of the Pulse Opera House and the community, the summer musical will be a tribute to Buffalo Bill (who spoke at the Pulse) and Pawnee Bill (who brought a Wild West Show to the Warren Fairgrounds). Annie Get Your Gun is the lively story of Annie Oakley as she travels with Buffalo Bill's Wild West show. Cowboys, Indians and a rousing score by Irving Berlin combine for a notto-be-missed show. Annie Get Your Gun runs July 15-August 6. Many actors who performed at the Pulse over 100 years ago ended up in silent movies. One of these actors was Charlie Murray who was one of the original Keystone Kops. The Keystone Kops will make an appearance in the fourth show of the season. Without a single spoken word, Reeling tells the story of the Little Fellow, based on the film persona of silent movie great Buster Keaton. Slapstick and surprises will make for a fun, unique evening! Reeling runs September 16-October 1.

The final show of the season is a throwback to Christmas in the 1940's. A Christmas Story is

based on humorists Jean Shepherd's memories of growing up in Indiana. It follows 9-year-old Ralphie Parker in his quest to get a genuine Red Ryder BB gun for Christmas. All of your favorite scenes from the movie are included in this production, including the exploding furnace, the wet tongue on the lamppost experiment and the leg lamp. A Christmas Story runs November 11-December 3 with school shows on November 17 & 18.

All shows begin at 8:00 p.m. Lobby doors open at 7:00 p.m. and theatre doors open at 7:30 p.m. Tickets are \$12 for general admission and \$5 for children 12 and under. Looking through a 1952 Warren phone book, I noticed that Warren had several businesses back then. Under Agricultural Implements we had five dealers in town. Harrison Farm Equipment sold Allis Chalmers and W. M. Clampitt & Sons ran the Warren Tractor Sales and sold Ford tractors and Dearborn farm equipment, Eckman Motors, besides Buick and Pontiacs, sold John Deere tractors and implements. They, also, had Frigidaire appliances. Daugherty Farm Equipment was your Case and Massey Harris dealer and International Harvester was sold at Kriegbaum Hardware.

Warren had plenty of grocery stores in 1952. Boughner's Market, Breedlove Grocery, Nash Grocery, Shull Grocery, Snavely Grocery, and Sanitary Market were the choices. You sure would have found what you needed without having to go out of town.

Getting gasoline was not a problem, with a filling station on every corner. There was Beavans, Briarwood Inn on State Road 3. Brown Service Station, Christner Standard Service. Eckman Motors, Hite's Service Station, Neel Motor Sales, Riverside Service Station and Wilson's have to pump your own gas at any of these places.

Doctors in town that year included J. B. Bennett, C. S. Black, H. F. Bonifield and L. W. Smith. We, also, had W. A. Blair, a Chiropractor, W. M. Mott and James Mott was our Dentists and Mac Bonnifield was the Veterinarian.

Grain Elevators consisted of Farm Bureau, McDaniel and McDaniel, Smith Coal and Supply Co. and the Warren Grain and Feed. Two drug stores in town were Coolman's and the Gold Seal Drug store. There were several places to eat. These were Mac's Café. Shultz's Café. the Wagon Wheel Café and Ditzler's Café, were you could add a scoop of ice cream to you meal.

All other needs were supplied by these stores: The Gamble Store. Minnich's Mens Wear. Myers Department Store, Cline Click Lumber, Warren Locker Plant, Holmes Jewelry, Myers Jewelry, Hi-Quality Hatchery, Hooker Glass Co., Ray's Radio and Duffy Stockvard. Others were Shipley Welding and Repair Shop, Ware Monuments, Brown Furniture Mart, H. Brown & Son, Ben Franklin Store, McFarren Store, Maries Style Shop, Craft Cigar Store, Cloud's Barber Shop, Fluher's Cleaners and Citizens Telephone. The three plumbers were Blachley, William's Heating and Plumbing and Warren Service and Supply. A few of these businesses are still around today. I hope some of these businesses bring back some memories.

# **T**RAINING

The Indiana State Department of Agriculture (ISDA) is hosting a workshop on January 25 as part of the Certified Livestock Producer Program (CLPP). This workshop will be held at the Whitley County Farm Bureau Office located on 607 N Opportunity Dr., Columbia City, IN. The program begins at 8:30 a.m. and it ends at 3:30 p.m. There is no charge for the training and lunch will be provided for the attendees.

Livestock producers of all sizes and species are invited to attend the training. The CLPP is a voluntary program that recognizes farmers for their commitment to innovative and top industry standards. # BB/RIFLE SAFETY SIGN-UP

Safety instruction, handling procedures, shooting skills and hands on experience will be



included in the Wells County 4-H BB Gun & .22 Caliber Rifle Safety Program.

Meetings will begin Tuesday, January 18th with sign up and safety rules from 6:30 - 8 PM. BB & Rifle Safety will continue each Tuesday until March 29th. The Awards Night for BB & Rifle will be held on April 1st.

