Treva's Recipe Box

This weeks recipe is coming from my collection of open class recipes that I take to the county fairs. My favorite pie is a mixed fruit pie recipe that came from a Taste of Home magazine that featured this pie in the "wish I had that recipe" section. Its called a Bumbleberry pie and if you like a mixed fruit pie I'm sure you will enjoy this one.

This recipe has gotten me some nice placings including the grand champion in Blackford county a few years ago. This year we had to forgo the fair due to Covid, so the girls and I cant even show at the state fair that we were so excited about. So hopefully next year I'll be taking this pie to the state fair and see how we do there. Until then enjoy and for those kids who are adjusting to the fair schedule and new way of doing 4-H, good luck to you all.

Bumbleberry pie

For the shell:

5 1/2c. flour 1 tbsp. vinegar ¼ tsp salt ¾ c. cold water
 2c. shortening 1 egg

In bowl, cut flour, salt and shortening till crumbly with pastry blender. Whisk egg, water and vinegar and pour over dry ingredients, mix and roll into a ball and chill 30 minutes. Roll out into crust for 2-9 inch double crust pies.

For filling:

2c. each fresh or frozen blueberries, raspberries, sliced strawberries and rhubarb.

4c. chopped and peeled granny smith apples

2c. sugar

2 tbsp. lemon juice

3/4c. flour

Combine fruit, flour, sugar, mixing well. Do not bust up berries. Fill shells dividing the filling between the 2 shells. Sprinkle with lemon juice and seal the top crust and crimp closed. Slit top crust for a vent and bake 350 degrees for 50 to 60 minutes. Makes 2 pies.

For those of you who use a aluminum pie pan and can't seem to get the bottom crust done, try baking the pie on a stone. The best tip I've ever received in baking pies for contest.

DRIVING EXAMS RESUME

The Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles (BMV) announced today it will begin appointments for driving skills exams on July 16 in select communities. The BMV began rescheduling exams in late June for anyone who had an appointment canceled due to the public health emergency. Once all customers with a previously canceled appointment have had the opportunity to reschedule, the BMV will open appointments across the state corresponding to branch timeslot availability. The first appointments will be available as early as July 16 with all branches offering appointments by July 24.

"The BMV typically has driving skills exams scheduled three weeks in advance. As a result, more than 4,000 Hoosiers had an

exam canceled and were therefore given priority to get their exam completed before the schedule is opened to the public," BMV Commissioner Peter Lacy said. "The number of canceled exams varied by branch, which is why we will open appointments in phases."

Appointments are required for driving skills exams and must be scheduled a minimum of 48 hours and maximum of 3 weeks in advance. The scheduler will be updated as additional branches complete their backlog. Appointment information and expectations can be viewed on the BMV website, found here:

Customers and drive examiners must follow specific health and safety requirements during the driving skills exam. Some of these requirements include answering health screening questions, having at least two windows in the car opened slightly, and wearing a mask. More detailed requirements and a short informational video are available on the BMV website, linked above.

Hoosiers who are unable to comply with the requirements will be required to reschedule their exam.

BMV branches will continue to adhere to CDC guidelines which means a limited number of people are permitted in a branch at one time. Individuals who have an appointment must check-in with a branch associate at the branch entrance and should not wait in line. The BMV does expect appointments to fill quickly and will continue to add appointments to the scheduler.

As a final reminder, customer-facing BMV team members are required to wear masks and customers visiting a branch are encouraged to do the same. Face coverings will be required for customers wherever local mandates are in place. You can read a full list of modifications, closures, and available services on this page:

WHAT WE'VE LEARNED

The following appeared in the Washington Post this past weekend.

CAN JUST breathing the air get you infected with the novel coronavirus? Most worriedly, does the virus linger in the air? These questions are cropping up more often, along with answers that have left many people puzzled and uncertain. Grasping how the virus spreads remains at the

heart of all the difficult choices looming in the months ahead: going back to school, sports, restaurants, bars, conferences, concerts, stores and transportation, among other things.

