program that provides a learning framework for participants to increase their knowledge on a wide variety of horticultural subjects. In turn, participants volunteer, representing Purdue University. As volunteers, participants grow by sharing knowledge while providing leadership and service in educational gardening activities within their communities.

Master Gardener Intern training will be held at the Huntington County Courthouse Annex on Monday and Thursday evenings from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. starting January 10 and ending March 3. Participants will be exposed to a wide range of subjects including soil and plant science, diagnosis of plant problems, pesticide safety, and culture of vegetable, flower, landscape, and fruit plants. Materials and expenses for the series of classes cost \$100 per participant.

While the class will be

encouraged to create new educational outreach programs, there are already plenty of opportunities for which volunteers are needed. The Huntington County Master Gardeners are very active in the community. Examples of their efforts include the demonstration gardens at Salamonie Reservoir and the Forks of the Wabash. They have also held many public educational forums in 2010 on a variety of topics including constructing rain barrels and cooking from the garden. Additionally they have engaged youth in gardening activities at schools and other venues.

There are many other projects in which individuals can volunteer in the area. Some examples are providing gardening education at community events, teaching youth, and speaking to local clubs and organizations. Many more possibilities for volunteer service through Huntington County Master Gardeners exist

for those willing to help teach others through their knowledge of taking the class.

If you'd like an application for the 2011 class or if you have questions about the program, contact Ed Farris, Agriculture and Natural Resource Educator, Purdue Extension - Huntington County Office, 354 N Jefferson - Suite 202, Huntington or call 260-358-4826. Note that class size may be limited depending on the number of applications that are received. The deadline for submitting applications is December 15th.

EXPANDED HOURS

R.Scott Waddell, Commissioner of the Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles (BMV), announced that BMV license branches will extend hours of operation on Monday, Nov. 1 and on Tuesday, Nov. 2 to issue state ID cards and driver's licenses that may be used for identification at a polling place.

Full service license branches will be open on Monday, Nov. 1, from 8:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. and on Tuesday, Nov. 2, from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.

To insure voters have immediate access to services, license branches will only process ID cards and driver's licenses and will not perform any other BMV services. Written test and driver tests will not be available.

The Indiana BMV provides free, state-issued ID cards for voting purposes to any unlicensed Hoosier, as long as he or she can provide proper documentation and is old enough to vote. The following documents are required to obtain a new state ID card or driver's license (a complete list can be found at www.mybmv.IN.gov)

- * Proof of Identity document, such as a birth certificate or passport.

- * Proof of Social Security document, such as a Social Security card, pay stub or W-2.

- * Proof of lawful status, such as a birth certificate or passport.

- * Proof of residency, two documents such as a voter registration card, utility bill or bank statement.

Waddell added, "The BMV has worked with the state Election Board to provide information to local election officials about the new interim driver's license and ID card documents issued by the BMV. We have also established a special Voter ID phone line on Election Day for election officials needing more information."

All license branches will resume regular business hours on Wednesday, Nov. 3.

Several years ago, a man 75 years of age was killed in an accident. His wife in her bereavement kept saying over and over again, "You know he was never sick a whole day in his life." However, when they performed an autopsy, they found he had hardening of the arteries, cirrhosis of the liver, a tubercular lung and a chronic kidney condition; any of which was so bad they could have killed him at a moments notice.

It is that magic word attitude again. It is the difference between the hypochondriac who feeds his fears while enjoying the meal and the person who says, "So I am a little sick...so I hurt a little...I'm walking aren't I?"

In 1915, Ty Cobb stole 96 bases. Seven years later, in 1922, Max Carey of the Pittsburg Pirates stole 51. Was then Ty Cobb almost twice as good as Carey? No, he was just willing to go for it more often. Actually, Max Carey's percentage of stolen bases was much higher. However, Cobb had a go-for-it attitude while Carey had a play it safe attitude.

And the same was true of Babe Ruth. He hit 851 home runs during his magnificent career and was known as the Home Run King, but he struck out 1330 times. However, he didn't concentrate on his strike outs,

only on his home runs. And so did his fans.

These athletes tried to learn from their failure. They did not back away from the challenges even if they offered more failure than successes. They lived with their eyes on the pluses rather than on the minuses.

Or, as Ben Franklin answered when asked why he came to the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia when he could have stayed at home because of illness, "If I stayed at home I would just be sick and tired, so I decided to be sick and tired in Independence Hall."

One day in his 80th year, John Quincy Adams while walking down the street chanced upon an old acquaintance, "Good morning," said his friend, "And how are you this morning?"

Our sixth President replied, "John Quincy Adams himself is quite well, thank you. But the house in which he lives at present is becoming dilapidated. It is tottering upon its foundation and the seasons have nearly destroyed it. Its roof is pretty well worn out. Its walls are much shattered and it trembles with every wind. The old tenement is becoming almost uninhabitable and I think John Quincy Adams will have to move out of it soon. But he, himself is quite well, quite well, indeed."

In the storehouse of your mind, in the secret chambers of your heart, keep your soul alive and well.

Be like the violinist who, when his string broke in the middle of a concert, transposed and kept on playing. Be like James Whistler, the famous painter, who never meant to be a painter, but when he flunked out of West Point just switched

A: You have a chance to make changes to your Medicare Advantage or Medicare prescription drug coverage for the next year from November 15 to December 31. In addition, there is another disenrollment period for Medicare Advantage plans that allows you to return to Original Medicare and a stand-alone Part D drug plan. The only enrollment period available for 2011 Part D plans will be the AEP (Annual Enrollment Period). If you need to make changes to a Part D drug coverage plan or a Medicare Advantage plan that includes Part D drug coverage, you must do so November 15 - December 31.

Annual Enrollment Period (AEP) - November 15 - December 31

During this Open Enrollment, you can:

- Change from Original Medicare to a Medicare Advantage Plan.
- Change from a Medicare Advantage Plan back to Original Medicare.
- Switch from one Medicare Advantage Plan to another Medicare Advantage Plan.
- Switch from a Medicare Advantage Plan that doesn't offer drug coverage to another Medicare Advantage Plan that offers drug coverage.
- Switch from a Medicare Advantage Plan that offers drug coverage to another Medicare Advantage Plan that doesn't offer drug coverage.
- Join a Medicare Prescription Drug Plan.
- Switch from one Medicare Prescription Drug Plan to another Medicare Prescription

Drug Plan.

- Drop your Medicare Prescription Drug coverage completely.

Beginning in 2011, there will no longer be an an Open Enrollment Period for Medicare Advantage Plans (January 1 - March 31). This has been replaced by a Disenrollment Period.

Disenrollment for Medicare Advantage Plans only - January 1 - February 14

If you have a Medicare Advantage Plan, you will be able to switch back to Original Medicare and a stand-alone Part D drug plan. After that period members will be locked into their choice until December 31. Beneficiaries are not allowed to switch to another Medicare Advantage plan during the disenrollment period.
