The Huntington County 4-H Shooting Sports program begins on Sunday, January 30 with the first classroom meeting for the 4-H Pistol discipline from 2:00-4:30 pm in the Family Living Building, Hier's Park, Huntington. 4-H members interested in taking the pistol classes and parents must complete and sign the necessary enrollment forms and pay the \$20 registration fee no later than the January 30th classroom meeting. The 4-H Shooting Sports program is designed to teach safe use of archery and firearm equipment while helping youth grow in a variety of life skills. There is a \$20 registration fee for each discipline which must be paid at the time of enrollment. Shooting Sports leaders and the Extension Office have copies of the necessary enrollment forms and forms must be completed no later than the first scheduled meeting of each respective discipline. All 4-H Shooting sports classes are under the direction of 4-H adult volunteers who have been certified through the State 4-H Shooting Sports program and Purdue University. Goals of this 4-H program include:

- Promoting the highest standards of safety, sportsmanship, and ethical behavior, including sound decision making;

- Teaching safe and responsible use of firearms and archery equipment, self-discipline and concentration;

- Strengthening families through participation in lifelong recreational activities;

- Enhancing the development of self-concept, character and personal growth through safe, educational and socially acceptable involvement in shooting activities;

- Encouraging responsible, self-directed and productive members of society;

- Encouraging participation in natural resources and related natural science programs by

exposing participants to the content through shooting, hunting and related activities;

- Exposing youth to the broad array of vocational and lifelong hobbies related to the shooting sports.

SMALL FARMING

Did you ever want a few chickens or a horse on your property? Have you been curious about what it takes to own goats, sheep, pigs, or cows. Come and learn at this new class series. The back to basics: a Novice's guild to farm animal series is designed for aspiring small farmer, land owner, or 4-H'er interested in owning farm animals. There has been an upsurge in interest in owning farm animals, this class will address some of the challenges someone new to farm animals might have. We will be covering goat, sheep, cattle, chickens, horses, and swine. The goal of this series is to inform the novice owner about the latest information and trends related to common livestock animals found on small farms. We will cover a different animal group each week for 5 weeks starting February 14, 2011. This series will discuss proper care for each type of animal. Learn what it takes to own live-stock and the impact on your lifestyle. Learn about housing, care breeding, and uses of the different animals your interested in owning. Learn tips and trick from experts that can save you time and money. Learn how to avoid costly

mistakes that can lead to a bad experience owning livestock. Find out what equipment it necessary when taking care of your animals. Discover what you can expect out of your animals. Each week we will be discussing a different animal group: Feb 14 - Goats and Sheep, Feb 21 - Cattle for you property, Feb 28 - All about chickens, March 7 - A Home for Horses and March 14 - Swine Guidance. MY TOWN and Yours

On June 22, 1974 at 2 p.m. a lot of numbers became extinct in Warren. That's when customers from Citizens Telephone Corp. untied their phones and for the first time in 70 years, switched from operator to dial service. Until that day, Warren had been the only Telephone Company in Indiana still using "Central"-with operators and a 740-space switchboard.

Some of the numbers vanishing were Warren number 1. That number belonged to Miles Furniture. For over 50 years that number had been with that building. Possibly could be the building once housed the telephone company's office on the second floor. Warren number 6 belonged to Hethcote's Standard Station. Cline Click Lumber passed out nail aprons with their number 64 stenciled on them. I still have one of those.

There were some problems with not having dial phones. If you were out of town and tried to tell the operator your number was 6 they would

laugh and ask "What is the rest of the number?" Other problems were if you were out of town shopping and wrote a check they would ask you to put your phone number on the check. When you wrote number 2 on the check they would laugh and think that was comical. My experience was when I was in the Army trying to call home the operator would laugh when I told her my number. Finally, after learning what to do, I was able to tell them it was a ring down from Marion.

There were a lot of advantages having the operator service. The operators became an inexpensive secretary and answering service. It wasn't unusual for customers to call the operator and ask the time of day or what the weather report was going to be. George Bergman would let the operator know when he was going for coffee and would be at the restaurant if anybody needed him. Calling home, one time, the operator told me she had called to my mother earlier and they were going to my grandmothers, so she rang out there.

The town's elderly residents were sorry to see the change. For years, they had been able to call someone by telling the operator the person's name. The operators had memorized the numbers. I am sure anybody living in Warren, back then, can remember their number. Ours was 150R. What was yours?

