Nature".

(Italian

Mathematician)

The Fibonacci sequence exhibits a certain numerical pattern which originated as the answers to an exercise in the first ever high school algebra text. This pattern turned out to have an interest and importance far beyond what its creator imagined. It can be used to model or describe an amazing variety of phenomena, in mathematics and science, art and nature. The mathematical ideas the Fibonacci sequence leads to, such as the golden ratio, spirals and self-similar curves, have long been appreciated for their charm and beauty, but no one can really explain why they are echoed so clearly in the world of art and nature.

The story began in Pisa, Italy in the year 1202. Leonardo Pisa-no Bigollo was a young man in his twenties, a member of an important trading family of Pisa. In his travels throughout the Middle East, he was captivated by the mathematical ideas that had come west from India through the Arabic countries. When he returned to Pisa he published these ideas in a book on mathematics called Liber Abaci, which became the most celebrated mathematician of the Middle Ages. His book was a disclosure on mathematical methods in commerce, but is

now remembered mainly for two contributions, one obviously important at the time and one seemingly insignificant.

The importance one: he brought to the attention of Europe the Hindu system for writing numbers. European tradesmen and scholars were still clinging to the use of the old Roman Numerals. Modern mathematics would have been impossible without this change of the Hindu system, which we call now Arabic notation, since it came West through Arabic lands.

The Fibonacci numbers are Nature's numbering system. They appear everywhere in Nature, from the leaf arrangement in plants, to the pattern of the florets of a flower, the bracts of a pine cone, or the scales of a pineapple. The Fibonacci numbers are therefore applicable to the growth of every living thing, including a single cell, a grain of wheat, a hive of bees, and even all of mankind. Nature has it's own rules so not all nature follows this math pattern.

Plants do not know about this sequence – they just grow in the most efficient ways. Many plants show the Fibonacci numbers in the arrangement of the leaves around the stem. Some pine cones and fir cones also show the numbers, as do daisies and sunflowers. Sunflowers can contain the number 89, or even 144. Many other plants, such as succulents, also show the numbers. Some coniferous trees show these numbers in the bumps on their trunks, and palm trees show the numbers in the rings on their trunks.

This number pattern turned out to have an interest and an importance far beyond what Fibonacci ever imagined and has been incorporated in to our present knowledge. "Our whole universe is based on Mathematics" by Leonardo Fibonacci

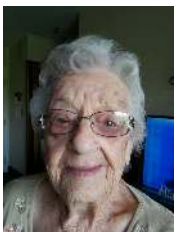

their thoughts for hours meandering through them does not do them justice.

True as that may be, Savannah's history is even more beautiful. Former General James Oglethorpe, then in the British Parliament, conceived its urban plan with a system of agrarian equality with the family farm at its foundation to provide for and maintain the colony's economic base while emptying the nation's debtor's prisons as the new colony's inhabitants the former inmates. Land ownership was limited to forty-five acres plus a five-acre garden plot inside the town. If a colonist were to sponsor additional laborers from England's abusive debtor's prisons as indentured servants, they could negotiate additional land grants, but no additional ownership of acreage was allowed through purchase or inheritance. Also, slavery in his urban system was banned.

Not only was Savannah an immediate success, the Oglethorpe Plan made it a continuing success. Unlike many other European colonies, who were forced to contend with ongoing warfare with local Indian tribes, Savannah enjoyed a harmonious relation with the Native Americans. Furthermore, many groups who found themselves unwelcomed in other colonies began to find acceptance there: Protestant immigrants of all types, Irish and French Catholics, German Lutherans, Scottish Presbyterians, Moravians, Huguenots, Greek

Orthodox, Jews from Spain and Portugal and others.

At the heart of the city's planning in Oglethorpe's mind was the idea of peaceful acceptance of all alongside the opportunity for all to prove themselves.

It worked. But it did not just happen.

Oglethorpe was a man trained in war. However, when he chaired Parliament's Prison Reform Committee, he astutely observed that the debtors prisons, unwittingly were contributing to any number of urban social problems. Though release from debtor's prison was almost impossible (How could an inmate pay off a debt when they were incarcerated?), those who managed to achieve it were cast out into the streets with no means of support. Many were forced to turn to criminal activities in England's major cities.

Out of this observation was born the concept of founding a colony to solve such problems.

A host of the wealthier class envisioned the notion simply as a convenient means to rid

themselves of ne'r-do-wells, while some politicians regarded such a colony, strategically situated between the English interests further north and the Spanish territories in today's Florida, as an expedient military buffer zone.

But, to Oglethorpe's credit and character, when others were prepared to throw lemons at him he saw the potential for lemonade.

It is no minor task to keep one's emotional stability and forethought for others when life seems to be placing one obstacle after another in your path. But that is exactly when Christian character is in highest demand. Paul's advice to the Thessalonica congregation comes to mind: "Let us not grow weary in doing good for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do what is good." Also he succinctly stated the same to the folks in Galatia: "...never tire of what is good."

But this like other spiritual truths is eternal. Centuries before the collector of the proverbs recognized its importance: "A discerning person keeps wisdom in view."
