A stable blood supply is central to ensuring patient needs are met in emergencies. Blood can take up to three days to be tested, processed and made available for patients. It's the blood already on the shelves that can help save lives when disaster strikes.

To help increase donations during the month of September, those who come out to donate blood or platelets throughout the month will receive a coupon by email for a free haircut at participating Sport Clips locations.

Appointments to donate and help the Red Cross prepare for patient needs across the country can be made at redcrossblood.org. Information about other ways to help prepare for emergencies is available at redcross.org.

How to donate blood Simply call 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) or visit redcrossblood.org to make an appointment or for more information. All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age (16 with parental consent in some states), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.



The Wells County 4-H Association is busy finalizing plans and scheduling volunteers for their 4-H Pancake and Sausage Booth at the Bluffton Street Fair, September 16-20, 2014.

2014 will mark the 65th year that 4-H has operated the booth. Through the years the menu has remained the same, buttermilk pancakes, locally grown whole hog sausage, and ham. More recent additions to the menu have included grilled cheese sandwiches and the sausage/ham sandwiches.

When the booth started in 1949, the 4-H used the proceeds from the booth for development of the 4-H Park which had just been announced with the purchase of 40 acres at the south edge of Bluffton.

Today, the proceeds of the booth are used to help purchase ribbons for the fair and to send

youth to 4-H educational trips and camps.

Of course, the booth could not exist without the numerous 4-H parents, grandparents, youth, and other volunteers who give of their time to work in the booth.

With many people working during the day, 4-H relies on those 4-H alumni, retired grandparents, and home school families to assist with the daytime shifts.

This year's booth will open at 5pm on Tuesday evening. As the fair continues, the booth will open at 7am Wednesday through Saturday.

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

The Huntington University social work department is hosting an educational seminar titled "Finding and Feeling God's Light in the Darkness."

The event will take place Sept. 26 from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at HU's Merillat Centre for the Arts.

The opening keynote speaker will be Ann Sandercox, Master of Social Work degree candidate. Sandercox will speak on the title of the seminar, "Finding and Feeling God's Light in the Darkness." With a personal connection to the 2012 Sandy Hook Elementary School shooting, she will share openly and honestly about her response to the tragedy. Sandercox will identify how grief, depression, anxiety and posttraumatic stress disorder affects individuals following a community trauma. In addition, she will share how faith plays a role in not only trauma but also in the recovery process.

After Sandercox, attendees will participate in breakout sessions hosted by HU faculty, community mental health members and students. Topics will include how to identify the needs of people facing trauma and victims of oppression while learning how to respond in a faith-based practice

The lunch-time speaker will be Tena Dellaca-Hedrick, the social justice program coordinator for Victory Noll Center in Huntington. She will share her personal account of years of victimization and sex trafficking. Her lecture will help attendees understand how culture plays a role in contributing to vulnerability and victimization of human trafficking victims, both global and domestic. She also will speak on the importance of faith when working with victims of human trafficking with victims of human traf-

ficking.

The Soul Children of Chicago, a world-class performance group, will host the final session. The group has a single-minded purpose: to utilize music as the motivator and catalyst to inspire young people throughout the world to have faith in themselves, each other and God. The purpose of this session is to teach attendees how to educate the minds, elevate the spirits and illuminate the souls of the youth. For advanced registration, the cost of the seminar is \$65. ENTEROVIRUS INCREASING

Indiana hospitals statewide are reporting an increase in the number of patients with respiratory illnesses, especially in children, according to the Indiana State Department of Health. It is not yet known if the increase is related to the recent surge of enterovirus D68 (EV-D68) infections that have been seen in surrounding states including Missouri, Ohio, Illinois, Kentucky and others.

Enteroviruses are very common, with between 10 to 15 million cases occurring in the United States each year. Three individuals in Northern Indiana have recently tested positive for enterovirus/rhinovirus (rhinovirus is the common cold) by the State Laboratory. Further testing is needed to determine if the cases are EV-D68. There are more than 100 types of enteroviruses.

"When evaluating patients with significant respiratory illness, it's important to test for enterovirus because it helps healthcare providers rule out other treatable illnesses, such as influenza or bacterial pneumonia, and to know what viruses are circulating," said State Epidemiologist Pam Pontones. "Practices such as washing your hands, covering your cough and staying home when you're sick are more important than ever to protect yourself and others."

The State Health Department is working with local health departments and hospitals to conduct surveillance for additional cases of enterovirus. The Centers for Disease Control and Protection (CDC) is assisting the State with testing for the EV-D68 strain

Typically, EV-D68 causes upper respiratory illness, such as low-grade fever, cough, runny nose, sneezing and body/muscle aches. Infected individuals generally recover on their own without incident by treating symptoms. However, some individuals, especially those with weakened immune systems or underlying medical conditions, such as asthma, may experience severe complications and require hospitalization with supportive therapy.

Enteroviruses, including EV-D68, are spread through close contact with infected people. To protect you and your family from becoming infected with enterovirus or other illnesses, follow the

- \cdot Cover: Cover your cough with your sleeve or a tissue when you cough or sneeze.

ELDER ABUSE CONFERENCE

A one-day conference on Thursday, September 18, will bring together stakeholders and interested persons to look at elder abuse in Indiana. The conference is in response to 39,847 reports of abuse, neglect and exploitation of adults in 2013 received by the state of Indiana. Just 41 full time equivalent Indiana Adult Protective Services investigators handled over 10,000 cases during that time period.

"Respect Our Elders – Working Together to Stop Abuse" is scheduled for the Crowne Plaza. Indianapolis Airport. Two nationally known authorities on elder abuse will speak, as well as county prosecutors and attorneys that specialize in elder law. Representatives from the Area Agency on Aging and others will participate in the conference, sponsored by the Indiana Prosecuting Attorneys Council, on behalf of Indiana Adult Protective Services and the Elder Law Section of the Indiana State Bar Association. Anyone interested in the issue of elder abuse is invited to attend.

While Adult Protective Service

personnel are funded by the state of Indiana, they work under the authority of each county prosecutor.
