KBC SECURITY FUND

The community response so far has been tremendous to the call for funds to secure the museums at the Knight Bergman Center. Sufficient funds have come in to provide for the basic systems in each area and those units will be installed shortly.

There are still a number of projects needed to secure the outside of the building from intruders, and due to a number of people who have suggested that we expand the fund raising to include brick and mortar work, we will supplement KBC funds to prevent further deterioration of the walls both inside and outside the building. Moisture can cause just as much damage to artifacts as vandalism.

As has been reported earlier, the funds available to the KBC Board are limited to interest on endowments, and simply do not provide for the immediate needs of the building. In recent years, newwindows have been installed and the roof is in good repair with the most urgent current need the preservation of the building exterior. The board has scheduled work over the next three years, but realistically the work needs to be done now.

It has been nearly twenty-five years since the former Salamonie Twp. School was rescued from the wrecking ball. During that quarter of a century the building has been the home to a day care and pre-school, winter basketball leagues, meeting rooms for sorority's and clubs, bargain basement, food pantry, reunions, wedding receptions, anniversaries, two museums, art shows, alumni banquets, seminars and fund raising lunches and dinners for many organizations. Southern Wells Schools have made use of the building on two different occasions, first when

the Raider Gym had roof problems and the various teams used the local gym for practice one winter and then again when fire destroyed their elementary school bringing the entire operation to Warren for a year and a half.

No general community fundraising effort has been undertaken since the initial funding drive in 1983. We've generated over \$8,000 in the past three weeks and to complete the work, we need an additional \$20,000. EARNS CERTIFICATION

BLUFFTON, Ind. – The Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations recently awarded Primary Stroke Center Certification to Bluffton Regional Medical Center. The Joint Commission's stroke certification program was designed in cooperation with the American Stroke Association. Bluffton Regional is among only six hospitals in Indiana to be designated a certified Primary Stroke Center.

The Joint Commission evaluation was based upon Bluffton Regional's use of evidence-based

medicine to diagnose and treat patients who have suffered from stroke. Evidence-based medicine includes best practices that are proven to improve patients' outcomes.

The Joint Commission's final report cited several areas of particular strength including the collaboration among the Wells County Emergency Medical Service, emergency physicians, hospitalists and the neurologist. The report also noted Bluffton Regional's commitment to patient education and support of self-management activities, including weight management and diabetic education.

The comprehensive stroke program at Bluffton Regional was designed to allow treatment to be tailored to each individual patient's needs and is under constant evaluation by the hospital's Stroke Team to identify opportunities for the improved care of stroke patients.

"Receiving certification demonstrates not only our past success in treating stroke patients, but also our continued commitment to improve outcomes," said Rajesh Verma, M.D., Medical Director of the Primary Stroke Center.

MY TOWN AND YOURS

by Denny Stroud

Most people that come to the museum remember and talk about Pearl's Hat Shop, Pearl or even Pearl's mother, Jennie, but I think the husband and father had an interesting life.

Francis M. Huff was born in Harrison County, West Virginia, December 27, 1843. His parents were poor and he was forced to earn his own way at an early age. His friends were of a rough bunch, so he learned to be tough during his younger years. At the age of thirteen he decided to leave and start a better life. Up to this time he had never received a day of schooling. Frank went to Greene County, Penn. and hunted an old book and enrolled in an A.B.C. class. He progressed so fast the teacher made him the assistant teacher. He worked when he could and found, in time, he had accumulated \$10.00 and decided he would go as far west as the money would take him. He ended up in Richmond, Indiana during the winter of 1860. He continued to get all the education he could and when the great storm which had been threatening the solidity of the Union began to burst Frank was one of the first to answer his country's call.

On April 21, 1861 he enlisted in Company B 16th Regiment Indiana for one year. He received an honorable discharge and then enlisted in Company E 87th Ohio Volunteers where at Harpers



Ferry he was made a prisoner of war September 15, 1862. Frank was paroled and sent home and, being restless, in October he enlisted in Company B 19th Regiment Indiana Volunteers. The 19th was part of a brigade nicknamed "The Black Hats" and later became known as the "Iron Brigade." In one battle General George McClellon said "the brigade stood like iron and was the best fighting troops in the world."

The Iron Brigade took part in the following noted engagements; Frederickburg, Fitzhugh's Crossing, Chancellorsville and Gettysburg. In the last named battle Frank was wounded in the head. He next took part in the battle of the Wilderness, Spottsylvania, Cold Harbor and Petersburg; here he was shot through the thigh and was sent to Sickles Barricks' Hospital, where he was under a surgeons care for six months. He, again, reported for duty at Petersburg in March of 1864 and during the siege of Richmond, three days before the surrender of Lee's army, he was again shot in the right thigh and received an honorable discharge with a disability.


Back in Indiana he continued to teach and in the spring of 1872 he came to Warren to become principal of the Warren schools. In October 1874 he was united in marriage to Jennie Sprowl. In 1880 he was appointed mail agent but had problems doing the job with his physical disabilities. In 1881 he became Postmaster of Warren and held that position until there was a change of administration. In 1897, Frank was killed doing what he liked to do best and that was teaching. He was teaching a night school at Elwood and in giving instruction to his pupils he used maps and charts, some of which he hung up on the walls. He had set up a

step ladder in front of an open window and was standing on it trying to hang up one of his charts. The ladder slipped and he fell through the open window to the sidewalk below, a distance of about thirty feet.

