GREETINGS FROM THE RETIRED UPTOWN GARDENER

Thank you for the nice compliments I get about the writings. Treva has been doing. Guess I brought her up proper but have had a few times with slight doubts.

I and a few others have been volunteering sewing at Heritage Pointe for several years, but with this terrible virus we have not been there since March, we miss all the fun and people we have helped over the years and are looking forward to the day we can be back, we miss our weekly visit with residents and employees.

Nearly every year I get a call asking for the recipe for the Divinity Fudge. I will share this again even though I won't be making it myself. This recipe is from my Mom's 1929 Farmers Guide cook book which I have as one of my cherished things from my mom. The book has seen its better time and it is a handle with care.

Divinity Fudge

Mix together 2 1/2 cup white sugar, 1/2 cup corn syrup and 1/2 cup water. Cook till it forms soft ball test which you do by dropping a bit in water to form the soft ball. Beat 2 room temperature egg whites till very stiff and dry texture, very slowly add the hot syrup to egg white beating it all together using only about half and return the rest to stove and reheat till it forms hard boil stage adding the rest into the egg white mixture. This is where modern day comes in I use the electric mixer and continue beating till it becomes creamy and solid texture. Add in pecans or what ever nuts you choose. Drop by spoonful onto parchment lined bake sheet and let cool.

Christmas at home (my house) will be sparse this year both girls have special plans with their families and they have my blessings to do so. I can remember the first time Wayne and I were home alone on Christmas Day we were not sure how we were going to be without them, but by the end of the day Wayne said it was kind of nice and quiet "Lets do this again sometime."

This year my heart aches for all those who will spend it alone from various tragedies and the virus situation and what ever has fallen upon them. I have been listening to a lot of music on youtube and came across a song titled Till the Storm Passes By, it has I think a beautiful message we can all

FROM THE JOHN HOPKINS HOSPITAL

(Editors Note: This article was posted on Facebook. After reading it I tried to do a little research on it. Dr. Bonnie Henry is legit, although I couldn't verify the rest of the information it does seem to be logical and common sense. So please read this article and make your own opinions.)

Here is some very useful COVID information from the John Hopkins Hospital information sheet relative to Coronavirus 19.

It is extremely informative and seems to be about the latest release of personal handling of this medical issue and is worth the time to study the information given for your personal care. Stay safe and stay well.

This certainly makes the CoVid -19 protection methods more understandable.

* This virus is not a living organism. It is a protein molecule (RNA or DNA) covered by a protective layer of lipid (fat), which, when absorbed by the cells of the ocular (eyes), nasal (nose) or

buccal mucosa (mouth), changes their genetic code (mutates) and converts into aggressor and multiplier cells.

* Since the virus is not a living organism, but is a protein molecule, it cannot be killed. It has to decay on its own. The disintegration time depends on the temperature, humidity and type of material where it lies.

* The virus is very fragile; the only thing that protects it is a thin outer layer of fat, and that is the reason why soap or detergent is the best weapon. The foam CUTS THE FAT (that is why you have to scrub for 20 seconds or more, to create lots of foam). By dissolving the fat layer, the protein molecule disperses and breaks down.

* HEAT melts fat; this is why it is necessary to use water above 77 degrees for hand washing, laundry and cleaning surfaces. In addition, hot water makes more foam, making it more effective.

* Alcohol or any mixture with alcohol over 65% DISSOLVES ALL FAT, especially the external lipid layer of the virus.

* Any solution with 1 part bleach and 5 parts water directly dissolves the protein, breaking it down from the inside.

* Oxygenated water increases the effectiveness of soap, alcohol, and chlorine, because peroxide dissolves the virus protein. However, because you have to use it in its pure form, it can damage your skin.

* NO BACTERICIDE OR ANTIBIOTIC WILL WORK

because the virus is not a living organism like bacteria; antibodies cannot kill what is not alive.

