Power Out

The power outages in the Warren area during the past Friday, August 1st, were due to problems within the I&M (AEP) transmission lines and not within the local distribution system. An automatic switch was opening causing periodic interruptions which affected this entire area including REMC.

For customers of the Warren Municipal Electric Utility, the August 1st bill saw an annual adjustment to the per KW charge with the cost per KW being approximately one cent less. The annual adjustment is made to reflect the prior twelve months of fuel tracker rates included in the I&M billing schedule to the Warren Electric Utility. The average per month cost of purchased power from I&M(AEP) to the local utility is approximately \$111,000.

HIGHWAY CLOSURE

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) announces the closure of the SR 5 between West 12th Street and E 900 S in Warren. The closure is anticipated to begin as early as Monday, August 4, and remain in effect until late September.

During this time, the current structure over Twig Ditch will be replaced. All work is weather permitting.

The official detour is I-69 to US 224 to SR 5.

The project was awarded to E & B Paving for the low bid of \$565,600.

Also the road will be closed as the current structure over Majenica Creek is replaced. All work is weather permitting.

THE UPTOWN GARDENER

I'll recap a bit of last weeks cliff hanger. I was writing about my grandpa taking a stranger to work in Wabash after the Andrews bank had been robbed and a suspect is at large.

My grandpa made his way through the back streets of Andrews making his way to Wabash. His passenger was very quite which is a good thing because my grandpa didn't really like anyone talking to him while he was driving, but evidently my grandpa was kinda excited about the bank robbery because they just don't have that much excitement in Andrews and was talking to the passenger the whole way to Wabash. According to my grandpa his passenger wasn't to interested in talking about bank robberies.

As the "getaway" car was making its way to Wabash, an undercover officer from the Wabash City police heard of the report of the 62 ford falcon and was watching for it to come by him. As the car went by him he pulled out and followed behind at a safe distance. The police officer then realized that it was the car in question and radioed ahead to set up a road block.

When grandpa seen the road block ahead, he mentioned to his passenger that it looks like we had an accident up there, and he seemed to agree. As they got closer grandpa realized it was a road block and became a little concerned, remembering the county sheriff passing them on their road as they left the house, he was thinking to himself that he was pretty sure he had their bank robber. So he pushed her up a little on the speedometer so they got there a little faster. As they approached the road block his passenger didn't say a word nor did he have a chance to because they had 5 to 7 guns pointed right at him. They opened the door an jerked the passenger right out to the ground and hand cuffed him.

As grandpa walked around the car to see what they were doing to him, the bank robber/passenger asked grandpa "Bert, can you help me out a little?" My grandpa just turned around and walked away. That was probably the first and only time my grandpa ever turned his back on anyone, but he knew it was best.

Grandpa became quite notorious for his little jaunt to Wabash that day. Reporters from Marion, Huntington, Wabash, and Fort Wayne all had to have the scoop on the story. Even the Chicago tribune caught wind of the story and put a little paragraph in their paper to. As for the robbers, the man who attempted the bank robbery was actually on parole from serving a 10 year sentence for bank robbery. Now he was charged with the Kokomo bank robbery and the attempted bank robbery of Andrews and possibly the robbery of the convenience store in Wabash. The real kicker of the story is this same man pitched hay for grandpa one summer with his brothers when they were younger. As for the stranger/wheelman/passenger that grandpa took to Wabash, he served his time and was never seen or heard of again. As I think back, the kid made two very important life decisions that day a bad one by driving the getaway car for the bank robber and then the good one, getting away from the bank robbery and when he wrecked the getaway car he

BLOOD DRIVE

The American Red Cross calls on eligible donors with all blood types to help maintain a sufficient blood supply this summer

The American Red Cross encourages all eligible blood donors to make an appointment to donate blood soon to help prevent a shortage.

During the summer months, on average, about two fewer donors give blood at each Red Cross blood drive than what is needed to meet the needs of patients. Vacations and summer activities are among the reasons regular donors may not find the time to give. But, patients don't get a vacation from needing blood - the need is constant.

As a national network, the Red Cross has a unique responsibility to help ensure blood is available for patients whenever and wherever it is needed. By donating blood or platelets through the Red Cross, donors may be helping patients in their community or patients across the na-

Red blood cells have a shelf life of only 42 days and platelets just five days, so they must constantly be replenished.

GRADUATES

Andrew R. Hueston has graduated from the U.S. Army Air Assault School and earned the honor of wearing the Air Assault Badge.

The 10-day course of instruction focuses on combat assault operations involving Army helicopter warfare operations associated with hands-on, performance-oriented training. The physically and mentally demanding training includes a nine-station obstacle course, a two-mile load rigging and inspection of prepared lift loads, and tower and helicopter rappelling fast rope operations. Students are familiarized with the capabilities, knowledge and recognition of Army helicopters, aircraft, airborne and airmobile operations, set up of parachute and landing zones, safety procedures, and aeromedical evacuation opera-

Students must complete a 12mile foot march in three hours or less wearing the prescribed uniform with weapon, equipment and a 30-pound backpack. The foot march is a graded task and a graduation requirement of the air assault course, designed to test strength, stamina and endurance.

