and evaluating over 100 workout DVDs, she decided an indoor walking program was best suited for her viewers and enlisted the help of certified fitness expert Leslie Sansone.

"Our walking workouts are a proven tool in motivating those who have not been on a regular routine in a long time," Sansone said, "Or maybe have never had the opportunity or tools to be a regular exerciser."

"Walk Indoors" is separated into six segments, Walk Indoors, Add Upper Body, Add Weights, Interval Training, Stretch and Add Intensity. Each section is designed to build a strong heart and lungs, condition muscles and enhance flexibility, said Sansone. Palmer believes this particular workout routine eliminates many factors that inhibit people from jumping into exercise programs. Because it can be done in the comfort of most any indoor space, there is no need for a gym memberships or expensive cardio equipment, it takes place in a controlled and safe environment, and the audience does not have to worry about finding a childcare provider or adjusting the workout due to poor weather conditions, she said.

"We need to make sure whatever suggestions we make to our participants are doable outside of the classroom," Palmersaid.

The DVD also provides practical alternatives for the Adding

Weights segment. Palmer suggest using soup cans, bags of beans, sugar or flour, or using laundry detergents with handles instead of spending extra money on weights.

Clients who participate in the program with the Purdue Extension Office will receive their own copy of the "Walk Indoors" DVD after completing the course, and each session will include samples and recipes for healthy snacks, helping individuals incorporate a nutritional diet into daily life.

#### AG CONFERENCE

A two-day conference focused on issues women face in agriculture will give participants an opportunity to tap into Purdue Extension expertise and a chance to network with their peers.

The 2013 Midwest Women in Agriculture conference will be Feb. 21-22 at the Clarion Hotel, 2480 Jonathan Moore Pike, Columbus, Ind.

Kelly Heckaman, conference committee member and Kosciusko County Extension educator, said the event should be both educational and a break for the women.

"We know women in agriculture have a unique role. We want to address the day-to-day management of the farm, give them tips on business issues, try to make them feel special for a couple days and send them home renewed, refreshed and ready to take on everyday life," she said.


