SIMPLE STEPS TO STRONGER FAMILY TIES

 Most of us are well aware of how important family is. Our family members are the ones we turn to for love, support and comfort.

But all too often we simply assume that good family relationships just happen. The reality is, however, that relationships within a family need to be worked on just as much as the good relationships we may have with friends or co-workers.

Instead, many of us ending up putting "family time" on the back burner. We have busy schedules and lots of activities already taking up a great deal of our days. All of that can make it difficult to make special efforts to cultivate family relationships. Yet if we don't do so it's easy for problems to develop unnoticed and for a family to grow apart.

Fortunately, it isn't all that difficult to strengthen relationships within a family. One of the simplest yet most effective steps is to hold family meetings. This doesn't mean simply hoping that everyone will be around for dinner on Thursday night, but rather it means actually planning a time and place when everyone can get together for a family discussion.

The purpose of a family meeting is to catch up on what has been happening to family members, and to work out everyday hassles that may have arisen. Try to make such meetings enjoyable, but first agree on basic ground rules. Such meetings require that everyone be present. And keep it civilized with only one person speaking at a time, and no name-calling, yelling, accusing or blaming. The point is to work together to iron out family issues, problems and plans. Meeting twice a month is an effective schedule for many families.

For busy families, another way to strengthen those family ties is simply to spend some relaxed, quality time together. Maybe it's just agreeing that everyone will sit down together for dinner one set night each week. Scheduling a regular family game night with no TV or phones is another way to enjoy one another's company.

Our lives today are all quite busy, but making an effort to give family members more personal attention can pay big benefits. Spending just a few minutes each day to catch up with your spouse or your kids can keep you current on their lives and help catch small issues before they become major problems. It's well worth the effort.

The Huntington County Health Department will have a Flu Shot Clinic at the Warren Pharmacy on Wednesday, October 26th from 1:00 P.M. to 3:15 P.M. The New 2016 Quadrivalent Flu shots will be only \$32 (age 3 & older), cash or check. Or for uninsured patients there is a fund to subsidize this for only an \$8 copay.

The Health Department can bill some Privately Insured patients or they may send their bill in to their Insurance Plan for reimbursement.

Patients with Medicaid or Medicare must present a currently active Medicaid or Medicare card for \$0.00 copay.

Residents of neighboring counties are welcome! You do not need to be a Huntington County resident.

If you have questions about vaccinations you may call the Health Department at 260-358-4831 ext.#1.

COUNCIL MINUTES

The Town Council of the Town of Warren met Monday, October 10, 2016 at Assembly Hall, Council Meeting Room, 131 N. Wayne Street, in accordance with rules of Council and applicable law.

Those present were: Town Council, Ethan Stivers, Steve Buzzard, Tracey Brown (Absent), Julia Glessner; Clerk-Treasurer, Marilyn Morrison; Employees, Lee Poulson, Dennis Spitler and others.

President Glessner called the meeting to order at 5:00 pm.

The owner of a property on Matilda Street who has requested closure of an alley between his property and that of Crain Ford was present.

Noting that the matter had been addressed in previous meetings and that Council had given preliminary approval of the request, it was cited that the matter remains with the adjacent property owners to the alley until they reach agreement and a petition is filed making a formal request for closure.

Ordinance 2016-2, Sewer Use Ordinance, was introduced due to the length of time from the first introduction. The Ordinance has been approved for adoption by IDEM as requested changes, especially for monitoring, have been met. A public hearing was scheduled for Monday, November 14 at 5:00 pm.

Poulson reported that repairs and updates to the Christmas Lighting has been completed. Council reviewed the packet for Request for Bids for Trash Collection and noted that bids will be opened at the regularly scheduled meeting of November 14th.

Ordinances 2016- 7, 8, 9, 10, wages and benefits for elected officials and employees, were submitted

for consideration of adoption. The only change for 2017 is an increase in wages of .65 per hour as previously approved by Council. Buzzard moved, seconded by Stivers, to approve all Ordinances as submitted. The motion was approved unanimously.

Ordinance 2016-11, 2017 Municipal Budget, was submitted for consideration of adoption. Glessner moved, seconded by Glessner, adoption of the 2017 Budget.

