Screening Coming

Residents living in and around the Warren community can be screened to reduce their risk of having a stroke or bone fracture. Heritage Pointe will host Life Line Screening on September 3rd. The site is located at 801 Huntington Ave in Warren. Appointments will begin at 9 a.m.

BE A **D**ANDELION

Be a dandelion? Bloom in the face of people who want to dig you up and throw you away. That is the dandelion you know.

On every mountaintop there are trees growing out of rocks because they have latched on to the tiniest piece of opportunity; a few gathered grains of soil. And even in the desert an oasis rises green and vibrant against a backdrop of desolation.

And yes, there are a thousand trees that never grow and acre after acre of sand that produces no oasis. And yes, millions bemoan where they find themselves on the field of life and shrivel up and die, while others do prosper with no more than starlight when what they would prefer was the bright light of high noon.

Not where you live but how you live where you live. Not what is your job that is the worst job in the whole wide world but what do you do with the hours away from your job. Looking for people to love you or looking for people to love.

Write a letter to your future self. It will help you to gauge more closely who you are and how you got to be what presently you are. Apply the positives and keep them alive. Learn from the negatives and bury them.

It is called a personal history book and everyone is in the process of writing one by how they live and love and shape their being.

Many years ago, from time to time, a young man used to speak briefly to our mid day luncheon club. He did so from a twisted, sitting position that arthritis had frozen his body into. He could not have stood if his life had depended on it. He spoke from a field of life not of his choosing, to spread beauty where otherwise people would see only the ugliness of deformity.

Carl Sandberg once described a very unusual man. He wrote, "Not often in the story of mankind does a man arrive on earth who is both steel and velvet, who is hard as rock and soft as drifting fog, (but) in the mixed shame and blame of the immense wrongs of two crashing civilizations, often with nothing to say, he said nothing, slept not at all, and on occasions he was seen to weep in a way that made weeping appropriate, decent, majestic." His name, of course, was Abraham Lincoln.

On November 29, 1623, William Bradford, Governor of the Massachusetts Bay Colony, made an official Thanksgiving Proclamation. It was their 3rd year in the new country and all had not been going well. Nearly half the Pilgrims had died and it didn't look as if things were going to get better any time soon. But what did Governor Bradford do? He proclaimed that the survivors be grateful and thankful, and not allow themselves to be overwhelmed with complaining.

It may have been an over-extension of optimism, but hurray for over-extension.

C. K. Chesterton said there are two ways to have enough: one is to get more, the other is to desire less. What I am saying is that if you really want to be happy you need to fall in love with your own life as it is over and over again. To search out and polish up the

Last year's recipient Jim Scheiber, has devoted many years of his life working with Pathfinder Services, Inc. - * The candidate must be active in Huntington County.
- * No current staff member of Pathfinder Services, Inc. is eligible for the award.

COUNCIL NOTES



GIVE BLOOD

The American Red Cross is among a coalition of organizations urging Americans to understand what it means to be ready for emergencies by observing the Sixth Annual National Preparedness Month this September.

"There are several simple steps all of us can take to prepare for emergencies in our homes, businesses and communities," said Sharyn Whitman, CEO for the Indiana-Ohio Blood Services Region of the American Red Cross. "One of those is blood donation."

The Red Cross recommends three simple actions for preparedness: get a kit, make a plan and be informed. Supporting blood donation or giving blood is also paramount to any community preparedness plan since hospitals need blood on the shelves to respond to patient need. Another way to prepare could be to make blood donation part of your Labor Day plans.

"When you donate blood through the American Red Cross, you join a family of blood donors across the nation in a lifesaving cause," said Whitman. "And being with family and friends can be a great way to celebrate any holiday."

While donations from all blood types are needed, Red Cross officials say donations of type O blood are in high demand. Hospitals use type O negative blood in most emergency trauma cases when there is not enough time to determine the patient's blood type. And while type O negative can be safely transfused to anyone, type O positive blood can be transfused to patients with positive blood types—or about 80 percent of the population.

DEER HUNTING INTRO

Becoming an ethical and effective deer hunter requires education, and the Hoosier Outdoor Experience, Sept. 26–27, is a good place to learn the necessary basic skills from experts.

"There is much more to deer hunting, than simply walking out in the woods and shooting a deer. New hunters need someone to teach them what to look for in the woods, how to act ethically, and the rules and regulations of where they are hunting," said Capt. The Indiana Deer Hunters Association will offer its Whitetail Deer Sensory Trail to attendees of the Hoosier Outdoor Experience, who can experience much of what it's like to be a deer hunter.

It is set up to explain "deer sign" (i.e., how to tell if deer have been in the vicinity recently), equipment used in deer hunting, what to do with a deer after it's been killed, and much more," said Kevin Smith, IDHA member.

Those who take the sensory trail will leave with the basic knowledge necessary to begin deer hunting. The event is geared toward beginning and intermediary hunters looking to gain valuable knowledge.

The Hoosier Outdoor Experience is a family-friendly

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A man, by the name of William Sprinkle of Portland, was one of the contractors who laid the first sewer in Warren. This happened in 1882. They laid a 20" cement tile from the corner of Main and Third Streets, about where the Library now stands, to the river.

The sewer followed a ravine, running in a southwesterly direction, across Wayne Street to the back of where the towns annex now stands and then took a turn towards the river. The tile was made at the corner of Wayne and Second Street where the town building now stands.

The sewer was constructed for drainage purposes only, for the need of sanitary sewage systems was then not realized as far as smaller towns were concerned. The tile was one of the first cement tile used in Indiana for drainage purpose. The Main Street drainage was laid in 1900. Labor and material for the 1199 ft. project cost \$891.00.