* The virus molecules remain very stable at colder temperatures, including air conditioning in houses and cars. They also need moisture and darkness to stay stable. Therefore, dehumidified, dry, warm and bright environments will degrade the virus faster.

* UV LIGHT on any object that may contain the virus breaks down the protein. Be careful, it also breaks down collagen (which is protein) in the skin.

* The virus CANNOT go through healthy skin.

* Vinegar is NOT useful because it does not break down the protective layer of fat.

* NO SPIRITS, NOR VODKA, serve. The strongest vodka is only 40% alcohol, and you need a minimum of 65%.

* LISTERINE is 65% alcohol.

* The more confined the space, the higher the concentration of the virus there can be. The more open or naturally ventilated, the less.

* You have to wash your hands before and after touching any commonly used surfaces such as: mucosa (mouth area), food, locks, knobs, switches, remotes, cell phones, watches, computers, desks etc... and

don't forget when you use the bathroom.

* You have to MOISTURIZE YOUR HANDS due to frequent washing. Dry hands have cracks and the molecules can hide in the micro cracks. The thicker the moisturizer, the better.

* Also keep your NAILS SHORT so that the virus does not hide there.

Now for some additional input:

Dr. Bonnie Henry is the Provincial Health Officer for British Columbia, the first woman in this position. She is also an associate professor at the University of British Columbia. She has a background in epidemiology and is a specialist in public health and preventive medicine. She is also from PEI (Prince Edward Island).

The Wisdom of Dr. Bonnie Henry

1. We may have to live with COVID-19 for months or years. Let's not deny it or panic. Let's not make our lives useless. Let's learn to live with this fact.

2. You can't destroy COVID-19 viruses that have penetrated cell walls, by drinking gallons of hot water you'll just go to the bathroom more often.

3. Washing hands and maintaining a two-meter physical distance is the best method for your protection.

4. If you don't have a COVID-19 patient at home, there's

no need to disinfect the surfaces at your house.

5. Packaged cargo, gas pumps, shopping carts and ATMs do not cause infection. If you wash your hands, live your life as usual.

6. COVID-19 is not a food infection. It is associated with drops of infection like the 'flu'. There is no demonstrated risk that COVID-19 is transmitted by food.

7. You can lose your sense of smell with a lot of allergies and viral infections. This is only a non-specific symptom of COVID-19.

8. Once at home, you don't need to change your clothes urgently and go shower! Purity is a virtue, paranoia is not!

9. The COVID-19 virus doesn't hang in the air for long. This is a respiratory droplet infection that requires close contact.

10. The air is clean; you can walk through the gardens and through parks (just keeping your physical protection distance).

11. It is sufficient to use normal soap against COVID-19, not antibacterial soap. This is a virus, not a bacterium.

12. You don't have to worry about your food orders. But you can heat it all up in the microwave if you wish.

13. The chances of bringing COVID-19 home with your shoes is like being struck by lightning twice in a day. I've been working against viruses for 20 years — drop infections don't spread like that!

14. You can't be protected from the virus by taking vinegar, sugarcane juice and ginger! These are for immunity not a cure.

15. Wearing a mask for long periods interferes with your breathing and oxygen levels. Wear it only in crowds.

16. Wearing gloves is also a bad idea; the virus can accumulate into the glove and be easily transmitted if you touch your face. Better just to wash your hands

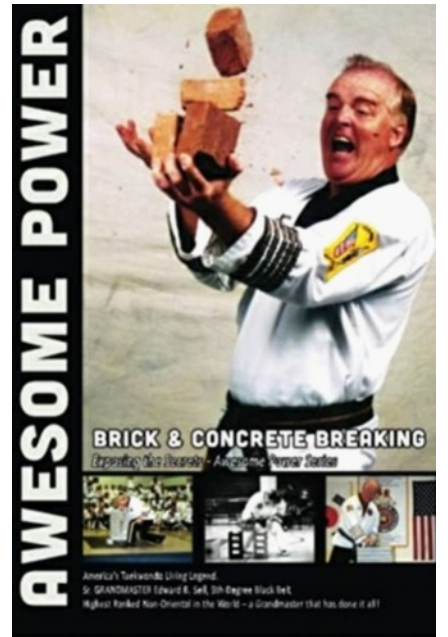
OLD MEN WITH GOALS CAN BREAK BRICKS

by Master Howard

My TKD instructor, Senior Grandmaster Edward B. Sell was the highest ranking non-Asian in the world. He was known for breaking bricks. It takes 320 lb of pressure to break one brick. Let me repeat that - 320 lb of pressure! That's a lot of pressure!