The motion was approved unanimously. The budget will be submitted to the Indiana Department of Local Government Finance for final approval.

Treat or Treat hours were set for 6-8:00 pm on October 31st.

A meeting of WHARMM (Warren, Huntington, Andrews, Roanoke, Markle, Mt Etna) has been scheduled for October 27th in Markle.

Plans were made for attendance at the meeting.

Morrison reported that the Warren Area Chamber of Commerce had donated \$3,013 for the replacement of the snowflakes in the downtown area. Council cited appreciation for the action.

Due to the approved vacation schedule for Town employees for the week of November 7th, Morrison announced the Clerk-Treasurer's Office would not be closed on Thursday, November 10th as previously scheduled. The office will be closed on Tuesday, November 8th for election and on Friday, November 11th for Veterans Day. A planned meeting with Greg Guerrettaz of Financial Solutions Group, financial consultant for the Town, has been rescheduled for Monday, October 17th for the financial planning of projects currently being considered.

The Town Marshal reported that he is still reviewing and considering options for the planned purchase of a police vehicle in 2017.

Poulson, as Fire Chief, submitted the September activity report. Commenting that the Department's Truck committee had determined that purchase price of a

tanker truck would be in the range of \$160,000, Poulson asked if quotes would need to be solicited. By consensus, Council directed that three requests for quotes would be required.

Poulson, as Utility Manager, reported that the Blowers at the Wastewater Treatment Plant had been replaced but a change order was required as wiring box placement did not meet code. It is expected that the project will be completed within two weeks. An annual mandatory water test has been completed and submitted. Approximately one hundred tons of sludge is scheduled to be land applied as soon as a bean crop is removed from the IDEM approved site. Poulson submitted a photo of a pre-fab building which Engineers had submitted for use as a Well House at Tower Park.

Council requested that cost be determined as it is known that a block building would cost approximately \$17,000. Planning continues for the proposed drainage project on Eleventh Street. While Council did not vote final approval of the project, financial planning is to be done at the meeting with the consultant on Monday, October 17th.

Estimated cost is approximately \$160,000. Outfitting of trucks for new snow plows has been completed. Notification was received as of this date that

the plows are ready for attachment.



IF YOU CAN RIDE A BIKE, YOU CAN GET ORGANIZED

Who taught you to ride a bike? Do you remember how different riding a bike was than riding your trike? With a tricycle, you really had to pedal hard to get over bumpy terrain, but with a bicycle you could almost glide over it. As soon as you mastered the skills of riding, you were given the joy of riding fast and easy. Remember feeling like you were flying? - Enough speed (timer)
 - Keep eyes forward (calendar, watch)
- Use your balance (balance work, recreation and rest)
 - Keep pedaling (decluttering)

Wouldn't you say you know all about these basics? Now if you fail to use any one of them (just like you need the basic skills to ride a bike), you're going to find yourself in a mess. But you know the saying, "It's just like riding a bike," implying once you learn, you never forget. So which basic skill or tool have you been leaving out? Once you nail that, it's just a matter of putting more focus on using it and just like riding a bike; you'll be back on top of things. Commitment and Desire

But there's more. When you were young, you looked at riding your bike as something fun to do, because the rewards for pleasure were great. You also had the commitment to learn, because you saw all the other kids having fun and there you were on your little, red trike, with a stupid bell that rusted into silence.

To get organized, you have to have the commitment to change your comfortable routine, in order to enjoy the fruits of that change. You can see the other "kids" with clean and neat homes and you know you would love that. You're a social person and you want to be comfortable when you have friends and family

over. You'll also discover staying organized is more comfortable than the routine that's gotten you in a mess.

I'm working with a delightful woman who has a goal of having her home organized and clean so she can have her new granddaughter in her home (the daughter won't let her babysit there until that happens). This woman has the desire to be able to babysit her granddaughter in her own home and she totally understands why her daughter won't allow that until things change in her home.

This brings up one more thought; get the right reason to get organized and make it juicy enough to stick. When I got organized my reason was to have more free time to play. In 40 years of being organized my playtime has allowed me to do what I love to the degree that even my work (writing) is play!

So get the right reason and start using the skills you haven't been using and get out of the mess. Let me be your "teacher holding the seat of your bicycle" until you get strong on your own.
