The Town Council of the Town of Warren met Monday, November 9, 2020 in a Regular Meeting at Assembly Hall, Council Meeting Room, 131 N. Wayne Street, in accordance with rules of Agreement of Payment Council and applicable law.

Those present were: Town Council, Ethan Stivers, Carrie Miller, Steve Buzzard, Present electronically but not voting was Council Member Tavis Surfus; Clerk-Treasurer, Marilyn Morrison; Employees, Lee Poulson, Ty Surfus, Brian Sills, and others.

President Stivers opened the meeting at 5:00 pm.

Jessica Beal of the Huntington County Department of Community Development reported on property inspections at 313 Matilda, 319 Matilda, and 218 W. Third. Also commenting was Brandt Ricker of the Board of Health. Land and the Journey of Faith. demolition order on the 313 Matilda property had expired. Ricker reported that there had been no improvements on the structure and in fact, structure deteriorated. Reported was the porch structure at the 319 Matilda site was in need of work.
