BUCKLE UP

Buckle Up in Every Vehicle in All Seating Positions. It's the Law. Effective July 1, 2007.

After several years of public and political debate, Indiana's General Assembly adopted House Bill 1237 on Sunday, April 29, 2007. The Bill states that all occupants of passenger vehicles, including pickup trucks, are required to buckle up in all seating positions.

Currently, state law does not require backseat passengers over the age of 16 to buckle up nor does it require occupants in pickup trucks, or those in vehicles registered as trucks to wear their seatbelts. Governor Daniels signed the law on May 10 and will become effective July 1, 2007.

"We are thrilled that Indiana law makers recognized the value of this important piece of legislation.

Once enacted, the law will help to decrease injuries and fatalities on Indiana's roadways," said Mike Cunegin, executive director of the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI). "Indiana was one of just two states with a truck registration exemption, and we are proud to leave Georgia as the only primary seat belt law state with the exemption beginning July 1st."

Of the 897 people killed in motor vehicle crashes in Indiana during 2006, approximately 46% were known to be unrestrained at the time of their crash. The Governor's Council on Impaired & Dangerous driving, a division of ICJI, estimates that potentially 269 lives would have been saved if those killed would have been wearing their safety

"It doesn't matter what type of car you ride in or where you are sitting, you are still vulnerable in a crash," said Ryan Klitzsch, Traffic Safety division director of ICJI. "A seat belt is the most effective way of saving your life and others."



BAYVIEW READING

The regular monthly meeting of the Bayview Reading Club was held May 8, 2007 at 2 P.M. in the Calico Corner at Heritage Pointe. Vicepresident Mabel Fields presided in the absence of President Lilly Nutter, and led the reading of the Club Collect. Marian Dawson shared prayer as the meeting began. Minutes of the April meeting and a current treasury report were read by Secy.-Treas. Margaret Bell, and approved by the members. As there was no old nor new business to be dealt with, program time opened with each member's contribution, followed by discussion, of her interesting reading during the preceding

Marian Dawson had found a poem appropriate to the coming Mothers' Day. It is entitled "Somebody's Mother" and was written by an Indiana woman, a resident of Selma, Indiana. Readers are asked to consider elements of a woman's appearance, her hands, her face, and become aware that she is "somebody's mother." The face will reflect sacrificial grace, showing that she is "somebody's mother." With a heart of love, she is "somebody's mother."

Martha Rumple stimulated members' amazement and dismay as she read a news article about the current mysterious disappearance of our bees — they are leaving hives and nectar and babies and totally disappearing; no dead bees have been found. The news article stated that a name as been applied to this situation -CCD, or Colony Collapse Disorder. The estimated value of bees' work in our economy is \$14,000,000 a year. Every third bite we take requires the sendees of bees - to pollinate our fruits and vegetables, alfalfa and clover and other beef and animal food.

Helen Stokes read from a book entitled Coffee Talk, about the beginnings of our current U.S. coffee usage and its historical role in group intellectual enlightenment, likening coffeehouses to "penny universities!" Daniel Webster described coffeehouses as the "headquarters of the Revolution," when such places arose in Boston after the famed "Boston Tea Party." Factually, the coffee plant is a small evergreen shrub, and can yield each year some 4,000 handpicked beans, which convert to 1-1/2 lbs. of ground coffee.

Mabel Fields had read with enthusiasm and interest her health magazines and publications, including one from the Mayo medical resource. She shared with members their factual advice eat breakfast, make good food choices, lose some weight, seek ways to exercise daily for at least 30 minutes (water exercise especially good) - and expect better health and improvement of chronic health problems, such as heart disease, diabetes, osteoarthritis. She had even found John Wesley's discussion of similar health practices!

Helen Jo Strassner gave us an encore of her reading of last month,

entitled "Perks," about the Eve of Genesis, and it was thoroughly enjoyed by everyone, especially members who had missed the April meeting.

Margaret Bell reviewed a news article about a noted physicist of the University of Cambridge (Stephen Hawking) who has A.L.S. (Lou Gehrig's Disease) - and who was given his dream of a weightless experience. This happened in a jet flight which performed parabolic plunges creating Zero Gravity for 25 seconds. To Professor Hawking this was wonderful, as his extreme muscle disorder leaves him unable to talk or move even his hands and legs. He makes tiny facial expressions using muscles around his eyes, eyebrows, cheek and mouth, which, via choosing words on a computer screen results in a synthesized voice on a computer. Amazing to all!



Dilled Salmon

1 cup dijon mustard, 2/3 cup chicken broth, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1/4 cup vinegar, 3 tablespoon soy sauce, 1 cup vegetable oil, 1/2 cup fresh snipped dill, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 3 lbs salmon fillet

Whisk together mustard, broth, sugar, vinegar and soy sauce. Add oil, dill and pepper. Put salmon in a baking dish and cover with 2 cups of the mixture. Cover and refrigerate 1 or 2 hours. Coat the grill rack with non stick spray. Or lay on heavy duty foil sprayed. Drain salmon and discard the marinate. Place skin side down over med heat for 5 minutes baste with the remaining marinate grill 5-7 minutes longer or till the salmon flakes. Basting a few times during the cooking.






MOTHER-DAUGHTER TEA