As the news spread in the streets of Warren, everyone was shocked and pained, for he was a clever, jolly and well liked man. He was a member of the Christian Church but they held the funeral at the M.E. Church, the house being offered on account of its capacity to seat a very large crowd. It was said at the funeral "Frank was one of our best citizens and most worthy Christian. We shall never see his like again."

Seniors, Alcohol, and Drugs

Substance abuse is one of the most under recognized and under treated conditions that exists among the elderly population. Older people are most likely to have chronic health conditions and take more medications, many of which do not mix well with alcohol. The more medications you take, the risk of having an $adverse\,drug\,reaction\,increases,\\$ but when you add alcohol to the mix, the risk of having a drug reaction goes way up! Some of the drugs which can have serious adverse interactions with alcohol are: antihistamines, aspirin, narcotics, non-narcotic painkillers, high blood pressure medications, oral anticoagulants, oral anti-diabetic drugs, antibiotics, sedatives and tranquilizers.

The main change in aging is in the short-term memory. One of the problems is that it becomes more difficult to learn new material. It isn't that you cannot recall it; it's that new information doesn't get in as solidly. Alcohol acts as a central nervous system depressant, which progressively affects the brain. It can affect a person's ability to reason, reduces caution and interferes with memory, resulting in impaired judgment, loss of self-control and reduced inhibitions. Alcohol actually causes amnesia and memory problems. In addition, alcohol affects balance and coordination, so drinking increases the risk of falling. When you are young, falling doesn't pose much of a threat for serious injury; however, at eighty years old, the risk of serious injury increases dramatically!

Data from the National Institute of Drug and Alcohol Abuse reports that 60% of seniors drink. Thirty-five percent drink in moderation, 20% are problem drinkers, and 5% are dependent drinkers. A seminar prepared by the State of Vermont Department of

Aging and Disabilities, entitled "Let's Talk Wild Turkey: Straight Talk for Seniors About Alcohol and Drugs," says it best. "We are not interested in calling you an alcoholic or saying that you have an alcohol abuse problem. What we are interested in is helping you see that this behavior has consequences. You need to decide whether or not it's worth it. If you think that it is not worth it, you can change your behavior."

When you walk into you kitchen I want you to smile. I want peace to open up its arms and hug you when you walk in the door. One morning I did an interview with a magazine. Sondra had done a story about us for her little magazine a few years ago. She told me that she had to clean her bathroom before she called me. She asked me how long it took me to scrub my tub. I told her 30 seconds and she could not believe me. I went on to explain our

Bathroom zone and Swish and Swipe.

Portobello Mushrooms

by The Dinner Diva, Leanne Ely The once gourmet, elusive Portobello mushroom has become a lot more commonplace in grocery stores in recent years. An excellent source of niacin, potassium and selenium, portobellos are delicious served in a variety of ways including the all important stir fry. The taste of portobellos is more pronounced and much more "meaty" than ordinary white mushrooms. Preparing portobellos is simple.

Wash carefully in cool water and dry with a paper towel, but only just before preparing, otherwise, portobellos should be stored in brown paper bags in the fridge for optimum freshness. They should last about a week to 10 days when stored this way.

You can get these fabulous fungi in all sizes, small, medium or large. The big ones are great stand-ins for hamburger patties and are amazing grilled on the barby. Portobellos, like all mushrooms, have "gills" on the underside of their enormous cap. Those black gills can get nasty when you're cooking and put black shmootz on everything they touch. To alleviate this problem, eliminate the gills. Take a small spoon and scoop 'em out. It's easy to do and makes your portobellos picture perfect!

Here are a couple of recipes to get you started with portobellos. Grilled Portobello Mushroom Serves 6

3 garlic cloves, pressed 3 teaspoons fresh basil, chopped Salt and pepper to taste

3 tablespoons balsamic vinegar 1/2 cup olive oil

6 large portobello mushrooms, stems removed

Preheat outdoor grill, indoor grill or oven broiler.

In a small bowl, combine the garlic, basil, salt, pepper, vinegar and oil. Whisk until blended.

Brush both sides of mushroom with the oil mixture. Salt and pepper to taste.

On a medium hot grill, cook mushrooms until tender and slightly browned, turning once (about 8-10 minutes). Serve whole or sliced into strips.

6 large Portobello mushroom caps, stems removed

3 tablespoons olive oil

Salt and pepper to taste

1 1/2 cups sauerkraut, drained 9 ounces Swiss cheese slices 3 tablespoons Thousand island salad dressing

Preheat the broiler (or use the grill outside, weather permitting).

Brush the mushroom caps on both sides with the olive oil and season with salt and pepper. On a broiler pan, place the mushrooms, open side down, and broil for about 5 minutes. Turn and broil the other side for 2 to 3 minutes

Meanwhile, rinse and drain the sauerkraut, squeezing out as much water as possible.

Flip the mushrooms back to open side up and fill with sauerkraut. Top with the Swiss cheese. Broil for 1 to 2 minutes or till cheese is melted.

Transfer each mushroom cap to a plate and spoon 1/2 tablespoon of the Thousand Island dressing on each.


