EXEMPTION FORMS DUE

Application for property tax exemption (Form 136) is due to the County Assessor on or before April 1, 2019. An application can be filed by certain property that is owned, occupied and used predominantly for charitable, religious, educational scientific purposes. 

PEARL HARBOR – A Warren, Indiana, native and 2007 Southern Wells High School graduate is serving at the U.S. Naval Submarine Training Center Pacific (NSTCP) in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

Petty Officer 1st Class John Deweese has served for seven years and works as a Navy electrician's mate (nuclear) and is serving within the U.S. Pacific Fleet area of operations. The U.S. Pacific Fleet is the world's largest fleet command, encompassing 100 million square miles, nearly half the Earth's surface, from Antarctica to the Arctic Circle and from the West Coast of the United States into the Indian Ocean.

As a Navy electrician's mate (nuclear), Deweese is responsible for the maintenance and operation of electrical distribution equipment onboard submarines. As an instructor he is responsible for training submarine nuclear sailors in safe operations.

Deweese credits success in the Navy to many of the lessons learned in Warren.

"I learned to treat others as you would want to be treated," said Deweese. "Our job in the Navy can be challenging, but it would not be possible without the great men and women I am serving beside. Deweese. Treating others with dignity and respect goes a long way."
