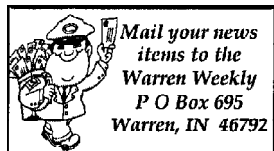
The Huntington County Extension Office would like to remind all 4-H members who plan to exhibit animals at the 82nd Annual Huntington County 4-H Fair that animal pre-entry/pen reservation forms are due no later than Monday, July 2 to the Purdue Extension –

Huntington County Office. These pre-entry forms were mailed to all youth enrolled in beef, dairy, starter calf, rabbit, poultry, goat, sheep, and swine projects during the 3rd week of June and are necessary to assist the various 4-H Fair livestock superintendents in determining pens and housing assignments for all animals to be exhibited during the annual 4-H Fair.

Horse & pony pre-entry forms were distributed through 4-H club leaders and must be completed no later than Monday, July 2 and returned to the 4-H horse & pony club leaders.

Youth who did not receive these forms in the mail should contact the Purdue Extension – Huntington County Office immediately to complete these forms to ensure sufficient pen space for their animals and planning for the various animal shows during the Huntington County 4-H Fair.

GROWERS ENCOURAGED TO SCOUT SOYBEAN FIELDS FOR MITES

Walking across a soybean field on a hot day will soon make you sweaty and tired. Farmers know that it is important to look closely to learn about plant population, disease and pest problems especially during this long stretch of dry weather.

Checking fields to inspect growing crops involves more than just viewing them from an air-conditioned vehicle. One check that can be made seen from a roadside inspection is seeing the "bronzing" of leaves. Bronzed foliage is irreversible, meaning that damage is done.

The "bronzing" of leaves is a sign of spider mite damage. Ron Hammond and Andy Michel from Ohio State Extension explained the process in a recent article. They describe that the pests feed on the underside of the foliage with sucking mouth parts and may be very destructive when abundant. Under hot and dry field conditions, spider mites thrive on plants that are under stress. As plants become heavily infested, foliage turns yellow, then bronze, and finally the leaves drop off the plants potentially causing dehydration and death of plant.

Before considering control, it is very important that spider mites are identified as the source of yellowish or bronzed plants in a field. Note that there are many other diseases, pathogens and nutrient deficiencies that cause a similar appearance of foliage.

Christian Krupke, Purdue Entomologist, explained that confirming the presence of mites means walking fields as compared to just a roadside look. He recommends shaking some discolored soybean leaves over a white piece of paper and watching for small dark specks moving about on the paper.

There may also be very tiny, fine webbing on the undersides of the discolored leaves. Once spider mites have been positively identified in the damaged areas of the field, Krupke said that it is essential that the portions of the entire field be scouted to determine the range of infestation. Initially the mites may move in the field from grassy borders.

The most severe damage from spider mites occurs when the infestation starts in the early stages of plant growth and builds throughout the season (extended drought). Before applying controls carefully consider that, depending when damage is noted, multiple

insecticide/miticide applications may be necessary. This is because surviving spider mites are able to repopulate a field much more quickly than their natural predators, which are usually also wiped out by these chemical applications.

If spider mites are positively identified as the culprit of damage, and hot, dry conditions are expected to persist, it is recommended that a control be considered. 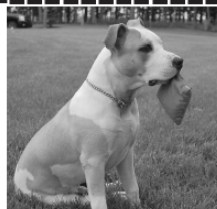

• A change to the amount you must pay for a prescription drug was denied.

• A plan stops providing or paying for all or part of an item or service you think you still need.

How you file an appeal depends on the kind of Medicare coverage you have.

Original Medicare

If you have Original Medicare and want to file an appeal, get the Medicare Summary Notice

(MSN) that shows the item or service that was denied. You must file the appeal within 120 days receiving the MSN.

To file your appeal, follow the instructions on the back of the MSN, or fill out the Redetermination Request Form.

Medicare Advantage Plan

Your plan sends you materials each year that should explain how to file a complaint,

grievance, or appeal. Follow the instructions specific to your plan.

Medicare Prescription Drug Plan

With a Medicare Prescription Drug Plan, you have the right to:

• Get a written explanation of the coverage made by your plan called a "coverage determination".

