HARVEST SAFETY

Farmers across Huntington, County are now returning to their fields for the fall harvest season, which means an increase in farming equipment on the roadways. Drivers should be on the lookout for orange triangular slow-moving vehicle signs on the back of farming machinery. These signs indicate a vehicle is traveling at 25 miles per hour or slower and drivers should be prepared to slow down as they approach.

"Our community has a strong agricultural base, and there will be many tractors on the road in the coming weeks," said Janis Highley, Huntington County Farm Bureau PR Coordinator.

Highley said that many drivers don't realize how fast they may close in on a tractor or farm machinery.

"It only takes about five seconds to close a gap the size of a football field if a car is going 55 mph and a tractor is going 15 mph," she said.

Farm equipment is wide, sometimes taking up most of the roadway. Drivers are asked to be patient with farmers on the road. Most farmers will pull over at the first safe opportunity to let other vehicles pass, but drivers should be certain that a tractor is pulling over rather than planning a left turn.

Farmers on roadways are going to or from work. Please be alert and patient with farming machinery on the roads this fall as farming is an

important part of the economy of Huntington County.

TALKING ABOUT DRUGS IS PART OF BEING A PARENT

With the new school year just underway, it's an excellent time for parents to have a serious discussion with their children. No, not that awkward sex talk but a conversation even more important, one about illicit drugs and the dangers they represent.

With marijuana now legal, either medically or recreationally, in all but four states, it has helped reduce the negative stigma, especially for young people, that once applied to all drugs. For many teens, these changes in society may have them thinking that other drugs, whether illegal street drugs or stolen prescription pills, are probably okay as well.

With virtually every child exposed to illicit drugs these days, talking about the issue is a critical part of parenting. And it's a conversation that experts recommend starting as early as age five.

A five year old can understand, when given clear explanations by a parent, why substances like cigarettes, alcohol and household products can all be harmful, and why to never to swallow a pill or anything else that mom and dad hasn't given them.

For older children, parents should help a child develop a "plan of action" about what to do when confronted with drugs. Ask questions such as, "What would you do if a friend wanted you to try drugs?" "How would you feel about that person?" Listen to your child's responses without being critical. Try to gently lead him or her into thinking in appropriate ways about the situation, without criticizing or forcing your own ideas on the child. You want to ensure that your child has thought about drug-related issues, rather than being shocked or overwhelmed when drugs are encountered in the real world.

With teenagers, try questioning what drugs might mean to their lives. If a child is considering college or military service, discuss what effect drugs might have on achieving those goals.

Basic education about the problems and dangers that drugs can bring is an effective tool in helping your child, especially in light of the current opioid epidemic and increasing numbers of illicit fentanyl deaths.

Parental behavior also matters. Discard those left-over pain pills in your medicine cabinet. Keep tabs on prescribed medications. Be a good model. When children are aware that parents use drugs or drink heavily, it is hard for them to see why they can't do the same themselves.

"But we offer a lot of other helpful information and resources, too, so we hope each person who attends will visit the booths and talk with our expert team members. Healthy Steps is a great chance to be proactive about your health and learn and have fun at the same time."

New features at the October event will be a demonstration of Tai Chi, which can be used as a therapy; tours of the Sleep Disorders Center in the adjoining John B. Kay Medical Office Building; an aromatherapy booth; and information on Parkview OnDemand. This new telehealth service enables a person to have a virtual visit with a healthcare provider for non-emergency health needs, such as coughs, cold, flu, and earaches.

Parkview OnDemand providers are available 24/7, and are as close as an app on your smart phone.

It's flu season, so a limited number of \$20 flu shots will be available.

Free health screenings will include hearing, vision, dental health, balance, skin cancer, bone density, foot health, and breathing. Blood pressure checks, grip strength testing, help with Parkview McChart, and "Ask the Pharmacist" will also be free. Guests can try out their dexterity on the free surgery demo, too.

Reduced-cost lab testing will be located across from the café on the lower level of the hospital. Wellness packages that combine several tests for one price can be a good

option for people who need more than one type of blood test. Test packages run from \$30 to \$95, depending on the tests included. Single tests include hemogram; TSH (thyroid); hemoglobin A1C; PSA (prostate); ultrasensitive CRP; vitamin D 25 hydroxy; comprehensive metabolic profile, or CMP (glucose, liver function, electrolytes); lipid profile (cholesterols and triglycerides); and iron. Single tests range from \$10 to \$25, except for the vitamin D test, which is \$40. In keeping with Medicare compliance rules, PHH must now charge a lab draw fee of \$5 per person at this event; this fee applies whether a person orders one test or multiple tests.

Appointments can be scheduled for digital mammograms and \$50 HeartSmart CT scans during Healthy Steps. HeartSmart CT is appropriate for adults age 45 and older who have risk factors for heart disease. To schedule your test for October 6, call 260-355-3400.

A wide variety of PHH services and programs, as well as services by other Parkview entities, will be represented at booths throughout the hospital lobby and lower level.

PHH provides free valet parking for the event. The gift shop will be open, and the HOSPITALity Café will be serving breakfast and more. The café has recently added to its wide variety of snack and beverage options.

