POPPIES

American Legion Auxiliary 368 wants to tell the Poppy Story.

Spring of 1919 the poppies bloomed in abundance on the battlefields of France where so many of our men had fallen in battle. A replica of this Poppy is a Memorial Flower of the American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary. This became our Memorial Flower at National Convention September 27-29, 1920. Auxiliary adopted it in October 1921. At this time we pledged the money received to the welfare relief for service men and women and their families, thus fulfilling the true meaning of the Poppy - an emblem of faith, which is kept with all who died through service to the living.

The memorial poppy is made of red crepe paper, by hand, by veterans.

You can pay tribute to all who died in service by wearing a poppy the month of May.

BIKE TO WORK

INDIANAPOLIS—Friday, May 16 is Bike to Work Day, and State Health Commissioner Judy Monroe, M.D. is encouraging Hoosiers to try this fun and healthy way to commute. Deputy State Health Commissioner Mary Hill, RN, Esq. will be riding her bike to work that day.

"Biking to work is not only good for your health, but it is also good for the environment," said Dr. Monroe. "Moderate daily physical activity like riding your bike to work is good for your heart and lungs and can lower your blood pressure."

Ride Your Bike to Work Day is sponsored by the Indiana Bicycle Coalition. The day is aimed at promoting the health and environmental benefits of bicycling.

Dr. Monroe urges bicyclists to keep safety in mind when riding to work or for recreation. Following are some important safety tips she urges Hoosiers to follow:

Always Wear Your Helmet - Be sure it covers your forehead and fits properly. Helmets are for all ages-set a good example to others by wearing your bicycle helmet every time you ride.

Ride on the Right - Always ride with traffic.

Obey All Traffic Laws - Stop at stop signs and stop lights and obey one-way streets.

Signal and Look before turning Ride in a Predictable Manner -Ride in a straight line. Don't swerve between parked cars. Use Head and Tail Lights at Night - Reflectors are not enough.

Keep Your Bike in Good Repair-Have it tuned up by a professional bike mechanic regularly.

Yield to Pedestrians - Pedestrians have the right of way. Ride defensively. Follow the rules of the road. In Indiana, the bicycle is a vehicle and has all the rights and responsibilities of other vehicles. This means stopping at stop signs and stop lights, riding on the right side of the road, and signaling for turns.

Drink before you're thirsty, eat before you're hungry. Take along plenty of water. Use sports drinks for longer rides. Snacks to take along include cereal bars, cookies, fig bars, and fruit (bananas, apples are best).

Items you should carry: Identification, money (forice cream or other goodies along the ride), tools, spare inner tube, bicycle pump. There are many different bags that you can attach to your bike that could carry what you'll need for the day.

Plan a ride less than 10 miles when riding with small children, those who haven't bicycled very much orifthe terrain is challenging. Plan stops along the route or have a destination in mind for the ride.

Flower beds are coming to life and there was fear of losing some plants but most all are coming up nice. Just need to get them cleaned out and early weeds stopped.

Lets all hope that this growing season will be better than last years. That was near disaster.

Soon the farmers market will be starting and most all vendors will be there again with their nice product and anxious to help with good fresh foods.

One of the things I sometimes made but may not be doing this year is the whole wheat English muffins which I will share the recipe with you and have had request for.

Whole Wheat English Muffins Together in a 3 or 4 quart size pan heat to scalding 1/2 cup butter 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup honey, 2 cups milk let cool to lukewarm. To 1/2 cup warm water add 4 1/2 teaspoon dry yeast, let rise and foam. Add this to the milk and 2 beaten eggs. Blend together 4 cups whole wheat flour and 3cups regular all purpose flour add more flour if necessary to make a bread-like dough. Let rise till double in bulk, turn out on floured board and knead gently a few times, roll out about to 1/2 inch thick and cut out in 2 inch rounds. Let rise 1/2 hour bake 15-18 minutes at 350 degrees.

This makes about 2 dozen muffins and they will keep good in refrigerator several days. Just warm them in the microwave a few seconds before serving, a little fresh jelly is tasty on them and they will be like fresh baked. They make a wonderful and filling breakfast with fresh fruit.

Enjoy and have a great summer. In the last article the German Potato Salad I did a boo boo! Sorry. It stated 1tablespoon vinegar and 1/2 cup vinegar. It should be 1 tablespoon sugar and 1/2 cup vinegar.