About the Museum

The Red Skelton Museum of American Comedy is designed to preserve and share the legacy of Vincennes native Red Skelton, an internationally recognized entertainer whose talents included comedy, pantomime, painting, composing, and writing. Located adjacent to the \$20 million Red Skelton Performing Arts Center on the campus of Vincennes University, the Museum provides a showcase for some of the \$5 million collection of Skelton's costumes, props, awards, and memorabilia, that have been donated by his widow, Lothian Skelton.

About Red Skelton

Widely recognized as one of the pioneers of television in the 1950s, Red Skelton had one of the longest runs of any television program, a 20-year, top-rated show that brought to life many legendary characters, such as Freddie the Freeloader. His career also spanned radio, the movies, painting, and musical composition. Born in Vincennes in 1913, Skelton died in 1997 and is remembered as one of the nation s most beloved entertainers.

TEACHING KIDS TO GIVE BACK

(BPT) - One of the most rewarding reasons to get involved in your community is to set a good example for your kids. Whether you donate money or time, giving back is beneficial, and not just for the recipients. The reward for your selfless acts can be a beautiful thing for both your community and your children's future. But what are some of the ways you can teach kids to give back and what age should you begin encouraging them?

Giving back is just as much about volunteering as it is about philanthropy. Dr. Lois Winchell, child and family therapist at Argosy University, Sarasota, believes it should be a combination of both. "If we want our children to give back, our families need to be involved in multiple activities," says Winchell. "These include volunteering resources and time and giving money when possible. Learning how to donate time can be a very powerful lesson for children because it is a giving of ourselves. This intimate experience can be significant and can often reap a more personal reward than the offering of money and things."

As with everything else in life, kids learn best by example. The closer you can bring your child to the recipient of the gift, the more personal the experience becomes.

"Nurturing a sense of giving and making sure this is a value for vour children starts as early as age 3 or 4," says Winchell. "At this developmental age, we can teach them that others have feelings and that your child has an impact on those feelings. This sense of empathy is the underpinning of charity. The most significant impact on our children is what they actually see us doing as it relates to a giving spirit. As we engage in specific projects, we can have conversations with our children regarding why the project is important and who will benefit."

Start by expanding their sense of environment, from the immediate family to their local community and eventually the world around them. A sense of awareness of something greater than themselves is important in raising a compassionate individual. This sense of responsibility to others and the environment as a world citizen can be supported

by making children aware of others' needs whether in visiting a shelter or a food banks with family members or simply helping younger siblings.

"From infancy to about 5 years old, children aren't necessarily capable of thinking outside of themselves. Even so, parents need to foster their child's sharing with others," says Winchell. As children grow older they can begin volunteering and supporting community projects more directly. Whether they donate toys to a children's shelter or simply participate in a walk for charity, these years are important for a child to learn the art of giving back. When they become teenagers, they can do even more for the community by assisting an elderly neighbor with his yard work or helping out at a local food bank or soup kitchen. Additionally, it is important to convey the message that "giving back" does not include an expectation of getting something in return. Instead, highlight the sense of joy in being able to make someone happy and how those feelings are the greater gift.

"When a child experiences sharing and the serving of others, an internal sense of contentment and self-worth is experienced," says Winchell. "This selfenhancement and sense of belonging is coincident with their giving and results in a benefit that cannot be gained any other way. This sense of happiness and accomplishment then contributes to their positive sense of self." In other words, teaching kids to give back is one of the best things a parent can do for the community and the child.

SEVEN TIPS FOR A GREENER

BACK-TO-SCHOOL SEASON
(BPT) - With back-to-school

(BPT) - With back-to-school shopping, changing schedules and preparing kids for the upcoming school year, your family's environmental impact may be the last thing on your mind.

It is possible to have a greener back-to-school season. Here are seven simple things parents and children can do to care for the environment - and themselves - as they return to school.

1. Reuse and recycle notebooks. While high schoolers may go through multiple notebooks per subject every year, it's rare for elementary school-aged kids to use up their notebooks. Tear out used pages (and recycle them, of course) from last year's notebooks so that kids can use the remaining blank pages. Use contact paper to freshen and reinforce covers that are worn or written on.

2. Give broken and worn down crayons new life. Gather all the bits and separate by color. Remove all papers. Using a minimuffin pan (or mini ramekins in fun shapes), fill each cup with crayon pieces in one color. Melt in an oven set at 350 degrees just until crayons are completely melted. Cool at room temperature, then freeze for 30 minutes to make it easier to remove the newly formed crayons.

Shortly after all of this happened, we decided it was time for grandma and grandpa to move to Warren to be closer to the family. They were getting up in their ages and was just needing a little extra help every now and then. It was very hard for grandpa to leave his house, he had lived there since he was 7 years old, but he willingly did.

Almost 9 years to the day of the robbery, July 16th 1985, we lost my Grandpa Forst. He was the rock of our family, the man who was a WWI vet, whom raced motorcycles, who raised a family of 6 children, who helped make kitchen cabinets for Bob Hope and Lucille Ball when he worked at Kitchen Maid and of course had his 15 minutes of fame with the "getaway car". He lived those 91 years of his life to the fullest and I can only hope that my life will be lived to the fullest like his was.