The virus spreads person-to-person in close contact. When people cough, sneeze or shout, they expel the virus in different amounts and sizes. Research shows it is usually carried in small respiratory droplets, say five microns or larger. When inhaled, they can infect anew. These respiratory droplets usually fall to the ground within three to six feet. To mitigate the spread, keeping a distance helps, and face masks can be highly effective, blocking the droplets from being inhaled or exhaled.

It is also evident the virus can be picked up from surfaces, so hand-washing is essential.

For understandable reasons, public anxiety has risen lately about another possibility, that the virus can linger for hours in the air. This suggests that airborne virus particles, very tiny, smaller than five microns, might be exhaled and remain suspended and swirl like dust or pollen. A group of 239 scientists and engineers led by Lidia Morawska and Donald K. Milton recently appealed in the journal Clinical Infectious Diseases for more attention to be given to this possibility. The implications could be unsettling and disruptive: Masks might be useless against such small particles;

social distancing worthless at six feet; classrooms, stores and officers requiring major new control measures, such as upgraded ventilation.

Some viruses do succeed at lingering in the air — measles can remain contagious in a closed space for two hours. Fortunately, the scientific evidence so far shows the coronavirus does not behave like measles. Michael Klompas and colleagues note in the Journal of the American Medical Association that, before mitigation efforts, the coronavirus reproduction number was estimated to be about 2.5, meaning that each infected person went on to infect an average of two to three others, similar to influenza, and quite different from measles, which has a reproduction number closer to 18.

However, a series of factors can come together that do create super-spreading events in which airborne spread plays a role. These events are often the outcome of a combination of poor ventilation, limited enclosed space, and longer duration and greater intensity of exposure. Recent examples include a choir practice, the tight quarters of a warship, and numerous nightclubs. These bursts may be less frequent than other transmission events, but they pack a punch.

Bottom line: You probably won't catch the coronavirus from a street breeze. But think twice about what's under your control. Wear a mask, wash your hands, open the windows, avoid enclosed, crowded spaces, and at least for now, skip the nightclub.

CRISIS HELPLINE

The Indiana Family and Social Services Administration today announced the launch of the Be Well Crisis Helpline, a confidential resource available through Indiana 211 that will allow Hoosiers to call and speak with a trained counselor 24/7. The free Be Well Crisis Helpline was established by FSSA's Division of Mental Health and Addiction in direct response to the elevated levels of stress and anxiety Hoosiers are experiencing due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

COVID-19 has caused a rise in mental health-related issues across Indiana and the entire country, including new stresses brought on by social isolation and the lack of traditional support systems such as family, friends, schools, religious and other community organizations. For many Hoosiers, anxiety regarding financial stress, grief and loss over bereavement and the loss of one's "normal routine," along with all of the unknowns regarding COVID-19, is overwhelming.

"With the Be Well Crisis Helpline, our intent is to provide easy and free access to counselors who can listen and help by simply calling 2-1-1," said Jennifer Sullivan, M.D., M.P.H., FSSA secretary. "As Hoosiers continue to cope with the 'new normal' of life during a pandemic, with massive disruptions in their everyday lives, and with emotions ranging from bored to terrified, it was imperative to build a helpline that could literally be a lifeline for many."

Indiana 211 is a free service that connects Hoosiers with assistance and answers from thousands of health and human service resources across the state — quickly, easily and confidentially. Earlier this month, Indiana 211 officially became part of FSSA, helping enable specialized programs such as the Be Well Crisis Helpline as needed.

"By calling 2-1-1 (and selecting 3), callers will connect with an experienced and compassionate counselor specially trained to help with issues triggered or worsened by COVID-19," said Jay Chaudhary, J.D., DMHA director. "The trained counselors will be able to listen, provide support and promote personal resiliency."

The Be Well Crisis Helpline is funded by a Crisis Counseling Assistance and Training Program grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agency. In Indiana the program becomes part of the state's new Be Well Indiana initiative. Additional information about the

mental health resources available to Hoosiers is available at BeWellIndiana.org.

