

Kudos, Kicks & Karats



This weeks recipe is coming from my collection of open class recipes that I take to the county fairs. My favorite pie is a mixed fruit pie recipe that came from a Taste of Home magazine that featured this pie in the "wish I had that recipe" section. Its called a Bumbleberry pie and if you like a mixed fruit pie I'm sure you will enjoy this one.

This recipe has gotten me some nice placings including the grand champion in Blackford county a few years ago. This year we had to forgo the fair due to Covid, so the girls and I cant even show at the state fair that we were so excited about. So hopefully next year I'll be taking this pie to the state fair and see how we do there. Until then enjoy and for those kids who are adjusting to the fair schedule and new way of doing 4-H, good luck to you all.

Bumbleberry pie

For the shell:

5 1/2c. flour 1 tbsp. vinegar ¼ tsp salt ¾ c. cold water 2c. shortening 1 egg

In bowl, cut flour, salt and shortening till crumbly with pastry blender. Whisk egg, water and vinegar and pour over dry ingredients, mix and roll into a ball and chill 30 minutes. Roll out into crust for 2-9 inch double crust pies.

2c. each fresh or frozen blueberries, raspberries, sliced strawberries and rhubarb.

4c. chopped and peeled granny smith apples

2c. sugar

2 tbsp. lemon juice

3/4c. flour

Combine fruit, flour, sugar, mixing well. Do not bust up berries. Fill shells dividing the filling between the 2 shells. Chapel Services9:00 a.m. Sprinkle with lemon juice and seal the top crust and crimp closed. Slit top crust for a vent and bake 350 degrees for 50 to 60 minutes. Makes 2 pies.

DRIVING EXAMS RESUME

The Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles (BMV) announced today it will begin appointments for driving skills exams on July 16 in select communities. The BMV began rescheduling exams in late June for anyone who had an appointment canceled due to the public health Once emergency. customers with a previously canceled appointment have had the opportunity to reschedule, the BMV will open appointments across the state corresponding to branch timeslot availability. comply The first appointments will be available as early as July 16 with all branches offering appointments by July 24.

"The BMV typically has driving skills scheduled three weeks in advance. As a result, more than 4,000 Hoosiers had an

exam canceled and were therefore given priority to get their exam completed before the schedule is opened to the public," BMV Commissioner Peter Lacy "The number canceled exams varied by branch, which is why we will appointments phases."

Appointments are required for driving skills exams and be scheduled minimum of 48 hours and maximum of 3 weeks in advance. The scheduler will be updated as additional branches complete their backlog. Appointment information and expectations can be viewed on the BMV website, found

Customers and drive examiners must follow specific health and safety requirements during the driving skills exam. For understandable reasons. public anxiety has risen another lately about possibility, that the virus can linger for hours in the air. This suggests that airborne virus particles, very tiny, smaller than five microns, might be exhaled and remain suspended and swirl like dust or pollen. A group of 239 scientists and engineers led by Lidia Morawska and Donald K. Milton recently appealed in the journal Clinical Infectious Diseases for more attention to be given to this possibility. The implications could unsettling and disruptive: Masks might be useless against such small particles;



and officers requiring major new control measures, such as upgraded ventilation.

lingering in the air measles can remain contagious in a closed space for two hours. Fortunately, CRISIS HELPLINE the scientific evidence so far shows the coronavirus does not behave like measles. Michael Klompas and colleagues note in Journal of the American Medical Association that, before mitigation efforts, the coronavirus reproduction number was estimated to be about 2.5, meaning that each infected person went on to infect an average of two to three others, similar to influenza, and quite measles, different from which has a reproduction number closer to 18.

However, a series of factors can come together that do super-spreading create events in which airborne spread plays a role. These events are often outcome of a combination of ventilation, limited enclosed space, and longer duration greater and intensity of exposure. Recent examples include a choir practice, the tight quarters of a warship, and numerous nightclubs. These bursts may be less frequent than other transmission events, they pack a punch.

According to State Rep. Dan Leonard (R-Huntington), 2020 Census responses are critical to future federal funding in communities, Hoosiers should respond now if they have not already done so.

Census Surge Week kicked Monday to remind residents to complete their 2020 Census forms before door-to-door visits begin in some areas around the country as early as July 20. Leonard said Indiana is currently tied for 10th in the nation for response rate, with nearly two-thirds of Hoosier census forms submitted.

ADULT NON-FICTION: AN ALASKAN & YUKON TRIP DAY # 7

by Larry Ryan Saturday, July 1, 2017 was "Canada Day" in our northern, neighboring country. Dawson City map and guidebook identified Mary's Hall as a special holiday breakfast location. In pancakes, addition to sausage, and juice, we visited briefly with people from British Columbia who lived across the border from Spokane, WA. Another nearby couple with two children, who were originally from Halifax, Nova Scotia, now reside in White Horse, our next destination.

From there we walked to 2nd and Queen Streets to watch the Canada Day Parade. Wooden steps of an old gallery were our seats for the occasion. Boardwalks lined storefronts. many

The parade ended at the Dawson Museum where a BBQ lunch was being served. The meal featured a large hot dog which resembled a bratwurst, the usual condiments, potato chips, and drinks. The meat could have been deer, caribou, or moose for all I know. This may have been our only moose sighting on the trip.

We discovered that the lunch was free-will, but since I could not identify any donation containers, it actually became a free, Canadian, hospitable meal! Don't tell anyone!

After lunch our tour group boarded the bus for a short ride to the "Klondike Spirit." a sternwheeler for a 90 minute boat ride on the Yukon River. The vessel was actually a diesel powered, dual, side-wheeler. We headed downstream Moosehide Village, an

The Indiana Bureau of Motor asking Vehicles (BMV) is Hoosiers to pay with a credit card or check when possible to complete transactions. BMV is making this request because of the national coin shortage which has directly impacted its branches.

The United States Federal Reserve is experiencing a coin shortage that is currently impacting all Financial Institutions within the U.S. As a result, the BMV is unable to access additional coin inventory to replenish its supplies. The BMV required all branches to take steps to help mitigate the impact of the coin shortage several weeks ago and is now asking customers to use cash only when able to pay with exact change. At this time, branches are displaying signs identifying the situation and asking customers alternate forms of payment.

The Federal Reserve has not provided a timeline for the coin shortage to be resolved. They have stated they expect coin inventories to return to previous levels once the coin supply chain returns to normal circulation patterns.

- Checking your airways with a peak flow meter.
- Knowing what to do when your asthma is out of control.
- 2. What are the benefits of participating in an asthma selfmanagement program? Completing an asthma selfmanagement education program can improve your knowledge about your specific type of asthma. It can also help you feel more confident in monitoring symptoms, your

working with your healthcare providers, and in using your asthma medicines correctly. These programs can also improve your ability to avoid or reduce exposure to your asthma triggers. All this can potentially result in fewer symptoms, department or urgent care visits, for an overall improved quality of life.

- 3. What skills will I learn? Asthma self-management education programs cover the basics about asthma and how it affects the body, as well as give participants the ability to use tools to monitor symptoms and medicines properly. **Participants** also develop problem-solving skills for when asthma symptoms worsen and learn how to make lifestyle changes to avoid asthma including stress triggers, management, staying active with exercise and avoiding tobacco smoke. Through these programs, participants develop self-advocacy and communication skills for working with healthcare providers.
- 4. Where can I turn for asthma self-management education?
