In Honor of Veteran's Day

The Huntington County Veterans' Council has announced upcoming activities which will take place in the county in observance of Veteran's Day 2003.

On Saturday, Nov. 8, the Deal-Robbins VanGilder Funeral Home Patriotic Awards will take place at 11:00 a.m. at VFW Post 2689. The awards, presented each year since 1992, have become an annual tradition. This year's recipients of this coveted award are, from American Legion Post 7, Wayne L. Ashbaugh; from American Legion Post 85, Robert J. Thobe: from American Legion Post 160, Darrell "Monk" Ward and; from VFW Post 2689, Paul Baumgardner. This event is open to the public.

Immediately following the Patriotic Awards will be the annual Veteran's Dinner, conducted this year by VFW Post 2689. The free dinner lasts from noon on Saturday until 3:00 p.m. and all veterans are invited. This event is restricted to veterans only, although this year the families of the Patriotic Awards recipients are invited to join their veteran at the dinner.

The annual Veteran's Day Program, sponsored by the Huntington County Commissioners and the City of Huntington, will take place at 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 11 at the First Church of the Nazarene, 1555 Flaxmill Road. The public is invited to this program.

Conducted by the Huntington County Veterans' Service Office, this event honors all veterans, past and present, but this year will focus on 44 specific World War II veterans and will also have a special segment honoring all veterans who have served in Operation Iraqi Freedom as well as any other military operation within the past five years.

The focus starts with the introduction of the four World War II veterans who were recently presented with their high school diplomas at a recent school board meeting at the Roanoke Elementary School. They are: Robert E. Charles, Dalton P. Hanauer, Robert L. Hosier and Paul Eugene Parker.

Guest speaker for the evening will be Angie Roman, Executive Assistant to Senator Richard Lugar for Military and Veterans Affairs. Angie is also a Staff Sergeant with the Indiana Army National Guard, currently assigned as the Personnel Sergeant for the 638th Military Intelligence Battalion. She was instrumental in obtaining the Bronze Star Medals which will be presented during the program.

Lt. Col. Tom Agness, Indiana Guard Reserve, will present the Bronze Star Medal to 40 World War II recipients of the Combat Infantry Badge or to a member of their family if they are deceased. The program will conclude with an audio-visual tribute to all soldiers, sailors, airmen, Marines and Coast Guard members. The public is invited to this event, which is expected to last approximately 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 hours.

GET NUTS!

THEY'RE PLAYING A NEW ROLE IN TODAY'S HEALTH

If you want to prevent diabetes and keep your heart healthy, try nuts.

Studies by the University of Toronto's St. Michael's Hospital show that some nuts have a large potential for cholesterol reduction. The researchers compared the effect of a diet rich in fiber, soy products, and almonds with Mevacor, the statin drug.

The diet reduced bad cholesterol by 28.6 percent compared with 30.9 percent with the statin. Included in the diet were oat bran cereal, soy milk, strawberries, oat bread, fruit almonds, tofu, barley, and vegetables.

In the U.S., the Food and Drug Administration has ruled that packages of walnuts, almonds, peanuts, pistachios, pecans, and hazelnuts may state on their labels that "scientific evidence suggests but does not prove that eating 1.5 ounces a day may reduce the risk of heart disease if part

Each nut has its own virtues. Walnuts are an excellent source of hearthealthy omega-3 oils. Almonds are high in vitamin E.

Doctors reporting in the Journal of the American Medical Association say nuts may reduce your risk of diabetes. Diets high in unsaturated fat from nuts appear to lower risk of type 2 diabetes.

In the 16-year study of 84,000 nurses, those who reported eating five or more 1-ounce servings of nuts per week were 27 percent less likely to develop diabetes than those who didn't eat nuts. Those who ate a tablespoon of peanut butter five times a week had a 21 percent lower risk. Almond/Cereal Snack Mix

Preheat oven to 300 and coat a pan with no-stick spray. In a large bowl, combine 1 egg white, 1 1/2 t Cajun seasoning, 1 t Worcestershire sauce, 1/2 t garlic powder, 1 t water. Mix thoroughly. Add 2 cups wheat cereal squares and 1 1/2 c whole almonds. Bake 30 minutes or until golden.

WARREN'S WW-II MOTHERS

Dick Smith crskrs@pacol.net In the 4th of July issue of the Warren Weekly, I wrote an article about the contributions and sacrifices made by Service Men and Women from the Warren Area during WW-II. I explained that I purposely left-out individual names because I didn't want to overlook or miss someone who gave so much. With some new information I have now, I am going to soften a little on that stand.

Virginia (Ditzler) Neel of Sebring, Florida recently sent me a small booklet she is going to donate to the Warren Museum. It's titled "The American Guidebook". It was published in 1944 by the Mother's of World War II of Warren, Indiana, Unit 85. Since this was Unit 85, the organization may have been statewide or nation-wide.