GET WALKIN

Are you ready to get moving, improve your health and enjoy life more? Get WalkIN' is a free e-mail based walking program being offered through Purdue Extension in Wells County that will run from October 1 – December 21. Participants can sign-up, walk on their own and receive e-mailed support and information. It is designed to encourage individuals to learn more about the health benefits of walking and encourage individuals to get moving.

Walking is a popular form of physical activity—and good for your health! Only half of all American adults get the recommended amount of physical activity. Lack of physical activity is directly related to the occurrence of adult obesity and overweight. Regular physical activity can lower risk of heart disease, high blood pressure, type 2 diabetes, osteoporosis, depression, and falls in older adults. Walking is an excellent way for most people to increase their physical activity. It is an easy way to start and maintain a physically active lifestyle.

Walking is accessible to almost anyone, doesn't require specific skills or abilities to perform, can be performed alone or with others, and is adaptable (i.e., can be performed at any

chosen intensity, and is inexpensive). Walking can serve many purposes. It can be a way to exercise, have fun, or get to school, work, or other nearby destinations. Importantly, making walking easier can help communities by improving safety, social cohesion, and local economies and reducing air pollution.

Do you know that you need to get more active but lack the initiative to get started? Do you make excuses like "I do not have time, I don't want to walk alone, or where would I walk?" Have you started to walk and lost interest or motivation? Get WalkIN' is just for you! You will receive e-mails that provide encouragement, motivation, provide information about health and wellness, and more! Participants will be asked to complete two short online surveys. Before you know it, you will be walking, feeling better, having more energy, and a new healthy habit!

RECOVERY MONTH

September is Recovery Month, a time to increase awareness and understanding of substance use disorders and celebrate the people who recover. This year's theme, "Join the Voices for Recovery: Invest in Health, Home,

Purpose, and Community," explores how integrated care, a strong community, sense of purpose, and leadership contributes to effective treatments that sustain the recovery of people with substance use disorders.

Oftentimes, individuals with a substance use disorder feel isolated and alone. It's important that these individuals are supported with environments and relationships that promote acceptance. Support from families and the community greatly assist recovery.

I conduct most of the assessments for the Adams County Drug Court. While the story below was not directly shared with me, it includes many common themes I hear from several of those afflicted with substance use disorders: "Growing up, I struggled with depression, anger, isolation, loneliness and tiredness. No emotions existed; just a feeling of apathy.

I was molested as a child by two people. As I got older, I ran away a lot and skipped school. I just wanted to be away from my chaotic household. This caused me to be put on probation. I started to use marijuana at the age of 13.

That's when I discovered the numbness that using gave...and it seemed easier to deal with life while I was high. Drugs took away my emotional pain and made me feel like I could face another day...at first. Before long, I needed drugs just to function daily. I was heavily self-medicating with drugs. I

couldn't see anything in my life but drugs.

It wasn't long before I started facing all the consequences of my addiction. I say "lost," but really I gave up on my kids after raising them alone for 12 years. I lost custody and visitation rights. I couldn't keep an apartment. I was just chasing the next high. My life was unmanageable and in shambles. My depression had gotten so severe that I couldn't take it anymore. So I decided to end my own life. I took handfuls of someone else's psychotic medications. I woke up four days later in the hospital. I knew I was done; I was at my rock bottom. I used for 19 years.

Today I am sober and my life is absolutely better. I am getting the things back that addiction took from me. I have joint custody of my children and my family relationships are amazing...all because I chose recovery."

Substance use disorders can be treated. Working in the recovery field, I have witnessed that individuals who embrace recovery achieve improved mental and physical health and form stronger relationships with their family members, peers, and community.

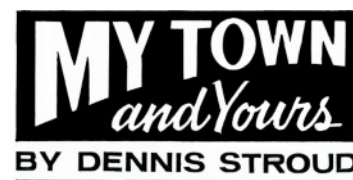

IN 1888 SCHOOL

In 1888, Warren School passed out of the hands of the township trustee to town management. The members of the school board were appointed by the town council and served three years, one going out each year. This board built a new two story, six room brick schoolhouse, where the one story wood frame house stood. About eight years later an addition was added towards the east and it contain two more rooms. It served that way until 1907. That year a modern high school building was erected to the south of the older structure on the corner.

In 1922, mounting cost and the desire for a consolidated township school led to the abandonment of

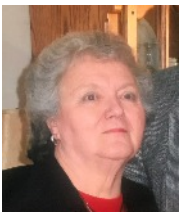

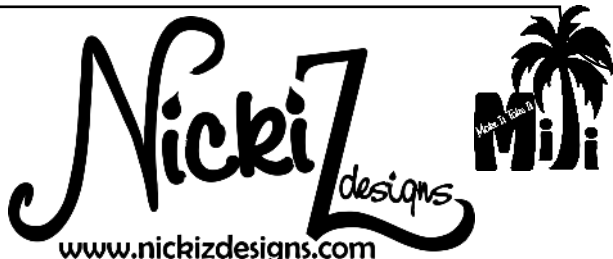
