KBC BOARD OF DIRECTORS HONORED

This is the Third Annual Community Service Award. This year it will be awarded to W.A.R.R.E.N., INC. or the Knight-Bergman Center Board. Would all past and present Board of Directors please come forward?

The Warren High School building was constructed in 1925 and remained anactive twelve grades chool facility for the residents of Salamonie Township until 1966. From 1967 to 1982, the building served as an elementary school for the Huntington County School Corporation.

In June of 1982, W.A.R.R.E.N. Incorporated (Warren Area Residents Recreational and Educational Needs) was formed with the purpose of acquiring the school to be used as a community center. The building was re-named the Knight Civic Center in honor of Clifford Knight's significant investment in the facility. The structure briefly served as a school again from January 1993 to June of 1994, when the Southern Wells School

POULTRY TESTING

Wells County Members are reminded of the health requirements for poultry which includes proof (certificate) that the bird originated from a National Poultry Improvement Program (NPIP) approved flock or a negative blood test for pullorum-typhiod within 90 days of the fair. Members should plan to bring their birds to the blood testing, Saturday, July 9th, 9:30-12:30pm at the 4-H Park Cookhouse Patio. To arrange aspecial time, contact Stasha Carney 273-5290. The

blood test is free.

Only birds not from a NPIP flock need to be tested. Waterfowl, turkeys and quail do not need to be tested.

Local veterinarians can also do the blood testing.

AREA NEWS CONTINUED

The subject is Rear Admiral Howard Harrison Good, known to his friends as "Heinie".

Admiral Good was born in 1888 and lived a couple of miles north of Warren. He went to high school in Warren and graduated in 1906. Heinie worked at the local paper for two years not knowing what he wanted to do. One day in 1908 he surprised his parents by giving them papers to sign for him to go to the naval academy at Annapolis. His family or friends didn't know he was even interested. He had already taken the test and his congressman had given his appointment to the academy.

In June of 1908, he went to Annapolis but wasn't quite old enough for the academy so he was placed in a win school program until the fall when he was eligible. While there his roommate was Rear Admiral Richard Byrd, who was a pioneeraviator, polarexplorer and organizer of polar logistics. Admiral Byrd was a recipient of the Medal of Honor.

Heinie graduated in 1912 as an Ensign. His first ship was the USS Nebraska, then he went to the USS Illinois and then back to the Nebraska in a four year span. From 1916-1918 he spent time on the USS Reed. In 1918, Lieutenant Good was sent to Washington to serve in the Bureau of Navigation. In 1920, he spent time on the destroyer Montgomery which took part in flee toperations from Alaskato Panama. Then he went to the Robert Smith which

cruised along the west coast of the United States and Mexico. From there he was commander of the USS Renshaw for a short time.

In 1926, he went to China aboard the USS Truxtun which served with the Asiatic fleet patrolling the Yangtze River. From 1929 to 1931 he was back $in Washington \, and \, the \, Bureau$ of Navigation. 1931 to 1933, he spent time on the USS Louisville, In 1936, it was back to China. 





was damaged by fire. For this actof community cooperation the Warren and Southern Wells communities received the national "Spirit of Cooperation Award", which was given in Midland, Texas. Finally, in 1992, the facility was re-named the Knight-Bergman Center in honor of donations received from the Garnet and George Bergman estates.

Today the building houses office space, meeting space for the Sigma Phi Gamma Sorority, the U.S.S. Salamonie Museum, Salamonie Valley Museum, the Bread of Life Food Pantry, the Bargain Basement and numerous community spaces including a gymnasium, commercial kitchen, auditorium and public restrooms.

Since becoming a community

center, renovation work has been completed including the replacement of existing steel framed windows with insulated vinyl windows, the installation of a rubber membrane roof system, various interior finish upgrades and the tuck pointing of brick masonry systems.

Given the age and complexity of the building structure, there is also a growing list of building conditions needing repair or improvement. Some of these items, especially issues related to active water damage, need to be addressed in the near future to prevent the further deterioration of existing building systems.

The Knight-Bergman Center currently charges minimal fees to rent the facility, but is barely able to generate enough revenue to pay operational costs. Routine maintenance is, in fact, performed by board members and volunteers due to a lack of funding for basic janitorial services. Withannual heating costs averaging \$24,000.00 to \$30,000.00, the Board of Directors is seeking a solution for replacing the existing heating plant that will result in significant efficiencies to lower utility costs.

The building site, size, location and features make it ideal for supporting a wide variety of community functions. Careful planning and strengthened community investment will enable the Knight-Bergman Center to cultivate the rich history and culture of Warren while expanding its role as an important community anchor.