• Ask for an exception to a drug if you or your prescribing

doctor believe you need a drug that isn't on your plan's formulary.

• Ask for an exception to a coverage rule.

• Ask for an exception if you think you should pay less for a higher tier drug because your doctor believes it is the best option for you.

Q: Medicare didn't pay for my last medical treatment. It has paid for this same treatment before, so I think there may be a mistake. What should I do?

A: You should be able to file an appeal if you feel there was an error made in your billing to Medicare.

You may file an appeal when:

• A health care service, supply, or prescription that you think you should get was denied.

• A payment for health care services or supplies or a prescription drug you already got was denied.

PROTECTING YOURSELF FROM CYBERCRIME

(ARA) - Gone are the days when hackers were the weekend enthusiasts you tolerated on the golf course, when viruses were the things that gave you the flu or a cold, and Phish was a popular jam band who served as the inspiration for your favorite flavor of Ben and Jerry's. With the rise of the Internet and electronic devices has come the rise of cyber-related crime.

Cybercrime, as it is called, is defined as a criminal activity using computers or other electronic devices to victimize people, organizations or businesses.

"Despite a global recession, improved security and international crackdown efforts, cybercrime has thrived over the last decade, growing by double digits year after year," says Clint Kirkwood, a professor of Criminal Justice at Argosy University, Orange County and 28-year veteran and retired commanding officer of the vice section of the narcotics division of the Detroit Police Department. While estimates of the cost of cyber crime to businesses and the private sector vary, a 2011 publication released by Javelin Strategy and Research, the annual cost of identity theft alone was \$37 billion. "Today, some of the most successful criminals do not have to leave the comfort of their own homes to pull off crimes bigger than ever. All they need is an Internet connection, a little tech savvy and a lot of bad will," says Kirkwood.

The Internet Crime Complaint Center received more than 300,000 complaints in 2011, which included such crimes as FBI-related scams, identity theft, advance fee fraud and a host of romance, work-from-home, auto auction, loan intimidation and other scams.

"Since the take-off of social networking and the paperless way of conducting business, cyber-based criminal activity has skyrocketed in many corners of the world," says Gary Gonzales, a professor in the Criminal Justice program at Argosy University, San Diego and police detective in his 16th year of service with the San

Diego Police Department. "Criminals are masking themselves as potential customers, clients or even professionals to lure innocent people into a web of deception and greed. From copyright infringement and cyber bullying to child pornography and spamming, the impact is enormous."

Knowing the threats you face online and the tools available to help you keep a watchful eye is critical in protecting yourself in the digital world. There are simple precautions that computer, mobile phone and other digital users can take to ensure their safety. Do not open emails/attachments from unknown or suspicious sources, nor answer email messages that ask for your personal information.

"The widows of Nigerian generals desperately seeking your financial assistance and notifications that you've won a European lottery are obvious scams but some email fraud can be much more difficult to distinguish," says Arabinda Banerjee, senior vice president of Technology Infrastructure at a leading bank in Tampa, Florida and faculty member at Argosy University, Tampa.

"In general, if it seems too good to be true or requires you to send money in to receive a reward, be sure to avoid it. Emails with vague but feel-good subject lines like

'Congratulations! ...' or the name of a friend and the message 'has shared a picture/video ...' can be malicious emails, even when apparently sent out by one of your friends." Do an Internet search using the term 'scam' and some of the key words from the message, advises Banerjee. If it's a known scam, you'll likely see it pop up in your search engine results.

Invest in a good anti-virus software and firewall, the experts suggest. While this will not guarantee 100 percent protection, they will definitely reduce your risk greatly. Be sure that any WiFi connection you are using to conduct financial business is locked and protected and any stores you are making purchases from are reputable. In addition, be sure to monitor your financial accounts monthly to determine any fraudulent charges and report suspicious activity immediately.

Change your passwords frequently and create passwords that are difficult to guess. Do not use the same ID/password in all websites. While keeping track of multiple logins and passwords may be an inconvenience, it's a necessary protection against hackers.
