A vacation is a chance to get away from the normal routine of work and demands of daily life. When done right, a vacation should be a period of relaxation, enjoyment and recharging yourself. Research has shown that a vacation with those close to us is a shared experience that makes us happy, and continues to do so when we relive the experience afterwards.

But done badly, summer holidays can produce enough stress that some people need to return to daily life to rest up from that "vacation."

A relaxing summer holiday simply requires some planning and careful choices. A good vacation isn't about how long it lasts or where you go, but rather about what you do with your time, and the choices made to help you relax.

Most important is not trying to do too much. Experts suggest staying in fewer places for longer periods of time makes it easier to relax. Similarly, don't try to pack in too many activities. Scheduling is fine, but you don't need to fill every minute. Plan some free time when relaxing is your only goal.

For a family trip, reduce conflict and complaining by planning activities that will satisfy at least some of the needs of all family members. Talk with your kids about the trade-offs. Some things being planned will be to keep them happy, but help them understand that other activities are to keep mom and dad happy, too.

You can also reduce vacation stress by being realistic about work obligations. Constantly worrying about what's happening back in the office is not a way to relax. If you can't totally escape work issues, plan some specific work time. Set up an afternoon when the family can disappear to have fun and you can check in with the office and clear up any problems. When that's done, get back to your vacation and relaxing.

Your goal is to make vacation time restful and fun. Don't stress out by worrying that everything you've planned has to happen and has to be wonderful. Accept that your schedule is flexible, and if you discover something new and interesting, take the time to enjoy it. What you don't want is a schedule packed with activities that will leave everyone feeling tired, cranky and overwhelmed.

Keep your vacation simple, under-scheduled and flexible, and you have a better chance of coming back truly refreshed and reinvigorated.



SAMUEL JONES PIONEER - JEFF SOUDER

This year's Samuel Jones Award winner has been a Warren area resident most, if not all, of his life. Nowadays it's not unusual to see him strolling down the streets of Warren, driving through Town in his little white vehicle, and, in fact, not all that unusual to answer the door and see him standing there with a pizza delivery. This year we congratulate Jeff Souder as the Pioneer Award Winner.

From being a part of a service group, festival committee, Chamber of Commerce Member, community volunteer, Jeff has been committed to the Warren Area Community from early on. He was a volunteer EMS driver before the units were professionally staffed and a member of Salamonie Active Men working on projects such as the Haunted House, Labor Day tractor pull, Christmas Tree sales, and SAM Olympics. Volunteering for the Pulse Opera House, he was part of the group that rescued old theater seats from another location that are still in use in the local venue. Over the years he has spent countless hours not only coaching baseball and softball teams at both the Knight Bergman Center and Tower Park but dragging diamonds, mowing, picking up rocks and in general, making sure the diamonds were good to use.

Mostly behind the scenes, he can be seen hanging scarecrows for the Scarecrow Festival, as well as other Chamber of Commerce support activities including the Chili Cook Off during the Scarecrow Festival, transporting downtown planters to the local Greenhouse to be filled and returned the next spring and making sure they are adopted and cared for by businesses during the summer season, taking care of and making sure the speakers in the downtown are operational, and then, those same planters are filled with Christmas Trees for the Holidav Season, not by magic, but, by Jeff's hands. The list could go on and on. His support for the Warren Area Chamber of Commerce is also evident as he has served as President and Member of the Board of Directors, and, continues to organize fund raising efforts including those for construction of the Chamber Park being installed on First Street.

As past President of Historic Warren, an Indiana Mainstreet Program, he currently serves on the Steering Committee and with wife Becky, attends Community Exchanges for new ideas and is instrumental in fund raising to support Structural and Façade Grant Programs in the Downtown while working with Indiana Landmarks to administer those grant programs. Jeff currently serves on the Executive Board of Huntington County Economic Development Group and is active in his Church, serving in various leadership positions.

Jeff epitomizes what it means to give back to this community and we have provided only a snap shot of his support. We know many, many people of the Warren Area have been impacted by the volunteer hours he has given. - Commit to ordering foods like lean protein and veggies steering clear of calorie bomb add-ons like heavy dressings and condiments.
- 4. Don't show up starving. Don't skip out on breakfast or snacks so you can splurge. Showing up overly hungry likely you overindulge. Plus, skipping meals could lead to a blood sugar crash and subsequent snacking, throwing you off
- 5. Be the portion police. Restaurant portions are often two or three times the amount you need for any given meal. Consider sharing an entrée with a friend, saving half your meal for later, ordering from the kid's menu or choosing a few healthy appetizers instead of a full
- 6. Start green. Start with a side salad to sneak in a serving of veggies and prevent overdoing it once your main meal arrives. Hold croutons and cheese and ask for the dressing on the side.
- 7. Have it your way. Don't be afraid to ask for what you Seek out lighter preparations. Think steamed, broiled and grilled instead of breaded, battered and fried. preparations, substitute ingredients, nix the butter or cream and if that's not possible, ask your server to point you to healthier selections.
