PHH HOSTS CHECK-UP DAY AS ALTERNATIVE TO CANCELED HEALTH FAIR

Parkview Huntington Hospital will host a Check-Up Day on two days in October to offer lab testing. The event will be held as an alternative to the hospital's health and wellness fair, Healthy Steps, which was cancelled in July due to concerns about large gatherings and ongoing spread of the coronavirus that causes COVID-19.

"We know many area residents who normally attend Healthy Steps get lab work done in the spring or fall and then meet with their primary care physicians to discuss results and next steps for their health," said Juli Johnson, president, PHH. "Even though we can't offer the usual wellness fair screenings and other features, we wanted to enable people to still get their lab tests done. So we've partnered with the Parkview Center for Healthy Living to offer Check-Up Day, which is focused on lab testing."

Center for Healthy Living team members will be in the Wellness Classrooms at PHH on Monday, Oct. 12, and Saturday, Oct. 17, from 7 to 9:30 a.m. Pre-registration by phone is required, and spacing will be established to allow social distancing.

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PICKLEBALL AT TOWER PARK

Pickleball...have you heard of it? It's considered as one of America's fastest growing sports. Masks must be worn at all times.

Slots are very limited for both dates. Call 260-266-6500 or 844-835-0003 to pre-register. Callers should leave a message including their name, phone number and their selection of either the Oct. 12 or Oct. 17 date.

The Center for Healthy Living will provide the lab draws and pre-registration services. Payment must be made in advance and by credit card only. Individuals calling to pre-register will receive a reminder call from a Center team member, who will collect the credit card information. On the business day prior to the selected Check-Up Day event, the individual's credit card will be charged for the tests they've chosen.

Tests offered will be familiar to Healthy Steps guests, and will include these single tests: hemogram (\$10); prostate specific antigen, or PSA (\$30), for men over 50; thyroid stimulating hormone, or TSH (\$30); hemoglobin A1C (\$20); and vitamin D (\$40). Wellness packages A, B, C and D all offer a lipid profile and comprehensive metabolic profile. Package A is \$35. Package B adds a hemogram to the other two tests for a cost of \$45. Package C adds the hemogram plus hemoglobin A1C and TSH test for a cost of \$80. Package D is the same as Package C but adds the PSA for men and costs \$105.

"We're very pleased we can offer Check-Up Day so people can get the tests they need while still being confident that appropriate precautions are being taken," said Johnson. "Above all, we always want our patients, co-workers and visitors to be safe."

A TRIP TO QUEBEC CITY DAY # 5

After breakfast, we boarded the bus for a ride through the eastern countryside. Five kilometers later, we stopped at Isle D' Orleans which is located in the middle of the St. Lawrence River. The river in this section is several

times wider than it is near Quebec City. This island is largely agricultural, with strawberries being the most popular crop. I had an urge to pick some, but the sound of the bus engine starting changed my mind. My loss!

The 7,000 residents living on the island are scattered among six municipalities.

The villages of Sainte-Famille and Sainte-Petronille are two noted villages and featured a large concentration of stone houses. A church, vintage 1743, with three bell towers and a red roof was also noteworthy.

We traveled another 25 kilometers east and toured the Sainte-Anne Basilica. It is one of five national shrines in Canada that were created by the Catholic Church. The sacred building is thought to have the ability to miraculously cure the sick and disabled. I really felt different upon leaving that remarkable, health-fulfilling building, but then I hadn't had lunch yet.

We traversed through the University of Laval campus in Quebec City, drove past the American style football stadium, and their dental school. My interests.

After a lunch at a Quebec City Subway eatery, several travelers requested a return trip back to the same morning's region to visit the Cyclorama, a building adjacent to the previously

mentioned Basilica. It had captured the attention of a few of us as we left that area in the morning.

Inside the Cyclorama was a huge mural on the circular wall that depicted the life of Jesus. Only a certain number of people were allowed to enter the center, upper level of the building at a time due to space availability. Or was it a fire marshal ruling? Anyway, the center platform revolved slowly. That was a very smartly designed idea.

One could see history without moving a muscle.

Well, eye muscles got involved at times. It was well worth the extra trip.

Our tour guide informed us that the large houses in Quebec City were originally built to accommodate numerous children. Now the family size has decreased significantly and many of the houses have been converted into condos or apartments.

Many of these are not rented, but purchased-- a must buy requirement. The cost can be \$300,000. Other areas have apartments that rent for \$500/month.

Children start their education at an early age. Many 2-3 year old kids start learning. Four year old children are enrolled in kindergarten. There is no middle school. Elementary grades include 1-6 and then it is on to high school.