The title page reports that "the purpose of the association is to promote the welfare and social interest between Parents of Enlisted Personnel. The booklet has all kinds of useful information, such as how to display our flag, how to stretch your food rations, thumb-nail sketches of all Presidents, ALL rank insignias for all branches of the Services, and even how to mail letters to Prisoners-of-War held by the enemy!

But there were two areas of interest to me. (1) A member-list of 64 Members of the Warren Area who belonged to the organization. Even though the title page said Mothers of Enlisted Personnel, the mother of Admiral Good from Warren was included. And (2), it had a list of 297 men and 7 women from the Warren Area who were serving in the Armed Services in 1944. Now this second list had to be only a partial list because it (1) was published in 1944 and the War and the Draft continued well into 1945, and (2) I'm not 100 percent sure of the area from which the men and women came. (Salamonie and Jefferson Township men and women were included, but not any from McNatt, Liberty Center, Van Buren, and Wells County.

I can't list all 304 men and women here, but I will try to list the 64 members of the organization—that ought to bring back some memories for our Senior Citizens. The list included the following:

Ellen Huffman, Glenna Johnson, Etta Keller, Elma Klepser, Vivian McCracken, Aenone Mossburg, Betty Neel, Alice Perry, Cora Richardson, Ica Richardson, Josie Ross, Dora Ruble, Effie Ruble, Pauline Shafer. Nora Shaw. Marv A. M. Shultz, Nellie Siberry, Fern Sills, Abigail Simpson, Pearl Smith, Anna Strait, Ada Stroud, Helen Tam, Fern Thompson, Mildred Thompson, Ada Trout Rosa Wamsley, Ada Wiley, Edna Williams, Nora Williams, Marie Winningham, and Sadie Yount.

I said that there were 7 women in the Services from the Warren Area during WW-II. These were Betty Beavans, Pauline Boxell, Olive Click, Geneva Conrad, Margret Davis, Vera Dickey, and June Ditzler. June was a 1939 Warren Graduate, and a sister to Virginia Neel. June joined the Marine Corps. I'm told that Olive Click, who joined the Navy's WAVES, had been a Third Grade teacher in the Warren School. Her father was Roy Click who worked at the Lumber Company in town. Pauline Boxell was a 1939 Warren Graduate. Her brother was Dwight Boxell who married Margaret Ann Fox. Betty Beavans was the wife of Dick Beavans who was in the Service too (Betty was the daughter-in-law of Warren's Postmaster, Gus Beavans. Vera Dickey was related to Dorothy Coolman whose husband had the Cooman's Drug Store in town.

Now I myself didn't know all the details above---- counted on the very good memory of Virginia (Ditzler) Neel. Remember, not only was her sister one of the seven, but she was a grade or two behind many of the girls. Virginia said that she didn't have information on Margret Davis or Geneva Conrad. I'm sure that there are Warren Weekly readers in the Warren Area who are familiar with those two young women. It would be great if some resident of Warren or the surrounding area could document the military service histories of Warren's Women in Service during WW-II. I think that would be a great addition to both the Warren Library, the Warren Museum, and the Huntington Library background information on our area.

I have sent copies of Virginia's Booklet to both the Warren and Huntington Libraries. Anyone interested in checking specific names can go to the Library and have the pages of the names copied. I could only cover the organization's members here. After receiving the list of

Service Men and Women, I called the VA Representative for Huntington County to share my new information. He said that the list of personnel in this Booklet is the most complete he knows of ever since the WW-II Monument on the Courthouse Lawn was destroyed and the names discarded. HOW SOON WE FORGET!!

TIPS FOR EFFICIENT WINTER FIREPLACES WOOD STOVES

When cold winds blow, snuggling down in front of a fire can give you a good feeling that is warmer and more comfortable that central heat alone.

You can make your winter warmer by making wood burning more efficient. Here's how:

. Wood that has been split, stacked, and covered for eight months or more is best. Green wood makes a cooler fire and creates creosote buildup in the chimney.

. Don't burn treated wood. It gives off dangerous gases.

. If you cut your own, be sure to wear a hard hat, eye protection, and earplugs.

. When buying, remember that a cord measures 4x4x8 feet, about 500 board feet.

. Have your chimney flue and seal checked before starting the burning season.

. You can save ashes from wood and use them for fertilizer for plants and gardens.

BE YOUR OWN HOLIDAY MONEY MANAGER

If you were still paying the bills for last year's Christmas a few months later, you need a plan for this year's spending. Financial managers quoted in Self magazine offer this guide for overspenders:

. Limit the amount you spend on gifts and special occasions throughout the year to 2 percent of your gross income.

. Of that amount, use 80 percent for holiday spending. This should cover gifts, decorating, parties, and cards.

Never tap into savings for holiday purchases. Shop with a list, Cross off items as you buy them, then quit. Avoid "buy now, pay later" offers. They just increase debt.
