W COUNCIL NOTES

The Warren Town Council met on Monday evening, April 8 in Assembly Hall. President Julia Glessner called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m.

Minutes of the February 11 meeting were approved as submitted.

Eva Witkamp asked permission to continue salvaging items from a home at 126 East First Street. This property was recently purchased by the Town of Warren for demolition. She had an agreement with the previous owner. Witkamp also asked permission to remove the windows from the property at 120 East First Street. Both requests were put on hold pending discussion with the Town's insurance carrier regarding the coverage of such activity.

Scott and Gina Canady, owners of building at 113 and 115 North Wayne Street, asked Council to consider CEDIT monies for the cost of roofing repairs on these buildings. They were advised CEDIT monieshad not been used in this manner previously. They were advised that any such requests would be kept in mind when considering CEDIT projects.

Jack Trosper and Council member Barb Trosper asked that the Town move to clean up at 104 Hendricks. Huntington County had condemned the property with the Town to stand cost of removal. A shed and partial foundation still remain. The nuisance policy is scheduled to be reviewed. Citations are to be issued to the owner if such work is in the policy.

Marilyn Morrison reported that

an amendment to the lease with AT&Tfor placement of additional antenna on the Eleventh Street tower and the final agreement shows Council's final offer.

Day presented quotes for demolition of houses at 120 and 126 East First Street. Quotes including: Zahm Excavating \$19,600; Ironclad Excavating \$31,333; Dirt Excavating \$18,130; Huffman Construction \$12,300. After discussion Council decided on Huffman Construction.

Council also discussed application for Huntington County CEDIT Fund to cover cost of demolition of these houses and the cost of shoring and roofing a building at 124 North Wayne Street. Morrison was instructed to submit a CEDIT application as soon as possible.

The project is hoped to be completed by the end of June if possible.

Following discussion and review of a sewer fund report. Council voted to continue with the process approved to increase rates with the Sewer utility.

Neil Laymon was appointed to fill a vacancy on the Warren Zoning Appeals, pending his acceptance.

Following discussion of a request made by a resident on State Road 5 to tap into the municipal water main, the request was approved. It will follow standard connection process.

The annual Electric Tractor Factor, the towns annual tracker is established by averaging monthly fuel costs charged by AEP and making a one-time adjustment. The 2013 tracker was set at .70664, a .033 increase.

Council approved a payment of \$6,525.00 for annual maintenance of utility and fund software.

The week of May 6 has been set for Spring Clean-up. House are Monday through Friday, 8 to 5; Saturday, May 11, 8 to noon.

Council is in agreement to hire a company to detail all fixed assets of the town over \$45,000.

Randy Potter has informed Council that he will no longer be able to continue with his Pest Control business. Quotes for that service are expected to be presented at the next Council meeting.

Council was presented a review of annual publication of tax rates throughout the county. It was also pointed out that Warren has the lowest municipal rate.

Day reported the February and March Utility/Street reports. He also reported that all seven sirens have been replaced and J&K will be on sight to complete the programming on April 9.

Council has also approved updating and replacement of lights on the bridge.

Marshal Spitler presented the February and March activity report of the Warren Police Department. He requested to apply for a grant through the Department of Justice for the replacement of two bullet proof vests. Permission was granted.

turkey to be harvested per licensed hunter. Legal turkey hunting requires a valid spring turkey license and game bird stamp. A person must not call wild turkeys for another individual unless licensed. Legal equipment is limited to shotguns and archery equipment. Use of bait, or any substance or product for animal consumption, is restricted by law. Hunter orange is not required by law but is considered an important safety consideration when going afield or leaving their hunting areas.

Huntersarereminded to be sure of their intended target and what is beyond. Because turkey hunting involves calling active male turkeys it is also important to remember not all calls are from wild birds. An important safety tip would be to avoid wearing red, blue, or white clothing as these colors are commonly part of a male turkeys' coloration.

Turkeys were extirpated from the state of Indiana by the 1900's. Restoration efforts were launched in 1956. In 2012 all 92 counties in Indiana have resident wild turkey populations.

Licensed, ethical hunters know the rules and play by them but poachers don't. Conservation Officers encourage hunters to use the TIP hotline to file a complaint. TIP is an acronym for Turn in a Poacher or Polluter. Anyone can use the TIP hotline. It's quick and simple to report a

violation. The toll-free TIP phone number is 1-800-TIP-IDNR (1-800-847-4367). Complaints also can be filed online at tip.IN.gov.

GARDENING TIPS

Homegardeners seeking advice on growing plants and vegetables can find assistance from Purdue Extension. The spring of 2013 is certainly different from the previous year. Folks are now at least beginning to plan their gardening activities with warmer April weather.

In Huntington County both Purdue Extension staff and volunteers are providing gardening education to the public. Master Gardener volunteers from Huntington County are hosting workshops on gardening topics. Public sessions in 2013 have included growing herbs and landscaping properties. The next workshop will be held on Thursday June 6 at Heritage Hall in Hier's Park at 7 p.m. Thetopic of "Hybridizing" will be presented by local Master Gardener volunteers.

Huntington County Master Gardeners will also have their annual Spring Plant Sale on Saturday May 18 at Hier's Park from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. Gardenersare encouraged to ask questions about plants that available for sale. Master Gardeners will provide suggestions about how to properly care for plants as well as how a particular plant can be grown in a home landscape.

Demonstration gardens are planted and tended by Master Gardeners at the Forks of the Wabash and the Salamonie Reservoir Interpretive Center each year. Spending time in these gardens can be educational for youth and adults. The experiences help people better understand and appreciate a wide variety of plants.