Youth in grades 3, 4, and 5 can participate in BB Gun. Youth in grade 6 and above can participate in Rifle

First time members who are old enough for Rifle will be required to pass a shooting skills proficiency test which reviews the positions and range safety procedures.

Youth may become 4-H members when they enter third grade and may continue their membership through the completion of grade 12. Each individual may continue membership for a maximum of ten (10) consecutive years.

A membership fee of \$20 for BB Gun and \$25 for .22 Caliber Rifle should be paid at the first meeting. The fee covers the cost of equipment, materials, ammunition, insurance, and awards. Checks should be made payable to Wells County 4-H Rifle Club. Scholarships are available by checking with 4-H Leaders at the event. If you have more than one person in the family, the second member is only \$15. No person will be turned away due to financial constraints.

Members are not allowed to bring their own equipment. Advanced registration is not required. Sign up will be at the first meeting. All participants must have a completed and signed health form before participating in the hands-on activity.

In case of bad weather, listen to radio station K105 FM or WMEE 97.3 FM for cancellations. Usually, if one of the schools cancel, the 4-H event will be postponed.

Youth may also enroll in the Shooting Sports Fair Exhibit

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Option. Members may make a posterora note book about someaspect of shooting sports or may exhibit something they have made. 
classes are \$35 per person and pre-registration is required. Some scholarships may be available for those over the age of 60. Please register for classes by January 17, 2011.

One little thing out of whack throws a monkey wrench into our plan. In the northern hemispheres, we are getting ready for fall and winter. With these seasons, come flooding, snow, school closings, ice storms and power outages. Are you prepared with plan B?

power(discipline in our home)! Routines are a discipline. So without power, we didn't need routines, because we couldn't adhere to them anyway. FREE FOR ALL. Well if your routines were a habit, you would not have been able to toss them out into the snow so fast

Our biggest problem is picking up after ourselves. Without our routines we do not police our hotspots, keep our sink clean or keep the children on track with their routines.

So when the storm hits, the kids are out of school, and you are without power, you still have sunlight(during the day). Don't allow the fact that there is a little problem to stand in your way of doing things like you have been doing for months. You want a perfect world and most days is not like this at all. So except the fact that plan B is more the norm than your regular routine and be light on your feet. Enjoy the challenge of feeding your family with a buddy burner. If you were in scouts, you know what I am talking about. Play games by flashlight, read to them, just remember to stay calm and don't let vour home get panicked. You are still in charge.

Plan B is like being on a camping trip for me. I love to make do with what ever I have. Since we live in the country and have our own water system, we have to be prepared. So we have some bottles of water in the basement. for making coffee, washing our hair, sponge baths, and cooking if needed. We also have two fireplaces, so we can keep warm. if needed. There are dutch ovens for cooking in the fireplace and a real perk coffee maker. So we won't starve. Knowing what you can do and how, is part of not getting panicked. We also have a gas grill on the back deck. So if the freezer was without power for more than 2 days, we would have to start cooking up a storm.

Do you have an emergency backup plan in your home? Think about this for a little while and see exactly what you would do in case of a power outage.

Do you know where your flashlights are? Can you find them

in the dark?

Do you have a weather radio, or battery operated radio for an emergency channel?

How about Extra water for drinking and minimal bathing? And a way to sterilize it.

Do you have an alternate way to heat your home?

How about to cook? and the pot and pans to do it with?

Do you know about safety in the house with kerosene heaters, grills and candles?

Do you have a fire extinguisher handy?

Do you have plenty of Blankets? Hats and gloves?

Just a little planning can keep you from pulling your hair out after the crisis is over. Learn to adapt and you will be so pleased the next time there is a weather emergency.

Are you prepared for bad weather, power outages and evacuations? Go get an empty Rubbermaid Tub to start building your Emergency Supplies. Label it! Only Use in Case of Emergency! Be charitable. There is great warmth in it for you. Beselfish and you court insecurity. Look at the history of man and note how often great sacrifice produced great achievements.

How to achieve and have the achievement have lasting power? Give a new improvement the 30 day test. Just ONE and at the end of a month the repetition should have turned into a habit. Multitasking is good but not when it comes to breaking bad habits or establishing new ones.

How to keep on keeping on during a thirty days in which you may be prone to conveniently forget? Institute a trigger mechanism. Stretchyourfingers, tapeyourtoes, pull on your ear. Silly? Not if you have conditioned yourself to realize that this is supposed to set in motion what at the moment you are not in the mood to do.

And yes, create leverage. Give a buddy enough money to make it significant and make sure he doesn't give it back until you have passed the 30 day test. Make a public announcement to as many people as you can. Resolutions kept in secret don't have a very long shelf life.

K.I.S.S. Keep it simple stupid applies in this area as well as others. The more complicated you make your adjustment the less likely it is that you will succeed. You want to exercise. Make it as simple as walking a half a mile rather than a long list of exercises that will either wear you out or not wear you out because you gave up half way through. Add to but slowly. Not all at once.

Youmade a public announcement that you were going to form a new habit or break an old one. When you have succeeded reward yourself with a public announcement that you have succeeded. This will make it harder to fall back.