COMPLETE YOUR CENSUS

According to State Rep. Dan Leonard (R-Huntington), 2020 Census responses are critical to future federal funding in local communities, and Hoosiers should respond now if they have not already done so.

Census Surge Week kicked off Monday to remind residents to complete their 2020 Census forms before door-to-door visits begin in some areas around the country as early as July 20. Leonard said Indiana is currently tied for 10th in the nation for response rate, with nearly two-thirds of Hoosier census forms submitted.

"During surge week, everyone should take the time, if they have not already done so, to fill out the household census form," Leonard said. "I appreciate that so many community members have already completed this task. This is such an important part of our civic duty, and the best way to ensure local programs are funded."

Leonard encourages residents to visit 2020Census.gov to fill out the census online. Hoosiers can also call 844-330-2020 or mail back the questionnaire sent to households.

Census takers will begin visiting nonresponding households in northern Indiana from Aug. 11 to Oct. 31 to ensure every resident is counted. Leonard said less than one-third of households in Northeast Indiana counties still need to respond to the 2020 Census, including Allen,

Huntington and Wells counties.

Census workers will wear masks and follow local public health guidelines when they visit households. All census takers complete a virtual COVID-19 training on social distancing, and other health and safety protocols before beginning their work in neighborhoods.

Leonard said everyone is required to fill out the census every 10 years by law, and the information is kept confidential. Personal information cannot be used against respondents by any government agency or court.

According to Leonard, billions of dollars in federal funding to support education, housing, health and public safety are on the line as this data impacts strategic planning decisions about statewide job training, locations of new businesses and public transportation projects.

Self-responses are due by Oct. 31, 2020.

HEALTH FAIR CANCELLED

Parkview Huntington Hospital's (PHH) health and wellness fair, Healthy Steps, is a regular fixture on many local residents' calendars for October, but this year, plans will need to change. The hospital is cancelling the event due to concerns about COVID-19 activity.

"We did not make this decision lightly," said Juli Johnson, president, PHH. "We know many people who have come to rely on the reduced-cost lab testing and free health screenings will be disappointed by the cancellation. But we're coming down on the side of caution."

Healthy Steps typically draws about 450 to 500 visitors to the hospital twice each year, in April and October. But, said Johnson, the contagious nature of COVID-19 makes the risk involved in such a large event too great.

"We feel it would not be responsible to hold an event that brings together a large group of people," said Johnson. "Organizations across the region – including Parkview – are cancelling festivals, indoor events and large gatherings for the same reason." "Our highest priority in serving the community," she continued, "is always the health and safety of our patients and co-workers, so we remain focused on providing the very best of care while incorporating the safety measures all Parkview facilities have put in place. We also encourage area residents to keep following commonsense guidelines: wear a mask around others in public, use social distancing, wash their hands frequently, avoid touching their faces with unwashed hands and stay home when sick. These simple precautions help suppress the spread of the virus."

Johnson said she decided to announce the Healthy Steps cancellation now in order to give community members plenty of time to change their plans.

"We know many people schedule medical appointments following the event to discuss screening and test results with their healthcare providers," she said, "and we want them to be able to make alternate arrangements sooner rather than later."

PHH and Parkview Physicians Group (PPG) offices have resumed services that had been temporarily suspended early on in the pandemic, and local residents are encouraged to schedule wellness visits and any needed lab work and imaging. Like the hospital, PPG offices have implemented additional

measures for patient and co-worker safety. In-person and virtual visits with primary care providers are available.

Appointments can be scheduled by calling 1-877-880-0014. Individuals without a primary care provider can call 1-800-PPG-TODAY to be connected with a PPG physician. Patients can also schedule appointments with their current provider via their Parkview MyChart accounts. MyChart and Parkview OnDemand, Parkview's two mobile apps, offer video visits with a provider right from a computer or smartphone. For more information, visit parkview.com/carefromhome.

