COLLEGE GOAL SUNDAY

Financial aid professionals will be volunteering at 39 sites in Indiana to help college-bound students and their families open the door to financial aid during College Goal Sunday. The event is set February 24, 2019.

The free program assists Indiana students in filing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). 




