Kudos, Kicks & Karats

THIS IS THE DAY - FEBRUARY 26, 2016

 Seven and one half centuries ago today an unknown number of soldiers were slain in a battle near the city of Benevento, Italy. Historians' estimates range between five and ten thousand. While the number of deaths remains unknown, the reasons, however, for the battle were crystal clear.

Manfred of Sicily (illegitimate son of Frederick II and of the Hohenstaufen House) controlled the southern half of Italy plus the island of Sicily, but he coveted to rule the entire Italian peninsula. Pope Urban IV believed God had given him license to decide who ruled where and, thus, wanted to purge the Hohenstaufen House members. Since he lacked an army, Urban called upon Charles of Anjou who did possess the military forces necessary for the task. To add another monkey wrench into the machinations of history, Charles had it in his mind that, by using Urban's request as an excuse, he could eventually govern Europe as the de facto Roman Emperor.

Eventually, Charles' army did defeat Manfred's which led to another military confrontation with Manfred's brother's (Conradin, who was hiding in Bavaria) army. Charles won that battle as well, began to rule all of Italy, France and much of the rest of Europe but for years vied with Pope Urban for ultimate political power.

Now if you have failed to remember this from your World History class in high school, not to worry. Nobody else does either.

But it serves well to shed light on an important moral and ethical observation about human behavior. More than ten thousand men died tragic deaths so that the egos of three men could strive to rule over others. What carnage! What a crime against humanity!

To compound this tragedy hundreds fold, ten thousand lives amount to only a drop in the bucket as compared to the catastrophic totals of such combined egomanias as Napoléon, Hitler, Genghis Kahn, and their ilk throughout human history.

In truth one does not have to dust off the tomes of history in order to locate such absurd evidences of self-centered abuse of others. Virtually every human group, church, civic club, fraternity, political party or governmental committee, abounds with individuals whose dispositions are willing to excuse their selfish power-seeking as being Christian, patriotic, constitutional or humane when in reality they are merely power hungry for themselves and indifferent toward others. Though this may be worded overly naively, I believe that such people are addicted to control.

It is often contradictory that we Christians are so quick to condemn anyone discovered to have lapses of morality or