Quebec City reminds me of San Francisco with its steep

and sometimes, meandering streets that migrate between two levels of the city. For pedestrians, there exists the "Funicular," locally known in the French culture as Funiculaire du Vieux-Quebec which was built by Wm. Griffith in 1879. It is a tension track system that transports people between the city levels. It saves effort and seems to be "fun" for residents and tourist alike.

There is an adjacent stairway for the hearty soul. We thoughtfully walked down the stairs and consequently rode the Funicular back up just to say we did it. When in Quebec, do.....!

Back to history again, Samuel de Champlain, a naval office and explorer was the first to establish a French settlement in Canada and named it Quebec City in 1608.

The name originated from the native Algonquin word, kebec which means where the river narrows. Champlain was called the "Father of New France" and later became the de Facto governor of it. He also explored a large lake between the states of New York and Vermont for which was ultimately named, Lake Champlain.

Our group had dinner at Cotes et Cotes Restaurant in the Old Quebec section of the city. I don't remember what I ordered for the meal or how we got back to the Hotel Chateau Laurier because my ballpoint pen ran out of ink. If I can find a good hotel pen, I'll write more tomorrow.

APPLY FOR PAID INTERNSHIP

State Rep. Dan Leonard (R-Huntington) encourages local college students and recent graduates looking to gain valuable work experience to apply online for a paid internship with the Indiana House of Representatives at the Statehouse in Indianapolis.

Before the start of each legislative session, House Republicans hire interns to help legislators and staff with the increased workload. Positions are open to sophomores, juniors, and seniors, as well as recent college graduates, and law school and graduate students.

"In my time here at the Statehouse, I've seen a number of talented interns come through our program," Leonard said. "They've all walked away with many great experiences while working here during each fast-paced legislative session. I encourage local college students to seriously consider this amazing opportunity."

According to Leonard, all majors are welcome to apply online for internships in a variety of areas, including legislative operations, communications and media relations, policy and fiscal policy. Previous political or government experience is not required.

These full-time internships take place Monday through

Friday, lasting from January through April in 2021. Interns receive biweekly compensation of \$750, and can earn academic credit through their college or university. Interns are also eligible for a competitive \$3,000 scholarship to use toward undergraduate and graduate expenses.

"These are just some of the tangible benefits of the House internship program, but there is so much more," Leonard said. "The networking alone is an excellent opportunity and resource, with many of our former interns gaining full-time positions within state government or private sector."

Leonard said the legislature may make certain changes to the internship program due to the impacts of COVID-19 and social distancing requirements, but any adjustments will be communicated to candidates and intern hires.

Students should apply before the Oct. 31 deadline online at IndianaHouseRepublicans.com/internship.

National Public Lands Day is the nation's largest single-day volunteer effort involving public lands. State park properties will have programs for visitors to volunteer as individuals or as part of many events across Indiana, but they can also choose to visit and just enjoy their favorite areas.

Outdoor enthusiasts can also combine visiting and volunteering by grabbing a bucket and taking on the 5 gallon challenge.

Sept. 26 is also National Hunting and Fishing Day, an opportunity to celebrate the role of hunting, recreational shooting, trapping, and fishing in conservation. In addition to participating in volunteer activities, sportsmen and sportswomen can take along someone new as they enjoy the last Free Fishing Day of the year (dnr.IN.gov/fishfree) or share their passion with youth by participating in Youth Deer Season (wildlife.IN.gov/9323.htm).

On Sunday, Sept. 27, Indiana State Parks, Indiana State Forests, and State Recreation Areas will offer free admission where entrance fees are normally charged.

The entire weekend serves as a reminder that public lands are places for outdoor recreation, conservation, and making memories with families and friends. Events include hikes, pioneer activities, crafts, Learn to Fish events (on.IN.gov/learn2fish), and live bird shows.

FARMLAND AVAILABLE FOR RENT

Mississinewa and Salamonie lakes have farmland available for rent as part of their habitat management. These limited acres at each

property are rented to maintain early successional habitat, and a portion of the crop is left standing to provide supplemental food for wildlife. Multiple units are available on contracts that span the next four years. Some bids are due by Sept. 23.

The tenant must plant crops designated by the property's wildlife biologist and provide the services listed in the lease in addition to the cash bid.

The term for each lease bid shall be for approximately four years beginning Jan. 2021 and ending Dec. 2024.

So, take a close look at these key areas of your benefits program:

Health insurance – Think about your health care needs over the coming year – will you or someone in your family be coping with a chronic illness or facing a surgery? Will you need to at least consider testing and possible treatment for COVID-19? In any case, make sure you're choosing the right plan for your needs. And pay close attention to any changes in your health insurance, such as whether the plan's provider networks have changed – you may want to make sure your own doctor is still in-network.