All PHH imaging services are available, including: 3D mammography, ultrasound, DEXA scan, CT scan, MRI, nuclear medicine, HeartSmart CT, LungSmart CT, and X-ray. Imaging and lab tests can be scheduled by calling 1-800-880-0014. Saturday appointments are available for HeartSmart CT. The spring Healthy Steps event normally takes place in April. Johnson said the hospital will continually evaluate COVID-19 activity in the community and, early in 2021, determine whether Healthy Steps can be held safely in April.

AN ALASKAN & YUKON TRIP DAY # 7

Saturday, July 1, 2017 was "Canada Day" in our northern, neighboring country. Our Dawson City map and guidebook identified St. Mary's Hall as a special holiday breakfast location. In addition to pancakes, sausage, and juice, we visited briefly with people from British Columbia who lived across the border from Spokane, WA. Another nearby couple with two children, who were originally from Halifax, Nova Scotia, now reside in White Horse, our next destination.

From there we walked to 2nd and Queen Streets to watch the Canada Day Parade.

Wooden steps of an old gallery were our seats for the occasion. Boardwalks lined many storefronts.

Remember, I said that it resembled the Wild West!

A few marching, Royal Mounted Police were the leaders of the procession. Yes, they were unmounted.

No horses were in attendance. Following them were kids on all types of bicycles, Fire Department vehicles-one spouting water upwards, a man in a beaver

costume with two large, white front teeth pulling a tree branch, girls in saloon dresses, kids in beaver skins on a trailer with a makeshift beaver dam, and a float of medical personnel tossing Band-Aid samples. Were they anticipating a run-in with wildlife?

The parade ended at the Dawson Museum where a BBQ lunch was being served.

original native community until the gold rush days. It was five kilometers north of Dawson City. There were no roads into the village.

Two flags were waving in the breeze on the bank at this stop. The area was not officially identified as US or Canadian initially. The border was established later.

We were escorted around this village by a guide. Many animal pelts and native items were on display.

After boarding our sternwheeler again on the 1,979 mile long Yukon River, we passed "Ship Wreck Cemetery." These once water-worthy, vacated vessels were eventually pushed onshore in the 1950's.

Farther upstream arose rocky cliffs with pine trees filling cracks in the rocks. On the other bank, gently rising mountains were in the background from a few small cabins and campers. The river now was wide with rapidly flowing water.

Dinner that night was at Belinda's Restaurant in The Westmark Hotel. The prepared entree that evening was Char Fish. The dictionary says that the origin of the name is unknown, but it is a genus of small-scaled trout. I was relieved! I prefer that my food remain un"Charred." The food was good, but the Yukon Red Ale was too bitter for my taste.

Afterwards, we decided to go to Diamond Tooth Gerties earlier than we did last night for the stage show. It was standing room only the night before. Arriving at 7:15 for the 8:30 performance was a good plan. We met two couples from Toronto who had two extra chairs at their small table. They obliged us

with sit- down comfort. Since I did not speak French fluently, we did not officially join them in conversation.

They may not have understood our Hoosier English anyway. The night's stage show was way Off Broadway, but entertaining.

We slept well again that night, but were awakened early the next morning by noisy maintenance work outside our bedroom wall. Obviously, the Canadian Day holiday was over!

More traveling tomorrow.

LIMIT CASH

The Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles (BMV) is asking Hoosiers to pay with a credit card or check when possible to complete transactions. The BMV is making this request because of the national coin shortage which has directly impacted its branches.

The United States Federal Reserve is experiencing a coin shortage that is currently impacting all Financial Institutions within the U.S. As a result, the BMV is unable to access additional coin inventory to replenish its supplies. The BMV required all branches to take steps to help mitigate the impact of the coin shortage several weeks ago and is now asking customers to use cash only when able to pay with exact change. At this time, branches are displaying signs identifying the situation and asking customers to use alternate forms of payment.

The Federal Reserve has not provided a timeline for the coin shortage to be resolved. They have stated they expect coin inventories to return to previous levels once the coin supply chain returns to normal circulation patterns.