Most people break bricks by laying them on a hard surface. This is a "power break." Grand Master Sell didn't do it that way. What Grandmaster Sell did was a "speed break." He broke bricks by holding two of them in his hand at shoulder height and snapping both of them at once - just like in this picture! That's 640 lb of pressure! It wasn't just a one time thing either. He did it repeatedly throughout his life.

When I became a master, I asked for advice from other masters so I could learn how to break bricks and then began practicing. It is very different from breaking boards or cement blocks like you do at the lower belt levels.



One year we did a TKD demo in Warren on July 4th. When we finished, we started back down Main Street to our cars. One of my students turned to me and asked to learn how to break bricks like I just had in the demo.

Interestingly, the night before, a former grocery store building right there on Main Street that was made of bricks had fallen down. One of my other students grabbed some of the bricks and started handing them to me from the crumbled building. Right there in front of the building, I started showing the student who had asked how to break bricks. I got down on my knees and broke a brick on the cement. I'm not as good as Grandmaster Sell - I can't break one holding it shoulder high. When I snapped that first brick, the crowd that had gathered clapped! I looked around and realized that I had a bigger crowd watching me teach my student how to break bricks than we had at the earlier demo!

I took some of the bricks with me - for the next

time I wanted to do a demo. I still have some of those bricks in my vehicle so I'll always have some for a breaking demo - a little piece of Warren's history in the back of my vehicle!

Learning to break bricks takes practice, confidence, and proper technique. Those three attributes help in life, too. Why don't you come to our online Zoom class and start learning TKD. You'll meet new friends. Build confidence. AND - maybe someday you'll learn how to break a brick!

We are called Christian Martial Arts Ministries. Right now we are meeting online. If you are interested, check us out on Monday nights on Facebook at Christian Martial Arts Ministries @CMAMtkd. I will be doing a live question 6:00 p.m. You can message me for more information or if you have any questions.

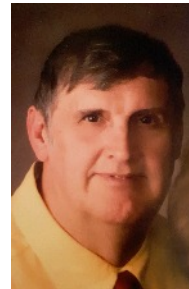

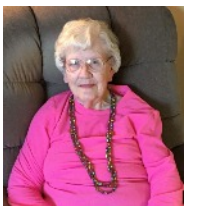

NRCS DEADLINES

Farm bill program deadlines have been set for Indiana's agricultural producers who want to improve natural resources and address concerns on their land. The USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) announced that December 18 will be the application deadline for the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) and January 8 will be the application deadline for the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) in Indiana.

EQIP and CSP are voluntary conservation programs available for agricultural producers. Through EQIP, NRCS provides financial and

technical assistance to install conservation practices that reduce soil erosion and sedimentation, improve soil health, improve water and air quality and create wildlife habitat. Through CSP, NRCS provides assistance to producers who are already practicing good stewardship to take their natural resource management to the next level. The program helps to improve both their agricultural production and provide valuable conservation benefits such as cleaner and more abundant water, as well as healthier soils and better wildlife habitat.

"As the original stewards of our local land and resources, agricultural producers are doing great work. We encourage them to complete the applications by the announced deadlines to see if they can receive assistance to implement structural and management conservation practices that optimize

environmental benefits on their working agricultural land while helping to increase their yields," says Ceres Solutions Agronomist Betsy Bower. For more information, farmers can consult their Ceres team or their local NRCS office.