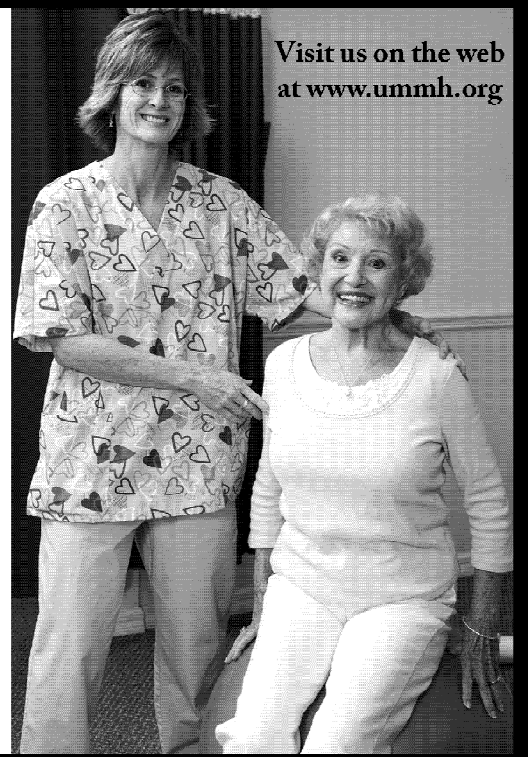

CERVICAL HEALTH

As Hoosiers start working on making positive changes in 2011, state health officials urge women to make getting a pap smear part of any New Year's resolution to be healthier.

"It is important to have regular pap smears (also known as pap tests) because they can often detect abnormal changes in cells before they have become malignant," said Erin Triplett, director of the Breast and Cervical Cancer Program. "Early detection is imperative to preventing cervical cancer."

An estimated 12,000 women in the United States could develop cervical cancer in 2011, with more than 4,000 women potentially dying of the disease, according to the American Cancer Society.

According to the CDC, approximately six out of 10 women diagnosed with cervical cancer either have never received a pap smear or have not been tested in the past five years. In Indiana, the reported cervical cancer screening rate for 2010 was 73.7 percent, according to the National Women's Law Center.

Genital human papillomavirus (also called HPV) is the most common sexually transmitted infection. There are more than 40 HPV types that can infect the genital areas of males and females. These HPV types can also infect the mouth and throat. Most people who become

infected with HPV do not even know they have it.

Triplett says at least half of all sexually active people will have HPV at some point in their lives. For approximately 90 percent of infected women, the virus is either cleared by the body or becomes undetectable within two years; however, persistent infection with "high-risk" types of HPV can cause cell changes that, if left untreated, can lead to cervical cancer.

Health officials recommend women begin getting annual pap smears at the age of 18. After the age of 30, if women have had three consecutive negative pap smears, then the screenings can decrease to once every three years. As always, it is recommended that women talk to their primary health care provider about screening and vaccination recommendations.

"Successful education, screening and an immunization program for women, youth and adolescents could help eliminate cervical cancer in the United States in our lifetime," says Morgan McGill, director of the Office of Women's Health. "The message of cervical health is an important one for women to hear because knowing the facts can be life-changing at any age."

According to the CDC, two forms of the virus, HPV 16 and HPV 18, account for more than 70 percent of all cervical cancer cases. A vaccine is available to prevent the high-risk types of HPV. The three-dose series is recommended for females ages 11 through 26.

"Abstinence is the only 100 percent way to prevent HPV. However, we recommend young women get vaccinated for HPV before they become sexually active," said Triplett. "It's important for parents know what options are available to protect their daughters in the future."

Resources for parents on how to talk to their kids about sex can be found on the Indiana RESPECT Website at: www.indianarespect.com.

To help inform the public about the HPV vaccine Indiana University, in collaboration with the Kristen Forbes EVE Foundation, recently launched the new Cervical Cancer-Free Indiana initiative.

"In 2011, we plan to partner with the locally-based Kristen Forbes EVE Foundation to educate parents and medical providers statewide about the opportunity to eradicate cervical cancer through the HPV vaccine and regular cervical cancer screening," said Gregory Zimet, PhD, a professor of pediatrics and clinical psychology in the IU School of Medicine's Section of Adolescent Medicine and co-director of the Cancer Prevention and Control Program at the Indiana University Melvin and Bren Simon Cancer Center.

Triplett says the Indiana State Department of Health appreciates the steps the Indiana General Assembly has taken to address cervical cancer prevention by improving access to preventive screenings, particularly for underserved women. In addition, the legislature has supported efforts to increase awareness about human papillomavirus

(HPV), the HPV vaccine, and the virus' link to cervical cancer.

The Breast & Cervical Cancer Program provides access to breast and cervical cancer screenings, diagnostic testing, and treatment for underserved and underinsured women who qualify for services. To find out if you qualify for this program, call the Indiana Family Helpline at (800) 433-0746.

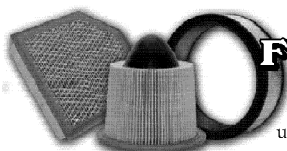

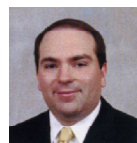
