Focus On Kids

Sandwiched between the Artist Market and Stage 3 from 10a.m.-7p.m. at the May 17 Festival of the Arts is a kid zone— an area set aside to celebrate the little artists. This part of the festival map includes two main areas—Imagination Square and the Chalkwalk.

Imagination Square is just that, a tented area encompassing a square of tables for children to imagine and create art. Each of the four sides of Imagination Square will offer participants an opportunity to test their talents with a different medium.

The painting station includes tempra paints, watercolors and wet artistic tools. The drawing side includes pencils, crayons, markers, stencils, stamps and any dry artistic utensils. There is a sculpting station, for kids to use clay and Play-dog to build masterpieces. And the Inventor Center is the fourth station. It includes a stock of crafters' supplies for kids to pilfer through, pull out and affix to their "art."

Each creation costs 50 cents. Smocks are available for the messy artists.

Imagination Square is dedicated in memory of Warren School art and music teacher Ethel M. Click.

The second component of this kid-zone is the Chalkwalk. Although not limited to children, this activity is tailored to kids.

Admiral Seiberlich and USS Salamonie Bring More

Rear Admiral Carl J. Seiberlich, the final captain of the USS Salamonie and several other of her crew were on hand last Friday for a dedication presentation.

After the ship was decommissioned, Seiberlich felt that the history of the ship needed to be remembered and honored. He then created a plaque telling the history of the ship. That plaque was then presented to, then, Indiana Gov. Roger Branigin. The Governor accepted the plaque and gave it a place of honor in the lobby at the Salamonie Reservoir. Over the year's the plaque had been pushed back into storage and was misplaced for a time. Through the efforts of several people involved, the plaque was found, restored and presented back to R. Adm. Seiberlich who then presented it to the Knight Civic Center to become part of the USS Salamonie Museum exhibit.

Tom Applegate, Honorary Chief Petty Officer of the USS Salamonie, and local Huntington County Veteran's Service Officer, was the master of ceremonies. The group was also welcomed by Janice Jordan, Knight Civic Center Board Secretary.

Others dignitaries present and speaking were John Lichoff and Tom Keske, President and Treasurer of the USS Salamonie Association, Neil Case, former property manager of Salamonie Reservoir, Phyllis Pond, Indiana State Representative, Rep Dan Leonard, Rose Meldrum, Executive Director of Huntington County Tourism and John Goss, Director of Indiana DNR. A Salute to USS Salamonie video was played for the benefit of all who attended.

Following the plaque presentation and lunch, John Lichoff presented quite a few new (old) items for the museum. Presented were remakes of the bronze lists on the original plaque. (The originals are a little hard to read from the years.) Also presented were an ashtray from Officer's country, a picture of the first Association meeting in Charleston SC, a gorgeous picture of the USS Salamonie, and a VCR recording of a speech by Captain Beech and the memorial service from when he passed away, the name plate from the port main engine (along with it's original metal polish), and a second picture of the USS Salamonie. R. Adm. Seiberlich suggested that the second picture of the ship be presented to Salamonie School to hang in the hall.

New safety rules: Yell and tell; Find a mom

Experts say a child being snatched by a stranger is very rare. But the thought strikes at our basic fear that we can't protect our children.

In his book, Protecting the Gift (Little Brown), author Gavin de Becker says telling kids not to talk to strangers is not enough. Dangerous people don't look evil, and a softspoken person looking for help finding his dog might be very dangerous.

Yell and tell. Kids should be taught to be very assertive. When someone says "Don't yell," they should yell, "This isn't my dad," and scream for help. If someone says "Don't tell," they should tell someone they trust right away.

Go to a mom. If a child is lost and scared, it's difficult to find a security guard or a police officer. Tell them to find a mom, someone with a stroller or a child in tow. Women are likely to stop and help a lost child.

Don't get into a car. Tell your children that you will never ask someone to pick them up without telling them first. Kids should never approach a car. If one approaches them, they should run or ride their bikes in the opposite direction. Go to a safe place.

Have a recent photo. Take photos of your child every few months, noting the child's correct height and weight on the back. According to the Center for Missing and Exploited Children, accurate photos helped recover one in six children last year.

Have a meeting place. Establish a place to meet if you become separated. At an amusement park, select a location by a tall ride that can be seen from many places.

CHECK YOUR MAILBOX

The Postal Service designates the third week of Mayas Mailbox Improvement Week to encourage customers to examine and, where necessary, improve the appearance of their mailboxes. Neat, attractive mailboxes make a significant contribution to the appearance of the community and to the safety and security of your mail. Mailbox Improvement Week calls attention to the need to provide mailboxes that are safe to use, conveniently located, and neat in appearance.

Here are some tips: replace loose hinges, repaint a mailbox that may have rust or is peeling, remount a post that is loose and replace or add house numbers.

Approved traditional or contemporary curbside mailboxes are required whenever a mailbox is newly installed or replaced. A customer-built curbside mailbox may be used if the postmaster gives prior approval and if the mailbox generally conforms to the same specifications as approved manufactured mailboxes. Customers should contact their local postmaster before erecting or replacing mailboxes and supports.

It is best to display the address on both sides of the mailbox. Police, fire and rescue personnel often depend on mailbox information to locate people, and they may approach from a different direction than your letter carrier.

SEARCH ENGINE TRICKS

Having a hard time finding something online? Does it seem like you type in your search term but don't get anywhere near what you're looking for?

Well, here's a couple tricks that seem (almost) universal between search engines.

Let's say you're looking for "sports cars" and all you're getting is information on baseball and football (sports). What can you do? Try some of the following:

- 1. Try entering +sports +cars Most search engines will interpret this as meaning you only want results that have both the word "sports" and "cars" in them. Some search engines let you us the word "and" to do this as well (i.e. sports and cars).
- 2. You can also try to exclude terms. Let's say you still aren't getting what you want with sports cars (you still keep getting baseball info). Try something like -+sports +cars -baseball.

The "-" sign tells most search engines to exclude results that have whatever word it is that has the "-" in front of it.

- 3. If the above seems too confusing, most search engines have an "advanced search" option that gives you a web-style way to help you accomplish the same thing. Instead of using "+ / -" they use drop down boxes and option buttons. It is usually easier to search this way, although it's probably faster to use steps 1 & 2.
- 4. The next thing you might try is being more specific. Instead of just sports cars, maybe use exotic sports cars. Try different combinations of search terms until you get what you're after. (Careful with that word "exotic" though
- 5. Also, you may want to try using quotes. If you type in: "sports cars" You should only get results that match that exact phrase in that exact order. Sometimes that can narrow things down considerably.
- 6. If all else fails, try a different search engine. We have a selection of what we feel are the best search engines on our homepage: http://www.worldstart.com/

My favorite? Google.com

There are thousands of search engines out there and not all of them support the tips I have shown you today. If you're having trouble, look for a link for search tips,

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search help, advanced search, or how to search. Most search engines have lots of information on how to use them successfully.

Boosts **N**EED

The Postal Service, like any other business, occasionally must increase the prices of its products to cover rising costs. Delivery networks, for example, are a major cost factor: They continue to expand even though mail volume is decreasing. In 1997, the Postal Service delivered to 131 million addresses across America. One year later the count was 132.5 million addresses; in 1999 it was up to 134 million, and in 2001 it was 137.6 million.

This expansion equates to adding a city the size of Chicago. As America's population keeps growing rapidly, a massive workforce is needed to continue to provide adequate service. Unlike private companies that can hit rural customers with surcharges for having to go out of the way of their official networks, the Postal Service is required by law to continue binding the nation together by providing uniform service to all.

In order to protect universal service at affordable prices and qual-

ity service to all, the Postal Service recently introduced its transformation plan. The plan will assist the Postal Service by making it operate more like a commercial enterprise, and by improving efficiencies more rapidly. Transformation may include changes such as market-based pricing, and resources could be applied to new growth areas and new methods of service and access. It would also allow the Postal Service to build and maintain a flexible workforce that can be readily adjusted to changes in customer demand.

Operating more like a commercial business and less like a government agency is important for the Postal Service, and to the American public, which has enjoyed not having to pay tax dollars to help fund mail delivery.
